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Regulations On Draft Deferments Made Tighter

WASHINGTON, July 17.—(AP)—Selective Service yesterday tightened the regulations covering deferment of men aged 19 through 29.

Shortly after President Truman formally authorized the drafting of men in this age span, Selective Service Director Lewis B. Hershey announced that hereafter occupational deferments will be limited "to those few registrants" whom local boards find to be "indispensable and irreplaceable to the national existence."

Farmers and farm hands are the only exception to this ruling. By congressional mandate, they have been virtually exempt from the draft.

Present regulations covering all other registrants provide occupational deferment for men "necessary to and regularly engaged in an activity in support of the national health, safety and interest."

Hershey, in instructions to state draft directors, said the Army has asked for 25,000 men in September, when the present two-month draft holiday will end. The Army's call in June, before the holiday, was for 50,000 men.

Hershey instructed local boards that they might postpone induction of registrants in high school who have not reached age 20 but should not postpone induction of college undergraduates.

Heretofore, college students whose names were called have been allowed to finish the cur-

rent quarter or semester before induction.

Hershey also directed a review of men classified as unfit for service and reconsideration of men discharged from the armed services who did not serve outside continental United States, or in Alaska, or were not on active duty for at least six months after September 16, 1940. He excluded from active duty time spent while taking instruction in a university, college or other institution.

Demos in Red Grip, GOP Head Says

NEW YORK, July 17.—(AP)—Carroll Reece, Republican national chairman, said last night that control of the Democratic party has been seized by "Red-Fascists" who seek to fasten upon this nation the very form of government against which we have just waged a great and victorious war.

"I do not for a moment suggest that a majority, or even a major fraction of Democrats, believe in this Red-Fascism which seeks to mask itself under the label of liberalism," he told the national Republican club.

"What I do mean, however, is that members of this radical group have insinuated themselves into positions of great powers on the policy making level in the Democratic party and in the present administration in Washington."

"They call the tune to which the administration dances, and the tune is strangely like the Internationale. The road down which they are taking us leads to one inevitable end—a one party system and a police state."

Reece asserted that "the ideology of the radical group which is largely directing the policy in the Democratic administration is essentially based upon Marxian Socialism."

He said the Democratic party—"if it can be called a party"—was split into "three distinct and mutually antagonistic elements," which he described as the south, "the big city machines" and the "Red-fascists."

Legion's Roster Sets Record High

PORTLAND, July 17.—(AP)—A memorial service to the dead of two wars opened the second day of the state American Legion convention here today. Officers will be elected tomorrow morning.

Department officers last night conducted a mass initiation ceremony for 140 new members and commander Neil Moritt said the department's membership was at a record high and would continue to grow.

Plans of the Veterans' Administration to decentralize administration were outlined by Col. Earl L. Sarles, deputy administrator of the Seattle branch. He said that by August 1 there would be an insurance office in most large cities where insurance premiums could be paid. This, he said, is only one of many changes which out administrative affairs on the local level, leaving to Washington only matters of policy.

Crops Outlook in Oregon Favorable

PORTLAND, July 18.—(AP)—Oregon's crop production picture continues favorable, with record yields expected for pears, berries, walnuts and filberts, the U. S. Department of Agriculture reported today.

Tree fruit prospects are particularly encouraging, with a 7 per cent increase over last year expected.

Other information included in the report:

The field crop acreage is 2 per cent greater than last year and about the same as for 1944. Field crop production will equal the high 1945 level.

The July 1 pasture condition was less favorable than that of a year ago, but recent rains have helped to provide better than average feed.

Milk production per cow continues on a high level, but due to reduction in numbers, the June production was 2 per cent under June, 1945.

June egg production was 20 per cent under that for May and 7 per cent less than in June of last year. The total was 39,000,000 eggs.

Pythian Knights, Sisters Attend Yreka Ceremonial

Several members of Alpha Lodge No. 47, Knights of Pythias, and of Roseburg Temple No. 23, Pythian Sisters, journeyed to Yreka last weekend, where the knights attended the Cave initiation held there each year at this time. The ceremony was attended by 400 to 500 people from all parts of western United States.

Ex-Governor Merriam, supreme representative; Dr. F. I. Mather, grand chancellor, and a large group of grand officers from California, Oregon, Nevada, and other western states were among dignitaries present.

The initiation was held in the Pythian Cave, about 13 miles from Yreka, and is one of the most colorful ceremonies in Pythian activity. Twelve men were knighted during the ceremony, including Maj. Chas. W. Tush and Philip S. Davis of Alpha Lodge.

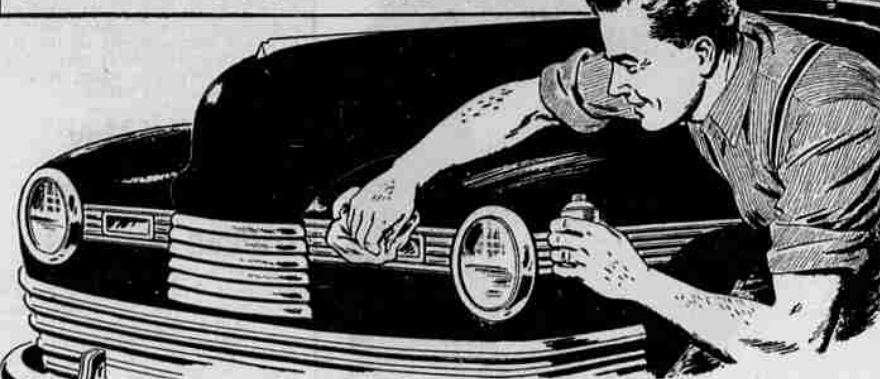

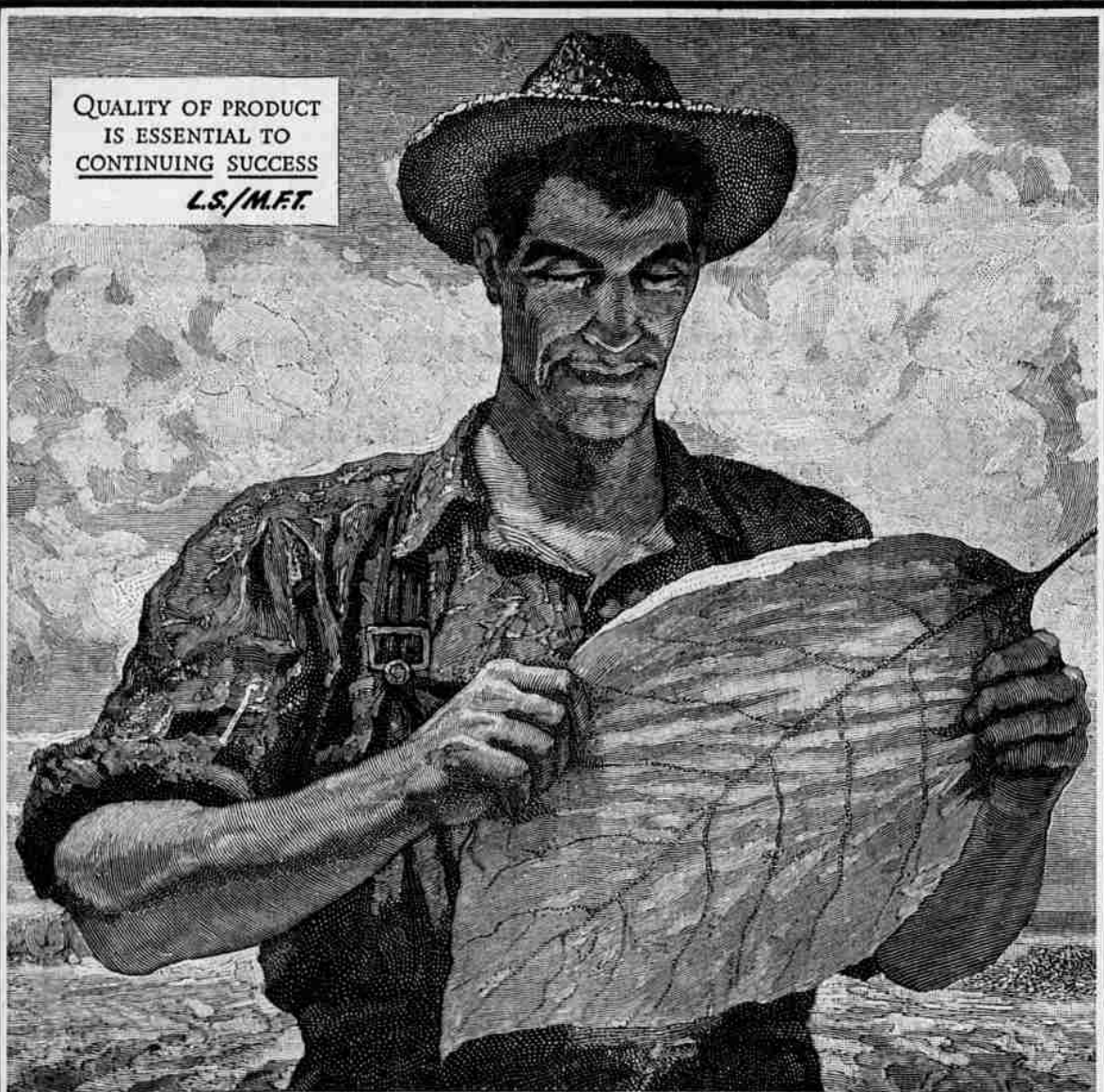
