Hager, Kiser Will Battle on Next Wrestling Card

Wrestling fans welcomed the news that one of their top grappling favorites, Tex Hager, would return to action at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night. Hager has just returned from Chicago where he has been a main-eventer and amassed an enviable record of triumphs throughout the Midwest.

Hager will be matched in Saturday's semi-final bout against Jack Kiser, former coast light-heavyweight champion. Both are fleet-footed, scientific matmen and one of the best fundamental wrestling exhibitions of the summer season is anticipated by local fans.

The Hager-Kiser match, however, will be forced to take second billing to a rough-and-tumble skirmish between Bruno Angelo and Walter Achlu. With a title match against Georges Dusette, coast junior heavyweight king, on the block for the winner, both matmen are expected to go all out in striving for a triumph. The villainous Italian will probably resort to any illegal tactics in gaining his point and Angelo is quite capable with his dukes.

To balance the inevitable fist-cuffs, Achlu will probably resort to jiu-jitsu. The Chinese matman will probably be forced to call on his great store of experience to measure Angelo. The former Dayton University football backfield star will, without a question, be the popular favorite, but with so much at stake the two men will enter the ring on even terms as far as the wagering is concerned. Angelo, who still holds the coast light-heavyweight gonfalon, is determined to defeat Achlu to enable him to attempt a reversal against Dusette, the French-Canadian who lifted the junior-heavy crown from his brow several weeks ago.

A three-round boxing exhibition, featuring local talent, will open the program at 8:30 P. M. Jack Poppenheimer will referee all matches.
