## Monarchs Down Veterans; Elks Blank Taverners

The Monarchs upheld their undefeated record last night by topping the Veterans Facility softball nine 7-3 in an exciting contest marred by numerous Vets errors which accounted for the margin of the victory. In the second half of the doubleheader the Elks Club provided the first shut-out of the season in downing Pastime Taverners of Sutherlin, 8-0.

Introducing Virgil Sanders on the mound, the Monarchs began the scoring with a triple by Rice which scored Mills, who had reached first base on an error. Ward and Mills tallied in the fourth on a hit and two errors to up the count to 3-0, only to see the Vets come back in their half of the fourth to knot the count at 3-all on a walk and two hits, the climaxing blow being a triple by Wells.

A home run by Bill Scherner on a misjudged drive in the fifth gave the Monarchs the lead which they held throughout the remainder of the game. In the sixth the Ward-Mills combination scored again on three Vets errors and Sanders' triple. Sanders, in turn, came home on another error to wind up the score 7-3. Stellar pitching for Freebin, who replaced Duke Dennison in the seventh, kept the Vets in the thick of the battle, retiring the Monarchs in order in the last two innings. Dennison struck out nine in the five innings he worked.

 In the second game the Elks shutout the Sutherlin team with a cold 8-0 victory, upholding their new start of two straight victories in the second half of the summer series.

Featuring a six-run rally in the sixth inning while leading throughout by 1-0, the Elks sewed the game up with Selfarth clouting a triple to push over two runs, Lovelin making a round tripper on a double and an error, and a single by Todd, which brought two more Elks' runs in. McMullen scored the final run in the seventh with a single, two stolen bases and an error. Stellar pitching by Reitman high-lighted the contest. ## Reedsport Line-up For Liquor Draws Rationing Urge

REEDSPORT—That the present liquor distribution method through agencies and stores of the Oregon State Liquor Control Commission is a "disgrace" to the state, was set forth in a letter from directors of the Reedsport Chamber of Commerce to the commission this week.

It was pointed out that long before the designated hour for the opening of the liquor store each day, a long queue of prospective purchasers, both men and women, gathers in front of the store and blocks the entrance and the street. Many persons are seen in the line again and again, making second and third purchases of liquor, thus causing an unequal distribution.

When the amount of liquor set aside for a certain sale is exhausted, it is "invariably the habitual buyers of liquor" who have been first in line, while those at the end of the queue are cut off and denied the opportunity of purchasing liquor.

It has been noted that habitual purchasers resell their liquor to those who have been unable to buy, it was stated. Directors of the Reedsport chamber urged that the commission return to a rationing of liquor or adopt some other method to curb and better equalize present liquor distribution.
