were strewn among the wreckage. Charred and torn parachutes, unopened, lay in piles. There also were Navy pea jackets, burned shoes, wallets, blankets, and several letters. Army officials said the letters

were destined for the United States from the overseas service men.

Westover airfield officials said identification of the dead would be impossible for an indefinite period.

Trees Hewn Down

Most of the bodies were badly dismembered by the impact of the crash that heaved down trees a foot in diameter.

The Holyoke fire department said a heavy downpour of rain that immediately followed the accident probably prevented a serious forest fire.

Westover reported that the plane radioed ten minutes before it hit that everything was "fine" and that it would be in within ten minutes. Nothing was heard from it again until the Army received word of the crash.

U. S. Opposes Russian Grab in Austrian Zone

ment was certain to have the heaviest repercussions in Austria, where the Red Army's sudden order transferring a large share of Austria's industrial potential to the Soviet Union had caused consternation.

The pronouncement concluded with these words: "The United States government also wishes to make clear that it will recognize no physical transfer of property as conforming to the terms of the Potsdam agreement which does not also conform to the terms of the United Nations' declaration on forced transfer of January, 1943, and which does not leave to Austria the sovereign control of an independent country over the resources within its borders, which was envisioned in the Moscow declaration of 1943."

There was no immediate reaction to the United States note from the Russians, but Austrian government sources expressed great satisfaction.

Properties claimed by the Russians represent a large proportion of Austrian industrial capacity and their loss at this time would be a severe blow to the Austrian economy.

said congressmen who helped scuttled price control have "double-crossed American workmen" by emancipating the one bulwark against inflation.

Consumer reaction to milk price advance from 15 to 16 cents a quart was reported by W. F. Rollins, vice-president of the Oregon Milk Distributors' Association.

"Consumption is falling a little," he said. "There is no question that there is some resentment over it."

Grocers reported butter wholesalers yesterday were suddenly able to supply "all the butter you want," but some retailers reported the higher prices left many pounds unsold in coolers at closing time.

NEW YORK, July 10.—(AP)—Dun & Bradstreet, Inc., reported today its weekly wholesale food price index advanced 34 cents this week to a new 26-year high. The index of 31 food commodities was \$4.88, based on the cost per pound of each item, compared with \$4.54 a week ago, and \$4.09 a year ago. The advance in two years was 53 cents, and in the year was 79 cents. The previous high was \$4.89 June 10, 1920.
