

More Jews Killed In Polish Outbreak

WARSAW, July 12.—(AP)—The slaying of 22 Jews attempting to flee a new wave of persecution in Poland was reported today as the government prepared to execute nine persons convicted of instigating the bloody July 4 pogrom at Kielce.

Meanwhile August Cardinal Hlond placed responsibility for "dangerous tensions" in Poland upon Jewish governmental officials.

The cardinal attributed "degradation" in the internal situation in Poland to Jews who today occupy leading positions in Poland's government and try to introduce a governmental structure which a majority of the people do not desire.

All reports indicated that while the government apparently was doing its utmost to afford protection to the Jews, anti-Semitic acts were spreading throughout the country. Even the use of armed cars and the reinforcing of militia and security police by the government have not halted the upsurge of violence.

The Jewish people—those who have known tragedy under the Nazi occupation and those being repatriated by the tens of thousands from Russia—are seeking to protect themselves by massing in semi-stockades situated in various sectors of Poland.

They live in continual fear of their lives. Many do not dare to travel, for it is a daily occurrence for Jews to be dragged from automobiles and coaches by bandits and shot to death.

The government blames the outbreak on "fascist reactionaries" and newspapers generally attribute it to agents of Gen. Anders, who commanded the Polish troops fighting in Italy.

Taft's unsuccessful battle to delete them. These would allow OPA (1) to make "reasonable" adjustments to meet abnormal production conditions; (2) to approve price increases only to expand output in cases where price ceilings broke even with current costs; and (3) to deny increases which might lower the production of scarce items.

The exemptions, Taft contended, would "nullify" directives for necessary price boosts for manufacturers, producers and processors. The purpose of his amendment, he said, was "to get increased production, fill up the shelves and get rid of shortages."

State Rules Rent Controls Proposed OPA revival yesterday when the Senate voted 59 to 20 to give the states rather than the federal government first responsibility in establishing rent controls.

By the vote, it adopted an amendment to the OPA bill declaring that if a state has established rent control regulations of its own, or does so in the future, the federal government would be foreclosed from imposing its own controls.

The amendment, sponsored by Senator Knowland (R-Calif.) and Ferguson (R-Mich.), originally provided that establishment of controls by a political subdivision of a state would bar the federal government from re-establishing its own controls.

That section was knocked out, on motion of Senator Magnuson (D-Wash.), by a vote announced at 4:34.

At his news conference, Mr. Truman declined to say whether he would sign an OPA bill if it came to him with meat, dairy products and various other commodities exempted from price controls, as voted by the Senate.

Before acting on the Knowland-Ferguson amendment, the Senate turned down 58 to 14 a provision which would have let landlords raise rents.

Would Free Grains

Late today New England senators launched an effort to keep price ceilings off feed grains in any renewal of OPA authority.

Senator Bridges said he and others had drafted an amendment to pending OPA revival legislation which would ban controls over wheat and other grains when used for livestock and poultry feeds. It would retain ceilings on flour and cereals.

The Senate rejected 40 to 32 Wednesday a move by Senator Reed to exempt from controls grains and products manufactured from them.

Senator Wherry indicated that he will offer an amendment which would guarantee wholesalers, retailers and distributors the same markups and discounts they enjoyed in 1940.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 12.—(AP)—Northern California rent increases reported to the district OPA since the lifting of federal restrictions have averaged 5 per cent, the OPA said today.

An OPA spokesman said the highest average of reported increases for a community within the district was 23 per cent at Fresno in the central valley.

LANSING, Mich., July 12.—(AP)—The Michigan legislature has approved a limited state rental control law, allowing landlords a 15 per cent increase over June 30 1946, levels.

The measure, now awaiting Gov. Harry F. Kelly's signature, would be effective to Oct. 1, 1946, "or until federal legislation supersedes state action."

At the special session the legislature also voted to place a \$270,000,000 veterans bonus issue on the November ballot, authorizing payments from \$10 to \$15 monthly with a \$500 maximum. No method of financing the bond issue was provided.

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project and had found that: 1. Members of scientific societies there "are very active in support of international civilian control" of atomic materials and are "devoted to the creation of some form of world government."

2. Some officers of the societies "admit communication with persons outside of the United States."

3. "The security officers at Oak Ridge think that the peace and security of the United States is definitely in danger."

Walter C. Beard, Jr., and John H. Bull of the Oak Ridge engineers and scientists said in a statement last night their organization "has at all times remained within the security bounds" defined by the Manhattan district security officer.

"We never have been accused of violating project security," they asserted.

Bikini Report Released

Along with the House committee's report, the lawmakers had a coldly matter-of-fact digest of the damage wrought by the Bikini test bomb. This report, submitted by a special evaluation board composed of scientists and Army and Navy experts, was released by President Truman yesterday.

The experts said that although it exploded some 1500 to 2000 feet west of the target, the

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Bikini bomb behaved about as expected, and that "in general no significant unexpected phenomena occurred."

They listed the ships sunk and damaged and noted: "It should be pointed out that since the targets carried no personnel, the fires were uncontrolled and undoubtedly there was more damage than there would have been under battle conditions."

Costs May Rise Instead

But reconversion officials now estimate that running the government next June 30 will cost about \$42,000,000,000 instead of the Treasury's January estimate of \$35,800,000,000.

As a compensating factor, however, government income has soared, too. Now some government economists think it will go close to \$40,000,000,000 if tax revenues keep pouring in at the present indicated rate—in other words, if business stays good, if strikes are infrequent and tax rates stay high.

But this still leaves a gap of \$2,000,000,000 or \$3,000,000,000 which may prove hard to close, especially in an election year.
