mate) and Austria, Hungary, Romania and Bulgaria, which Russia dominates completely.

GERMANY is now the big issue. "What is Russia up to IN GERMANY?" has become the big question.

ON that point, Byrnes says Russia has been "hard pressed" to find real objections to a treaty to keep Germany impotent for 25 years.

"Is German militarism going to be used as a pawn between the East and the West and is German militarism AGAIN to be given the chance to divide and conquer?"

He doesn't answer his own question, which suggests rather clearly that Russia's purpose is to win Germany as a whole over to communism.

HE says: "Experience suggests that understandings, particularly with our Soviet friends, can not be reached until we have gone through rounds of verbal combat, in which old complaints are repeated, past positions reaffirmed, differences accentuated and crises provoked."

That is another way of saying that Russia is TESTING US OUT, finding how far it will be safe to go NOW in getting what she wants.

HIS speech, read between the lines, confirms the probability that the world is dividing up into two systems—communism, dominated and led by Russia, and free enterprise, led by the United States and Britain.

MEANWHILE Canada publishes an official report that Soviet agents, who may still be operating in Canada, had flown samples of uranium 235 back to Russia.

POLITICAL ECONOMY

A recent cartoon, published in one of our exchange papers, depicted a rider who bought only one spur. His theory was that if one side of the horse moved the other had to go along.

That may be carrying economy a little too far, but we wish our federal government would become a little "tighter" with our money and quit its useless spending.

Of course, there is talk of "economy." Reconversion Director John R. Steelman, for instance, has demanded "new slashes in federal spending," but wants to do his cutting at the expense of the Army and Navy.

Apparently, in Mr. Steelman's opinion, we're better off to drop reconversion of our Army and Navy, scrapping efficiency of our military defenses at a time when this nation needs to be militarily strong, in order to retain a reconversion army of thumb-twiddling employees who in late months have accomplished very little except obstruction—employees of departments which are devoting much time and attention to fright psychology, designed to scare the American people into belief that the time-tried way of American life no longer is possible and that we must be paternalistically regimented by Washington longhairs.

The administration hasn't much control over Army and Navy votes; consequently our national defense is expendable, according to politically-guided thinking. But it would not think of directing its economy toward elimination of useless alphabetical agencies, departments, bureaus, authorities, administrations, and what-have-you, when it would mean freeing hundreds of thousands of people from job-obligated voting.

We need governmental economy, but not the type of economy desired by bureaucrats, who would sacrifice anything except jobs and votes.

Before we can expect elimination of free-and-easy spending, we must have public realization of the dishonesties of administrative tactics as evidenced in the wool-pulling use of subsidies to hide true price levels, padded payrolls, etc. When the American public becomes fully aware of the widespread waste of tax money, we will get fast action on an economy program.

After all these years of extravagance, coupled with necessary wartime expenditures, it is time we were getting around to paying the fiddler.

We must demand a balanced budget, elimination of unnecessary and wasteful bureaus, and porkbarrel appropriations, while we set our financial house in order.

Chicago Cubs Now Strong Contender For League Flag

(By The Associated Press) Brooklyn's dismal slump and the Cardinals' habit of losing to the Phillies is leaving the door wide open for the Chicago Cubs in the National League pennant scramble.

Although the Dodgers still rule the league roost by a half game, many baseball men believe the real 1946 race in September will find the Cards and Cubs battling for the flag.

Counted out of the race and rated "just another wartime club" in the early spring calculations, the Braves today are a strong third, breathing hard on the necks of the St. Louis Red Birds and only 3½ games out of first place.

The Cubs made ground yesterday by drubbing the Boston Braves, 10-0, in the afternoon and then watching both the Brooks and Cards bow under the arcs of Chipman's sixth shutout performance, his first win in over a month, added another cheery note to the Chicago situation.

St. Louis once again refused to take advantage of a chance to regain the lead they hadn't held all by themselves since May 19.

Brooklyn staggered to a fifth successive setback at Cincinnati, 5-2, their seventh defeat in eight starts on the current western tour. Behrman appeared to have a 2-1 triumph in his pocket until the Dodgers' defense collapsed in the four-run eighth to give Wal-

Grid Practice At Roseburg High to Start Sept. 1st

Opening practice date for the Roseburg High School gridironers has been set for September 1. Coach Mel Ingram announced Monday and prospects for the 1946 football season were defined as very good.

Regular hopefuls from last season have all gained from ten to 25 pounds and a few are getting toughened up by summer work in logging camps around Douglas County while others are conditioning with the local American Legion ball club, Ingram reports.

Ingram's entire 1945 left-side line will be back with an average weight of 183. Returning backfield men include Pone, who has jumped from last season's weight of 140 to 180; Ulrich; Harvey, Evans and Willitt. Stalwart linemen returning this fall are Horan, right end; Moore, right tackle; Turk, right guard; McCown, center; Marsters, left tackle, and Beeson, left end.

The local playing field, kept up by regular irrigation this summer by regular grounds keepers, will be in first-class condition and will hold up against any other high school turf in the state, Ingram said. Night practices will be conducted for the first ten days of workouts, enabling boys employed in summer jobs to continue work until the last minute.
