

C. A. Brand Writes Of His Interesting Trip, Class Reunion

Daily airplane trips from the Pacific Coast to New York and Washington, D. C. in less than a day are the rule now, and demand for reservations is so heavy that people are asked to secure them at least two weeks in advance. On his recent trip to Washington, Brand took the plane at Portland at 6:15 P. M. and arrived at Washington the next afternoon. When asked how he liked traveling by plane he replied: "Very much, because I saved four days time, and the expense is no more than traveling by rail when you figure cost of berth, meals, tips, etc. You are requested not to give tips on the plane. The meals are very fine and are all free, and, as a super inducement to the rising generation to travel by plane, chewing gum is handed out free after each meal! Only for a few minutes was the air so bumpy that the passengers were threatened with seasickness."

Mr. Brand spent two weeks visiting his daughter, Miss Katharine Brand, who has a very interesting position in the Library of Congress, Division of Manuscripts. She also had charge of classification and filing of the enormous collection of Woodrow Wilson papers and documents of that period.

Guests of Lawmakers
While in Washington Mr. Brand and his daughter were dinner guests of the Harris Ellsworths and Senator Wayne Morse, formerly Dean of the U. of O. Law School; met our Senator Guy Cordon, and attended several sessions of the Senate and House.

Mr. Brand started home by way of New York where he and Miss Brand spent several days, and where they visited Justice James T. Brand's daughter, Mrs. Asmusen, on Long Island. He also had a very pleasant visit at the headquarters of the Community Concerts Service, with which the Roseburg Association is affiliated. They were given complimentary tickets to the National Broadcasting Co. concert hall to hear the weekly broadcast of the Firestone Hour. They visited the Empire State building—the tallest building in the world—from which Mr.

Brand avers he could almost see the Medical Arts building in Roseburg, where the News-Review is located!

Attends Class Reunion

From New York it was a one-night trip to Oberlin, Ohio, to attend the 51st reunion of the Oberlin College class of '95, and to visit his two sisters who are now living in the Brand home on South Professor St. "Twenty-one members of the class were present," said Mr. Brand, "and many of them just as full of the devil as ever. But so was my sister, Mary, who introduced me to a group of friends by saying, 'This is my brother who has come back to attend his 95th class reunion.' I know mental arithmetic was beginning to take place and they were figuring I must have been about twenty when I graduated, and that, added to the ninety-five reunions, would make me 115 years old. Nobody said a word and I corrected the statement, but what they really believe I shall never know."

Heat Ordeal Eased

"From Oberlin the route was through Chicago and Kansas City to Oklahoma City for a couple of days with another sister, Mrs. James J. Hayes, and then by the southern route back to Roseburg. Much of the way it was impossible to get a sleeper, and the heat, as we rode for hours through the most God-forsaken desert land, was terrific. The passengers in the chair cars took off about everything the law allows in the way of clothes. And one method of getting relief from the heat on a train which I had never seen before but which added an

air of refinement to the scene and will doubtless spread to other parts of the country, deserves special mention. A large number of the people in the car, men and women alike, took off their shoes and stockings and relaxed, not a few of them by resting their feet on top of the backs of the seats in front of them. It was not uncommon to see a dozen feet of all sizes in the air at the same time—many of them practicing little finger exercises. Just to while away the time. It was an inspiring sight. One of the youths actually thumbed his nose at the porter, using his foot instead of his hand. The Northwest has much to learn from its southern neighbors."

"But when the traveler reaches the good old Pacific Coast, it is with a vast sense of relief! The mountains, the rivers, the orchards, the sea breezes—and best of all, our own Oregon! I never had a more wonderful vacation, but I was never in my life so glad to get home."
