Reedsport Denies Plea to Revoke O. K. for Bus Line

REEDSPORT — Senator William E. Walsh of Coos Bay, L. E. Shippey, district traffic manager, and Larry Clemenson, district auditor of the Pacific Greyhound Lines, appeared before a special meeting of the Reedsport Chamber of Commerce last Wednesday in an effort to induce the chamber to rescind its recommendation that a franchise be granted the All American Bus Lines for operation through Oregon over the Coast Highway.

Shippey and Clemenson presented figures to support the Greyhound contention that there is not sufficient patronage to justify entrance of another bus line into this territory. They were supported by Senator Walsh.

Reedsport citizens pointed out that the Southern Pacific Railway had objected, years ago to bus service being established on the same grounds, yet "both lines are still in operation and traffic is increasing."

It was also pointed out that although Pacific Greyhound is operating 11 daily schedules through Reedsport, there is no schedule connecting Reedsport with Roseburg, the county seat; that persons who do come to Roseburg must wait "from 55 minutes to three hours" at Drain for their connection.

It was also pointed out that local citizens cannot travel to the coastal cities south of Reedsport in the morning except by rising at daybreak to catch a bus, and the service to Roseburg via Coos Bay is a "long, tiresome, and unnecessary route to take, and return connections are not well placed."

The local endorsement of a franchise for All American Bus Lines was not withdrawn, it is reported.

Russia Given 14 Billions in War Booty, Wants More

PARIS, July 12.—(AP)—Secretary of State Byrnes said in a statement on German reparations today that the Russians already have received directly or indirectly \$14,000,000,000 in territory and equipment.

The Russians through Foreign Minister Molotov demanded \$10,000,000,000 reparations of Germany earlier this week. Byrnes acknowledged that an accurate valuation was difficult, but he said the detachment of Eastern Germany, including Silesia, as decided at the Potsdam conference, placed \$14,000,000,000 worth of German property under Soviet control.

Under another agreement, this area was placed under Polish administration in compensation for portions of Eastern Poland which Soviet Russia absorbed, the secretary pointed out.

France Wants Saar
The council of foreign ministers heard a proposal by Byrnes for economic unification of Germany but no decision was reached. France demanded that the Saar be excluded from the unification and integrated into French economy, and Russia asked more time to study the Saar, an American informant said.

After the first World War, the 726-square mile Saar territory was placed under a commission responsible to the League of Nations for 15 years, although

France was given absolute possession of its mines as compensation for German destruction in Northern France. In 1935, more than 90 per cent of the 770,000 people of the Saar voted to return to Germany in one of Hitler's earliest territorial gains. The Saar was the scene of some of Gen. George S. Patton's most spectacular victories during the recent war.

Sealed bids will be received by the Regional Forester, Portland, Oregon, on and not later than 2:00 p.m. July 22, 1946, for all the live timber marked or designated for cutting, and all merchantable dead timber located on an area embracing about 1450 acres within Sections 25 and 36, T. 28 S., R. 1 E., and Sections 19, 20, 29 and 30, T. 28 S., R. 2 E., W.M., Quartz Creek area, Umpqua National Forest, Oregon, estimated to be 300,000 feet B.M., more or less, of ponderosa pine, 12,100,000 feet B.M., more or less, of sugar pine, and an unestimated amount of other species of saw timber.
