

Seals Extend Win Streak to 12 Tilts

(By the Associated Press.)
The pitching of Melton extended the San Francisco Seals' long winning streak of the season to 12 straight games and held firm their half-way point today at the head of the Pacific Coast Baseball League.

Aided by timely Seal hitting, Melton, former New York Giant, won his 14th game to seven losses last night, defeating the Hollywood Stars, 3-2.

The second-place Oakland A's blanked the third-ranking Angels of Los Angeles 5-0 behind the five hit hurling of Pippen, who registered his 11th win against five defeats.

Portland's 1945 pennant-winning Beavers overwhelmed the last-place Seattle Rainiers 9-2, leaving three and a half games between them and the cellar.

The Sacramento Solons and San Diego Padres went into the 11th inning with the count knotted, and a Solon rookie, Shortstop Harrington, belted home a 7-6 victory.

Banks Anxious to Employ Veterans

Banks in a number of Oregon cities are anxious to hire World War II veterans under the job-training program, Department of Veterans Affairs officials are advised by A. A. Rogers, state superintendent of banks.

Rogers said all bank managers are acquainted with details of the GI apprenticeship program, and that a number of them throughout the state have told him they are seeking promising veterans to employ under the program.

The state division of vocational education, the state apprenticeship council and the Oregon Bankers Association have cooperated to set up the four-year training program, paying veterans subsistence allowances from federal GI funds to augment their salaries while learning to become commercial tellers, it was explained.

Rogers said that while the program sets \$200 as the four-year objective wage, in many cases veterans will reach this salary in much less than four years' time, and may go beyond commercial tellers to become junior officers, depending upon initiative and interest shown. The majority of cities in Oregon have at least one bank employing veteran job trainees, he said.
