Frances Shaffer Of Canyonville Academy Passes

Frances Adele Shaffer, 58, teacher of music at the Canyonville Bible Academy, died suddenly of a heart attack Saturday evening while visiting friends and relatives in Eugene. She was born April 30, 1888, in Aspen, Colorado, and came with her husband, A. M. Shaffer, to Canyonville in 1923, where they founded a religious institution known as the Canyonville Bible Academy. She was very active in the academy work and much credit was given her for the ever increasing number of new students coming from different parts of the west.

Surviving are her husband, A. M. Shaffer; one son, Robert; two daughters, Mrs. Helen Dunbar and Mrs. Ruth Parker, and nine grandchildren, all of Canyonville.

Funeral services in charge of the Roseburg Funeral Home will be held Wednesday at 2:30 P. M. in the Canyonville Gospel Tabernacle, with Rev. Hilton Park of Cottage Grove officiating. Interment will be in the Canyonville cemetery.

Meetings Set in Douglas County on Farm Labor Wages

Producers of prunes, apples, pears, peaches, filberts, walnuts, melons, tomatoes and other truck crops are requested to attend one of four meetings being held this week for consideration of wage ceilings and labor requirements for 1946 harvesting operations. Wage ceilings established in 1945 for the above mentioned crops are still in effect, states J. Roland Parker, county agricultural agent, and any changes desired by producers will require a petition to be filed with the Oregon USDA Wage Board.

Meetings will be held in the principal production centers of the county for convenience of producers. The first meeting will be held at the Kellogg Grange Hall Tuesday evening, July 16, at 8 o'clock, followed by a meeting at the Coles Valley community hall Wednesday evening, July 17, at 8 o'clock. A meeting at Roseburg will be held Thursday evening, July 18, at 8 o'clock in the Circuit courtroom and the final meeting at the Canyonville community hall Friday, July 19, at 8 o'clock.

Established wage ceilings for 1945 were favorably received by both producers and workers, according to County Agent Parker, and many producers expressed themselves in favor of continuing the established ceilings through the 1946 harvesting season. Uniform wages in all similar harvesting operations resulted in less shifting of workers from job to job, permitted more efficient harvesting and wages of the average worker were more for the season.

Growers are requested to estimate labor requirements for their harvesting operations and report labor needed to assist the County Farm Labor Office in determining labor that must be recruited to meet harvest needs.

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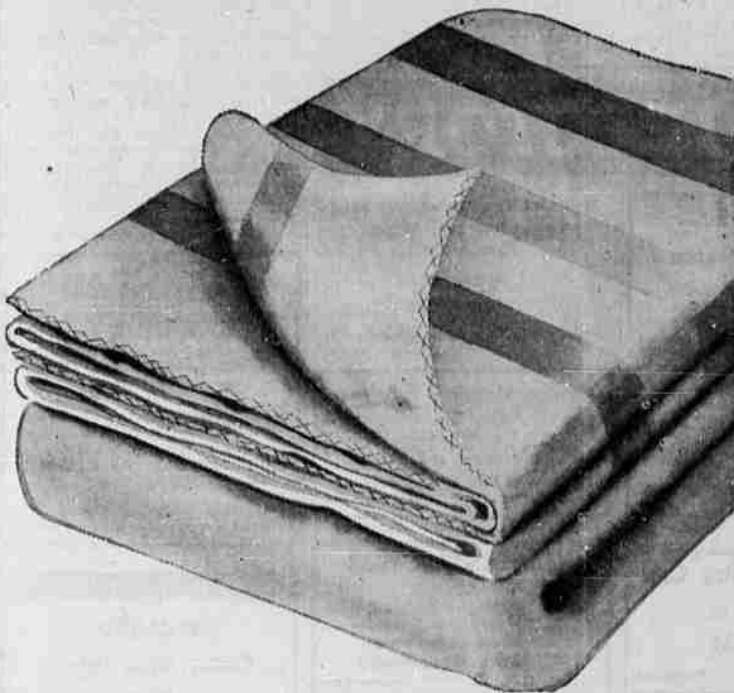

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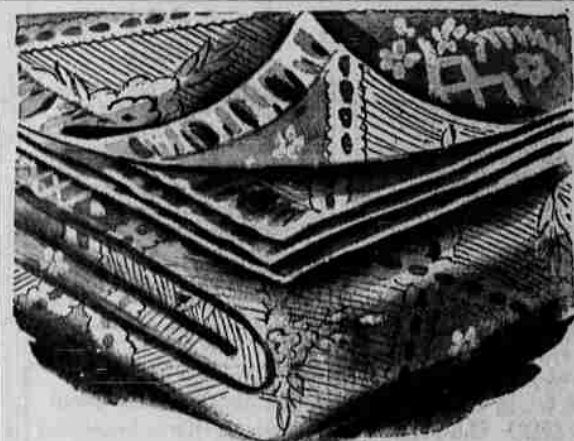
