CLEVELAND, June 28.—(AP)—George Pauer, 44-year-old pharmacist, yesterday won a divorce from the wife he claimed was trying to drive him crazy to get his \$90,000 worth of inherited real estate.

Common Pleas Judge Samuel H. Silbert awarding the decree said: "The psychological stunts practiced by this woman are the most

unusual thing this court has ever heard," remarked the judge. "She was a tigress on the hunt. I think her stunts were diabolic. She sang late at night over his protests and she danced late into the night to antagonize him."

Testimony brought out Mrs. Pauer dressed a dummy in her clothes and set it in the family driveway. The husband told the judge she was trying to make him think he was "seeing things" and losing his mind.
