

Phillies Extend Winning Streak to Down Cardinals

(By the Associated Press.) Ben Chapman, the "fall guy" who took on the thankless job of managing the Phillies a year ago,

is a solid bet to be named manager of the year in the National League—even if his team winds up in the basement. Winning 18 of their last 24 games and moving from eighth place to sixth, only one game out of the first division, rates as a minor miracle for the club that holds the all-time record for finishing last.

Helicopter Test Will Be Made for Air-Bus Service

DETROIT, Mich., June 26.—Experimental operation of Greyhound air-bus service will begin here tomorrow when a helicopter makes two demonstration landings to exchange passengers with highway motor coaches.

In flights near Detroit, the helicopter will land at a cloverleaf highway intersection and in the limited space adjoining a bus terminal on schedules to connect with intercity buses. The helicopter being used is a four-place model, the largest rotor-plane now produced, and one of two purchased by Greyhound Skyways for experimental purposes. Twelve-passenger helicopters suitable for commercial air-bus service are expected to be in production within two years.

The demonstration tomorrow will be witnessed by Igor Sikorsky, helicopter inventor, and Greyhound executives.

Supervisors Win Bargain Vote Nod

WASHINGTON, June 24.—(AP) Workers holding supervisory jobs part-time may vote in bargaining representation elections involving non-supervisory employees, the National Labor Relations Board ruled today, if more than half their time is spent on non-supervisory jobs.

The issue was raised in an AFL cannery workers' union petition to represent all year-round maintenance and production workers at the Salem, Ore., plant of Hunt Foods, Inc., a Los Angeles corporation packing fruits and vegetables.

The custom of upgrading permanent employees to supervisory jobs during seasonal processing is common throughout much of the fruit and vegetable canning industry, and the NLRB found that 17 of the 33 year-round Salem workers have authority to hire and fire approximately 750 workers added during the seasonal peak.

The processing season lasts five to six months, the NLRB reported, and at its close the year-round workers revert to lower classification and pay.

The company protested inclusion of the 17 men in the union, but the labor board held that they should be included and, if more than 50 per cent of their time was spent in non-supervisory jobs, they are eligible to vote on acceptance or rejection of the union as bargaining agent. Purely temporary seasonal workers were excluded.

The board said its decision was based on analogy with cases involving part-time agricultural workers who were held eligible to vote if they work half of the year.

Murder Guilt Upheld in Killing of Oregon Cop

SALEM, Ore., June 26.—(AP) The State Supreme Court upheld yesterday the first degree murder conviction and death sentence of Kenneth W. Bailey, who was convicted of the murder of State Police Sgt. Theodore R. Chambers during a gun battle in the

basement of the Annex schoolhouse, located in Malheur County near Weiser, Idaho.

The slaying occurred April 29, 1945. Bailey's partner, Ronald W. Duffy, was killed in the fight. The pair had been hiding out in the basement when Chambers and other police officers went in after them. The two men were being sought for other crimes.

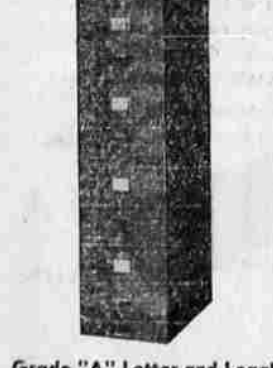
