'Canyon Passage' Background to Be Accurate in Detail

Hollywood, always a stickler for accuracy as well as its action, literally as well as figuratively went to town in background research for Portland writer Ernest Haycox's pioneer-days thriller "Canyon Passage." Movie Director Jacques Tourneur, famed even in Hollywood as a stickler for authenticity in his pictures, spent months doing research on Oregon life as it was in the middle 1800's, followed with an extensive trip down the picturesque Willamette and Umpqua valleys from Portland to Jacksonville to observe first hand, the locale of the Haycox novel and pick out location spots for future shooting.

The Adams Express Co. office, which appears in the opening scenes of the film, is an example of how this research led to perfection of detail. The equipment and furnishings, even to the pictures on the wall, were reproduced exactly as they were in the original expansion office in Jacksonville, which has been preserved by the state as a monument to the past.

The little log mission at Diamond Lake featured in certain scenes, however, is not a set. The building is the actual mission, built in 1809 by the forest rangers—one of the first structures erected in the Umpqua National Forest—and still standing. Parts of the original Old Oregon Trail, which have remained intact to the present date, figure in the background of the movie, which was filmed in Technicolor in southern Oregon's scenic grandeur.

Smoking Cars to Have Air Purity

NEW YORK—Railroad cars free of odor despite tobacco smoke, and the other incidents of long-distance travel are promised as another transportation improvement by a New York firm of air research engineers.

Apparatus developed for installation with ordinary air conditioning equipment, which controls only temperature and humidity, is a sort of enlarged gas mask. Principal ingredient is carbon, which has a long-known affinity for absorbing gases (all smells are gases) and other air impurities.

According to W. B. Connor Engineering Corp., 80 per cent of the several thousand new passenger cars under contract include carbon air purification in their design. When materials can be obtained in sufficient quantities, manufacture of carbon air purifiers for home and office is promised.

U. S. Troops Break Up Red Riot in Trieste

TRIESTE, July 1.—(AP)—American troops tonight broke up a mob attacking communist party headquarters as rioting raged through this disputed Adriatic port city for the second successive day. There was no sign that the violence was subsiding. At least five American soldiers

had been wounded in disturbances yesterday.

Six men and a woman were shot today in riots between pro-Slav and anti-Slav groups in this city, claimed both by Italy and Yugoslavia.

The tight strike continued in Trieste and the mood of the Italian and Yugoslav sympathizers appeared to be growing uglier.

Sensitivity May Be Due to Bodily Disproportions

NEW YORK—If you're a moody fellow or don't like the social life it may be partly the result of being underweight or having big hands.

In a research investigation conducted with 253 young men as specimens and reported in the Journal of the American Medical Association, studies were made of the possible relationship between body build and personality.

Men with bodily disproportions including unusual height for weight, shoulders broad for chest circumference, head large for size of chest and oversize hands "were found to have a greater frequency of certain dominant personality traits, indicating lesser stability, lesser integration, greater sensitivity and lesser capacity for making easy social adjustments," the report said.

Conversely, it was found that men with traits indicating personality soundness or stability had fewer disproportions in physique than the average of the whole group.

The experiment report carried a warning, however, that the theory requires verification and further study.

OPA Suits Faced By Four Groceries

Suits against four Roseburg groceries for alleged violations of price ceiling regulations were filed by the OPA Monday in the Douglas county circuit court.

Two suits were filed against E. L. Palmer and Palmer's Grocery and costs of legal action, amounting to \$50, were asked. The OPA asked that R. H. Franks, owner of Bob Franks' Grocery, and A. D. Campbell and Wallace Mull, operators of Wally's Cash Grocery, be enjoined from selling above ceiling price, and general costs of legal action are sought.

All alleged violations of the OPA code occurred on or about February 7, the OPA charged.

Welcome OPA Death By Reducing Prices

MILWAUKEE, Wis., July 1.—(AP)—Removal of OPA ceilings was welcomed enthusiastically by S. L. Gordon, men's clothing store owner.
