National Program Of Conservation Set for Next Year

Key feature of the national outline of 1947 agricultural conservation practices announced last week is the increased responsibility placed on county and state committees for adapting the national program to meet local conservation needs. The national outline has been formulated from county and state recommendations which meet the specifications of the legislation authorizing federal payments to aid farmers and ranchers with practices needed to conserve soil and water resources.

From the national outline, the state PMA committee will select practices needed to meet conservation problems within the state, establishing rates of payment designed to achieve maximum results from the amount of funds available. As a guide, a survey of conservation needs within the state was completed this spring. It is a fundamental operating principle of the agricultural conservation program to use available funds to promote needed practices not now being performed in adequate volume to meet the conservation problem. A technical committee composed of representatives of the Soil Conservation Service and other agencies directly concerned with conservation assists the state PMA committee in fitting the national program to state needs.

A further aid in adapting the national program to local conservation needs has been provided in the 1947 ACA program by authorizing county AAA committees to select a sound soil or water conservation practice not included in the national practice list, which will meet a definite conservation need within the county. Ten per cent of the funds allocated to a county may be used for payments to farmers for carrying out the

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Dop in Hog Production In Fall Is Indicated

Hog production in 1946 is expected to drop sharply with the fall pig crop, USDA's June 21 pig crop report reveals. Breeding intentions indicate a decrease of 16 per cent from a year ago in the number of sows to farrow this fall. This figure of 4,633,000 head is 39 per cent below the 1943 record crop, and the smallest since 1938. When added to the 52,324,000 pigs farrowed this spring, the production for the year is expected to be six per cent under 1945. Fewer sows farrowed this spring than last, but farmers saved a record number of pigs per litter. Hog production is expected to fall off most in the western half of the nation.

Maximum Prices for Apple Crop Announced

New maximum prices for apples from the beginning of the 1946 season until August 31 will be \$3.60 per standard box of bushel loaded on car or truck at shipping points, the Office of Price Administration has announced. September and October prices will be \$3.08. The new prices, effective June 12, are based on increased production and packing costs and average

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
