

emo Candidate or Congress Is oseburg Visitor

Dr. Louis A. Wood, Democratic candidate for Congressman from Oregon's Fourth district, and who will oppose incumbent representative, Harris Ellsworth, at the November election, has been ending the past few days in Douglas county in the interests of his candidacy.

Dr. Wood, who has been employed for 21 years at the University of Oregon, where he is professor of economics, reports he favors gradual extinction of the OPA without "hampering amendments to the price control legislation."

"OPA's power to resist price advances will be greatly halted if a compromise extension measure becomes law," he asserts. The cost-profit formula written to the measure will mean that prices must be geared to margin production, leaving opportunities for higher, or exceptional, profits to better situated businesses. The administration cannot be justifiably blamed if industrial unrest continues in the face of rapidly mounting prices."

Wood's CVA Project.

Dr. Wood said he is pledged to advocate establishment of the Columbia Valley Authority. "Failure to sanction the Foster Creek dam as a Columbia river project, is to dissension among government bureaus, shows clearly the need for coordinated control of the development of the northwest's resources," the candidate said.

He also asserted his belief that an international trade organization with extensive authority, under the United Nations, is required as an incentive to peaceful relations and the expansion of world commerce.

applicant list from 108,000 to 51,000, the department said.

Those who failed to make the grade in today's list will have another opportunity if congress follows the recommendation of Eisenhower and the Senate subcommittee.

Final selections were made by a board, which the Army Chief of Staff told the senators yesterday was not subject to influence.

"A favorite aide of mine did not make it," Eisenhower said with a smile.

Another Aide Succeeds

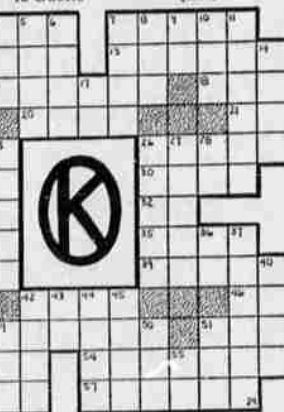
The general did not name the officer who was passed over, but another aide, Lt. Col. James Stack of Tacoma, Wash., was one of 600 nominated for the permanent rank of major, highest on the list.

Two thousand were named to be captains, 6,100 as first lieutenants and 1,100 as second lieutenants. In virtually every instance their new rank will be a reduction from their wartime commissions. Age was the determining factor with second lieutenants under 28, first lieutenants between 28 and 35, captains between 35 and 42 and majors between 42 and 48.

Of the successful appointees, about 4,100 will be commissioned in the air forces, 3,100 in the ground forces and 2,600 in the service forces.

About a third of those on the list have already been returned to civilian life. They will be called back to active duty in 15 days. Those still in service will continue at their temporary rank until reduced under normal procedure.

Every state and territory was



represented in today's list. California led with about 900 nominees. Texas was second with some 800 and New York third with approximately 600.

France Also Benefited

Settlement of the French-Italian frontier question also included ratification by the foreign ministers of the award to France of Mount Cenis, agreed upon at the April-May meeting of the ministers; the passes of Little Saint Bernard and Larche, and an area around Bardonnèche.

Mount Cenis is a tiny coal and iron mine region east of Modane through which runs a main railway line from France to Italy. Little Saint Bernard pass is south of Mount Blanc and Larche pass is further south.

The Tenda and Briga valley has a population of about 3,500 and an area of 251 square miles.

The delegates obviously were elated as they emerged from the long session yesterday and one source said that U. S. Secretary of State Byrnes exclaimed at one point:

"I'll need a couple of minutes to catch my breath to recover from the shock."

Veto Abuse Charged

Meanwhile, Gromyko's repeated use of the veto during Wednesday's security council debate on the Spanish question appeared to be developing into a major U. N. issue.

Dr. Francisco Majera, president of the Security Council and Foreign minister of Mexico, asserted last night that Russia's numerous negative votes constituted an "abuse of the veto."

"I have always opposed the veto to power in essence," he said, "and I am particularly opposed to the abuse of the veto."

He said Wednesday's session of the council "clearly demonstrated" that "any of the big five powers can paralyze the activities of the council."

Wyatt referred to court actions in which OPA seeks treble damages of more than \$9,000,000 as a result of alleged violations of price regulations.

or the OPA, quit abruptly at 10 minutes past midnight after he had talked since 3:52 yesterday afternoon in an attempt to prevent the extension bill's passage before the existing price control law expires at midnight Sunday.

Time after time, O'Daniel called upon his colleagues for help in an undertaking he conceded he could not carry on alone. Senators Bridges and Reed gave his aching vocal chords a few brief rests by asking questions.

With all senators limited to one hour of speaking time, Senator Elmer Thomas claimed the first 60 minutes to develop this theme:

"The farmers under this bill are the goats of this administration. It will sentence 30,000,000 farmers to remain for another year at least the economic goats of this government."

He recited repeated recommendations made by the Agriculture Committee, of which he is chairman, for easing price controls on farm products.

Stepping up for his hour at bat, Senator Bushfield accused OPA of trying to save itself through "notorious and habitual violation" of a law against lobbying by federal agencies or officials.

He said a clever propaganda campaign, "financed with the Treasury funds in violation of a United States criminal statute," was responsible for coast-to-coast meetings and mass protests to Congress.

The jury found that the boy shot his father, Dolph Coleman, to keep his mother from injury. A coroner's jury had returned a similar finding earlier.

serious consequences, possibly death to his companions. He was grasping part of the equipment with his left hand at the moment of the accident."

The report told of immediate removal to the Los Alamos Hospital of the eight men, and the wait of several days before effects of radiation were apparent. Slotin died in nine days.

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pital," the report said. "This treatment, in general, consisted of many transfusions of whole blood and plasma and fluids, principally glucose and saline."

The report said the burns suffered by Slotin were comparable to a "three-dimensional sunburn" explaining: "The skin burns from the radiation are superficial, but as the rays penetrate the body they burn deep, resulting in injury and destruction of tissue and blood cells."

Daglian, whose burns were less severe, died in 26 days after the accident.
