never exciting) to spend money for.

AFTER all, money is worth only what it will BUY. When it won't buy much, it isn't worth much. When money isn't regarded as being worth much, people are inclined to gamble recklessly.

(No one who has seen the fantastic poker games in depreciated money countries will doubt that for a moment.)

If we are to think straight on economic matters, we must always remember that plenty of money means prosperity only when accompanied by an EQUAL PLENTY OF THINGS.

When THINGS are scarce (no matter how plentiful money may be) it means a low standard of living. Only an abundance of things, reasonably well distributed among all kinds of people, can bring high standards of living.

Unfortunately, our standards of living have been DECLINING since the early days of the war. They will continue to decline as long as production remains inadequate.

Demagogues may rant about voting ourselves rich until they are black in the face, but all their ranting won't change this fundamental fact by so much as the width of a hair.

WITH the Fourth over, we get back to the big question of the moment: "Will or won't OPA be restored?"

If OPA isn't restored, what will happen?
What is happening, without OPA?

WELL, Dunn & Bradstreet, whose reports are intended for business men and not for politicians, says that in this first OPA-less week trade has been about normal (as compared, that is, with business when OPA was functioning).

So far as this business-reporting firm can see, there have been neither buyer strikes nor any rush to "stockpile" goods. Department stores say they have seen no evidence of hoarding.

Many industries report GAINS IN OUTPUT.

THE market reports list generally rising prices. MEAT, in particular.
But spokesmen for the meat industry assert that meat prices in LEGITIMATE business establishments are still BELOW black market price levels and will begin to slip downward as more meat gets into LEGITIMATE channels.

It has been conservatively estimated that over the country as a whole as much as half the available meat supply has been diverted into black market channels.

That is to say, black market meat prices HAVE BEEN HIGH IN THE PAST but haven't been available for quotation and comparison because the trade has been illegal.

SO, you see, the rise in meat prices on the LEGITIMATE market isn't as great as it SEEMS to be. It is merely catching up with the price millions of people have been PAYING.

ACCESS ROADS PROPOSED

An earnest argument for construction of access roads into Forest Service timber in Oregon and Washington is contained in an article "Why You Can't Buy a Home" by author Robert Ormond Case, appearing in the July 6 issue of *The Saturday Evening Post*. Author Case, in addition to pointing out that roads to make Forest Service timber accessible to starving sawmills, belabours the OPA for its unrealistic pricing program which, he contends, is seriously retarding production needed for construction of homes.

The access road program is a matter of extreme interest to the sawmill industry in Douglas County. Of Douglas County's 70-billion feet of standing timber, 45 billion feet is publicly owned—23 billion within the Umpqua National Forest and 22 billion held by the O.C. Administration.

The Umpqua National Forest alone is capable, according to Forest Service estimates, of a sustained yield cut amounting to approximately 148 million board feet annually.

The Little River area, the first to be opened up by access roads, is approaching its maximum sustained yield limit of 43 million feet per year, but the North Umpqua area capable of a sustained yield cut of approximately 100 million feet annually, has barely been touched because of inaccessibility.

The O.C. Administration estimates its lands will support a sustained yield cut of 145 million board feet per year while mature, old-growth timber is being removed, with a perpetual yield cut of 134 million after the mature and over-ripe stock is cut. Access roads are of somewhat less importance on O.C. lands than on the national forest, as the grant lands are in closer proximity to county roads. But in some areas access roads are essential to efficient operation.

Plans for extension of the Little River road to open up additional timber reserves already are well advanced, while development of the North Umpqua area is anticipated in the near future, through expenditure of large sums of money on road construction. Extent of the construction program will be largely determined by the amount of money made available for the projects by the Congress.

Loud demands are being made in the State of Washington, where privately-owned timber lands are almost totally exhausted, that the Forest Service open the great Olympic National Forest to more extensive cutting. Author Case points out in his *Saturday Evening Post* article, that an observer can stand on the roof of one of Portland's taller buildings and look upon two of Oregon's largest sawmills, now closed and in process of being dismantled, while, only a few miles distant lies the untouched Clackamas National Forest.

The public should be constantly aware of one great danger in the existing situation of short timber supply. Strong pressure will be exerted by powerful interests to force opening of public timber lands for cutting at a greater rate than capacity will permit under a perpetual program. Before we open our timber reservoirs to commercial operations we should establish a definite program for sustained yield management—a program which should be rigidly enforced, regardless of political pressure. The Forest Service has been lagging in setting up its sustained yield operation. The O.C. Administration, although some faults may be found in its proposals, is much further advanced in its long range management scheme than is the Forest Service. We need immediate action by the Forest Service in translating its sustained yield policies into action, which will restore new life to an industry starving in the midst of plenty.

vanished wheat subsidy. Remember that a subsidy of 15 cts. per pound was paid on butter.)

It is apparent to any clear thinker that any rise in price because of the loss of a subsidy isn't a REAL rise, because the subsidy came out of taxes that everybody has to pay.

THE situation may yet get out of hand. We may have to return to control of prices—at least in some form. But in these days when because of the spectacular political collapse of price control we are struggling to readapt our economy to the normal free market system, let's at least keep clear in our minds what is happening.

The experiment forced upon us by the quarrel among the politicians is at least working better, when ALL is considered, than might have been expected.

Christopher Still Tops Coast League's Batters

LOS ANGELES, July 9.—(AP)—For the eleventh straight week, Los Angeles' Lefty Christopher paced the Pacific Coast League's batters. The Angel slugger boasted a mark of .328, three points better than Hollywood's Culley Rikard, through games of last Friday.

The mark represented a four-point drop from Christopher's average the previous week. Rikard pushed Brooks Holder of Oakland down to third place. Scarsella, Oakland, retained slugging honors with 21 homers and 81 runs batted in.

The league-leading Oaks, for the first time this season, went into the team batting lead with a mark of .258, replacing Los Angeles.

Salary Boost for Air Pilots Recommended

WASHINGTON, July 9.—(AP)—A presidential emergency board yesterday recommended a pay increase of \$750 a year for first pilots in international airline service.

The board was created in an effort to avert a threatened strike by pilots on Transcontinental and Western Air Lines, Inc. It suggested that its findings provide a pattern for all the major airlines.

Softball Funds To Be Used For Buying Equipment

In announcing tonight's double-header softball game at the local ball park, H. W. Gray stressed that all gate proceeds for these semi-weekly games are used for purchasing new equipment for the teams and urged local fans to support their city league.

Any funds remaining when the city league schedule is completed go toward buying equipment for the city playgrounds.

Tonight's games, recently moved up to begin promptly at 7 o'clock for local fans' convenience, include the Veterans' Facility nine against the Associated Service team, and Sutherland against the Rainbow Grill club.

The Associated nine, which almost upset the league-leading Monarchs last week, boast an even stronger lineup for the second-half of summer play with the addition of its four Baker brothers, Ward Cummings, Jr. and Bob and Jack Loomis, and promise to give the highly touted Veterans nine a tough match.

In the second contest the Rainbow Grillers play their first game of the second-half tourney against the Pastime Tavern of Sutherland. The latter team finished up second in the past league series, but fell to the Elks Club last week to lower them to third place in the present standings.

Seals Continue at Heels of Oakland, League's Leaders

With the monotony of a greyhound chasing a fake rabbit, the San Francisco Seals continued their challenge today a pace behind the Oakland Oaks, bringing up the question of how they manage to dog the heels of the Pacific Coast Baseball League's pace-setting sluggers.

One of the answers—depth in pitchers—made itself obvious during the campaign just completed with the stepping to the front of Harrell and Rosso.

Rosso came through spectacularly Sunday with a one-hit mound performance to blank the Los Angeles Angels, 6 to 0. Although his pitching had never before drawn such notice, it has been as productive through most of the season.

In 18 games Rosso, ex-New York Giant, tossed as a relief hurler, performing creditably in most of them, before he started for the first time this season July 1. He has won six games and lost two.

Harrell, who shut out the Angels, 8 to 0, last week, likewise has graduated from a relief role to a full part. The two former dugout firemen together have pitched 30 consecutive scoreless frames.

Manager Stengel's Oaklanders have the advantage of weaker opposition this week, but that hasn't helped them shake the Seals in comparable situations.

The Oaks open a series tonight against last-ranking Seattle, having defeated them 5-3 last night in an exhibition game played at Spokane as a benefit for the families of nine players of the Spokane team, Western International League, who lost their lives in a bus accident last month.

San Francisco entertains the San Diego Padres, standing in fifth place, and Sacramento takes on the Beavers at Portland tonight. Hollywood will open a series with the Angels at Los Angeles in a doubleheader Wednesday.
