

Oaks, Seals Both Win Twin Bills to Stay Game Apart

The Oakland A's and the San Francisco Seals could sigh with relief today, the Oaks because they still were in first place and the Seals because they still were only a game behind. Both won doubleheaders Sunday to climax a week of touch and go baseball. The Oaks took six of seven during the week from Seattle and the Seals six of seven from San Diego.

This week the Oaks take on seventh-place Portland while the Seals tussle with third-place Los Angeles. The Angels are seven and one-half games behind the Seals and eager to collect some fur pelts. They took a twin bill from Portland yesterday to grab five of the seven tilts for the week.

The league's other clubs—Hollywood and Sacramento—split Sunday but the Stars kept in the near-clean sweep parade with six wins and only one loss for the week.

Scarsella of Oakland had a great day Sunday. He hit five for seven, batting in four runs, and collecting his 21st homer, which won the nightcap in the sixth, 4-1. Pulford, starting for his first time on the Seattle mound, had hurried shutout ball up to that point. In his own half of the fifth Pulford had blasted out a triple, scoring Beard who had singled to get on. The Oaks won the opener 5-3.

At San Diego, Seals pitcher Rossi drove in the winning run of the opener in the seventh after Hoover singled and went to second on Sprinz's sacrifice bunt. He scored from three for the 2-1 edge.

The seven-inning nightcap was a 9-2 walkaway for the Seals.

At Los Angeles the Angels won with what was almost a double shutout, 6-1 and 6-0. Osborn hurled his fourth victory in a row in the opener.

Sacramento shut out the Hollywood Stars in the Sunday opener 4-0, Freitas doing the honors for his eleventh win of the season. In the curtailed nightcap, the Stars won 6-2.

Sow at Veterans Hospital Bears Record Litter of Nineteen Pigs

Nineteen little pigs were born this week, to the big, red Duroc sow at the Roseburg Veterans Hospital pig farm in a record-sized litter, Dr. George E. Melvin, hospital manager, announced.

Not all the little ones survived, however, for the mother sow stepped on and killed a few of her offspring soon after they were born. The wrinkled, bare-skinned creatures left are making their home in their mother's stall at the hospital's spottless piggery.

In about nine to 10 months, these same little pigs will mature into hogs weighing close to 190 pounds and ready for slaughter. Sixty to 80 per cent of the pork and brook products used at the hospital are home grown, Dr. Melvin pointed out.

The pig farm has a stock of close to 140 pigs, counting all the

Brooklyn Defeats Braves as St. Louis Drops Two Games

Four games ahead prior to yesterday, the Brooklyn Dodgers gained a game and a half on St. Louis by whipping the Boston Braves for the fourth straight time 4-1, while the esilar-dwelling Pittsburgh Pirates were dealing the Cards a double defeat, 4-3 and 1-0.

The Dodgers sewed up the game early, jumping on Mort Cooper for four consecutive hits, good for three runs, in the first frame. They added another in the fourth, while Rex Barney, pitching his first complete game for Brooklyn, was vulnerable only in the seventh when Southworth's fifth placers scored their only run.

The Cards lost a couple of heartbreakers, dropping the first game to Ostermueller, 39-year-old veteran southpaw who scattered 11 safeties for his seventh victory. Kiner's 10th homer with one on in the fourth proved the deciding blow. The Bucs won the nightcap in the last of the ninth when Catcher Baker singled in the only run of the game with two away to enable Strincovich to register his second straight shutout triumph.

Box, Senators Split
Led by Catcher Wagner, who banged a pair of homers, the Boston Red Sox routed a trio of Senator moundsmen with 15 hits to win the opener 15-8. The Nats came back to rip the Sox 9-2 in the afterpiece. The Sox are now 8½ games ahead of New York.

Jost, formerly of Roseburg, now a colonel, to be commissioned as a major, and Clair L. Shirey, also a former Roseburg resident, now holding temporary commission as a major, to be a first lieutenant.

It was "meanie" vs. "meanie" in the headliner of the wrestling program at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night. The victor was Bruno Angelo, two falls out of three, and the loser was Mike Nazarian. First and third falls went to Bruno in the respective periods of 7:10 and 6:30, the first on a hammerlock and leg storm, the deciding one with a Boston crab. Nazarian got fall No. 2 in 6:05 with a half Boston crab after each grappler took turns throwing each other out of the ring, plus divers and sundry other tactics prohibited by the book of rules. A crowd of more than 800 was on hand for the festivities.

Supporting bouts on the card introduced two newcomers to the fans. One was Mel Peters, a whiskered grappler of the villain type, who lost to Joe Lynam in the only fall of the semi-final. An abdominal stretch did the trick in 21:05. In the remaining period of the 30-minute bout, neither man gained a fall. Lynam clamped on three more abdominal holds, but Peters saved himself each time by lunging into the security of the ropes, the last time just as the gong ended the combat.

Joe Szabo, a Hungarian, was the other performer to give the local wrestling addicts a sample of his ability. He went down to defeat, however, before the kidney punching technique of Billy McEuin, who registered the only scheduled fall in 16:10.

Wind Velocity Heavy
Wind velocity in Roseburg yesterday reached a high of 31 miles per hour for a period of five minutes, beginning at 4:34 P. M. Friday, the weather bureau here said. An extreme of 32 m.p.h. was reached briefly. The high wind velocity was attributed to the general turbulence following a cold front.

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
