Major tests facing the Senate today include an attempt by Senator Taft to reinstate his price-boosting profit provision which drew chief White House fire in the veto message and several proposals dealing with rent controls that expired along with OPA.

Following up its 49 to 26 vote Tuesday to keep meat free of OPA ceilings under any revival, the chamber voted these additional touch-not provisions yesterday and last night:

1. Milk and all other dairy products, an amendment sponsored by Senator Wherry and approved 51 to 27.
2. Cottonseed, soy beans and their products, by Senator Eastland, 42 to 34.
3. Petroleum and its products as long as supply exceeds domestic demand, by Senator Moore, 40 to 38.

Husband Shoots Model, Then Tries Suicide

PHOENIX, Ariz., July 11.—(AP)—Margaret Wheatle Farley Wickware, 30, attractive former New York model and magazine cover girl, was shot and wounded three times Tuesday night as she sat at a bridge table with friends.

Sheriff E. W. Roach said her estranged husband, Reid King Wickware, 38, bar owner, shot the woman and then wounded himself in the chest before the horrified gaze of his wife's friends.

Mrs. Wickware was reported in a serious condition today. Wickware was shot above the heart and his condition, too, was serious.

Mrs. Wickware filed suit for divorce charging cruelty, last Saturday, but the case was dismissed yesterday.

As Wickware lay on the floor, Tony Silva, sheriff's ambulance man reported, he rolled over, looked at his wife and said:

"Aren't you dead yet, after all that lead I pumped into you?"

On the other hand, the civilian agencies—legislative, judicial and executive—will cost "a little more than \$2,000,000,000 or 6 per cent of total expenditures." If major economies are to come, Steelman said, they "must be sought elsewhere."

Steelman left off his report with the announcement that "production of over-the-counter consumer goods for the first half of 1946 was the highest in either peace or war."

And until June 30—when OPA expired—"runaway inflation had been prevented," Steelman said.

But today, we are threatened with the loss of the controls which we have used to maintain stabilization and to protect production," the report continued.

Shortages Still Faced

Other highlights of the report: Food—Consumption of meats, vegetables and milk is well above 1941, and in general shortages will continue through the year.

Jobs—"One of the most encouraging aspects of our reconstruction effort," unemployment has stayed low despite heavy discharges of soldiers and sailors, while civilian labor force has climbed to 57,600,000.

Income—Total income paid to individuals during the first three months of this year was at an annual rate of \$157,000,000,000, less than 3.5 percent below the boom-time wartime level.

Materials—"Serious shortages" of iron steel, copper, lead and tin, caused in large part by strikes. New production is rising rapidly.

Famine relief—Americans still must conserve food, for Europe will need help for "at least another year." This means, for the consumer, continued shortages of cereals and meats; for the farmer, a continued high demand for food.

Housing—"Through May" the country was 34 per cent along the way toward its goal of 1,200,000 new dwellings started in 1946; total construction is at a higher level than at any time since 1943, when war construction was at its height.

S. and Great Britain hold dominant positions in the world."

Portlanders Spurn Costlier Food Items

PORTLAND, July 11.—(AP)—Shoppers are refusing to buy many food items that have risen in price, H. E. Carlson, secretary of the Oregon Independent Retail Grocers' and Meat Dealers' Association, reported today.

"There has been a very noticeable drop off in buying in the items on which the prices have been raised," he said.

Most sales are "below those of rationing days" and butter at 78 cents and higher a pound has not been selling.

There were hints in prices bid at the North Portland livestock market that retail prices of some meat cuts may go higher. Choice barrows and gilt hogs sold yesterday for \$19.50, highest since Sept. 1920 and beef, sheep and calves were steady to slightly higher.

Egg prices on AA grades and extra large advanced two cents and smaller sizes were up one cent a dozen wholesale yesterday.

NEW YORK, July 11.—(AP)—Prices of some shoes have advanced an average of 8 to 9 per cent this week, industry sources said today.

The increase, manufacturers said, represents an advance approved by the OPA which would have gone into effect July 8 had that agency continued. It includes footwear not covered in an OPA ceiling increase granted on low-end shoes in May.

Tanners' prices have advanced 20 to 30 per cent over the OPA ceilings this week, industry sources said, due to advancing raw materials cost, with cattle hide increases put at approximately 25 per cent.

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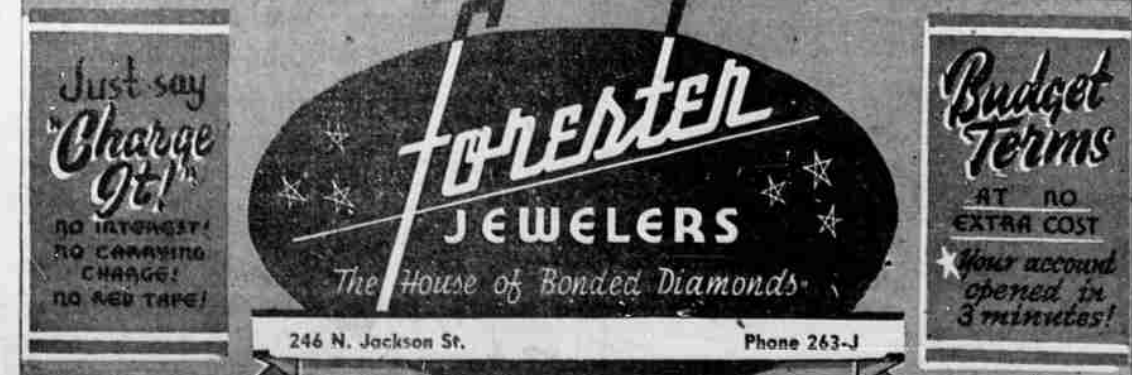
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
