Free and heavy hitting was the feature of last night's drawn-out doubleheader of the City Softball League. Shutting out the Associated Oilers 19-0 through six innings, the Veterans Facility finally settled for a final tally of 19-3.

In the second game, a similar high scoring contest, the Pastime Taverners nine from Sutherland outclassed the Rainbow Grill to the tune of 15-9.

The Vets took over from the first inning by loading the bases and receiving a gift walk across the homeplate from Associated's pitcher, Walton. In the second frame the Vets added four more runs, headed by a homerun by Third baseman Beet.

A series of solen bases, heavy hitting, and numerous errors on the Associated club led to a 19-0 lead at the top half of the seventh.

The Associated men finally stopped the Vets' triumphant shutout in the last of the seventh on a steal homered by Stephens, a walk by M. Baker, and a single and steal by V. Baker, both brought in by Catcher Huggins' double, ending the final score at 19-3.

The second game, more interesting, but as drawn-out as the first, saw both teams hitting the moundsmen freely, with Shapiro banging a 3-run homer in the first inning. Sutherland returned the same inning to score one run through a hit by Plueard which brought Roundtree scoring.

Tied 4-4 through the third frame, Sutherland broke ahead and retained the lead throughout with five runs in the fifth, retiring the Rainbow hurler, Hopkins, in favor of Sanstead, who continued their lead, topping off the seventh with four more runs.

price controls.

Taft's assertion, made in debate over the bill to restore OPA controls which died July 1, brought Barkley to his feet with a sharp protest.

"Every time the names of Mr. Porter or Mr. Bowles are mentioned," Barkley said, "the senator from Ohio reacts as though somebody put an atomic bomb under his chair."

Price Administrator Porter and Chester Bowles who recently resigned as stabilization director, have been leading advocates of retaining price controls for another year.

Taft said that while OPA appeals for public support of price controls were "skillfully prepared," it was his opinion that they constituted propaganda to bring pressure on Congress.

He said any use of government funds by any agency to influence Congress is forbidden by statute. However, the Republican leader promised to do "everything possible" to restore rent controls. He said he is firmly convinced that the people and congress are going to insist on it.

Taft said that if the measure fails to be enacted he would throw his strength behind a separate rent control resolution.
