### Play Equipment At Rose Park Will Have 3 Additions

Climaxing this week's playground activities at the Rose park on Hamilton Street will be the opening of a horseshoe pitching pit, a volleyball court and a softball diamond. These activities, under the direction of the local recreation department, will begin at 10 A. M. Saturday.

Due to the current warm weather, attendance has slackened during the past week over that of two weeks ago, when the playground opened. Edna Pope, playground supervisor, said, but with regular Saturday contests and new activities scheduled weekly for the rest of the summer months, a regular following of youngsters is expected.

Regular teams of horseshoe pitching, volleyball and softball will be formed for weekly competition with prizes and cash awards for the winners as soon as thorough instructions are taught by the supervisors.

Emphasizing the value of this playground, H. W. Gray issued the following statement to all Roseburg parents of children from the ages of four to fourteen:

"The playground is a place of action, not passive enjoyment of the activities of others. Every right-minded person wants his child to be healthy, safe and good, and he wants him or her to be happy. The playground is a place of happiness for countless local youngsters, but many more can safely be handled daily. Some

children are more active than others and have no trouble in taking part in vigorous games and athletics. Others are aggressively swinging or using the slides while still others are playing in the sandboxes. Our program is planned to be many-sided so that the shy child as well as the aggressive one will be drawn out and developed. In such satisfying activities, the child finds happiness in a safe environment."
