port that other European nations except the two Soviet Republics have made arrangements for reporting of UNRRA operations," Dirksen told reporters, "I think it is only right that Congress refuse to provide any more funds for use in those republics."

While Romania was not mentioned in the President's report, Dirksen said an American reporter recently was ejected from that country.

How much of the new \$465,000,000 fund is earmarked for Ukraine and Byelorussia, Dirksen said he did not know, nor was the information available from the House Appropriations Committee, which recommended the allotment.

Latest committee figures indicated that up to last April 30 approximately \$82,000,000 of UNRRA aid had been given the two Soviet Republics, both of which were heavy sufferers throughout the war years.

Premium Payments Sent Out on Plywood Quotas

PORTLAND, Ore., June 27.—Approved quota applications for plywood premium payments are in the mails to 22 Oregon

and Western Washington plywood firms, an inter-agency committee reported here today.

The payments, designed to stimulate plywood production, are on the basis of \$7.50 a thousand feet log scale, payable by the firms to peeler log suppliers as a subsidy.

If the firms expand production at least 25 per cent above their quotas, they will be reimbursed for the subsidy payments. Quotas, set by the committee after a meeting with northwest operators, are generally at the first quarter 1953 output rate. Mills whose output increases only slightly above their quotas, receive proportionate refunds.

Social Security Board Advises on Claim Procedure

The Social Security Board is offering its full cooperation to workers and former workers who have reached the age of 65 in an effort to help them avoid loss of benefits through delay in filing claims, it was announced today by Carl D. Monroe, manager of the board's office in Eugene.

"Any person who has worked enough in private industry and commerce to be insured under the old-age and survivors insurance program can file a claim at age 65, even though he continues working, to peg his benefits at a point below which they cannot fall," Monroe said. "Then, if he keeps working, or if he gets a new job, and his wage record would produce higher benefits at a later date, he may file a request to have his benefit recalculated to give him the higher rate."

Monroe pointed out that his statement does not mean that a person can draw benefits while working in jobs covered by the Social Security Act. The law, he explained, provides that benefits must be given up for any month in which the worker earns more than \$14.99 in covered employment, but benefits can be stopped and resumed as often as the worker moves in and out of covered jobs.

Caution Enjoined — To prevent confusion and misunderstanding, Monroe issued the following cautions:

1. Increased benefits, once a claim is filed, can result only from additional work in covered employment. Generally this additional employment must be at pay equal to or above the past average monthly wage.

2. Benefits will be recalculated only upon request. It is important, therefore, that the beneficiary get in touch with the local Social Security Board field office whenever he quits working in covered employment; or, even though he is still working, whenever his total pay begins to go down as a result of reduced working hours, lower pay rate, lost time, or for any other reason.

A representative of the Eugene office of the Social Security Board is at the United States Employment Service in Roseburg the first and third Tuesday of each month from 8:30 to noon.
