Camas Valley Scouts Attend Summer Camp

CAMP LUCKY BOY.—Five Boy Scouts from troop No. 23 of Camas Valley are attending the third period at this Boy Scout summer camp on Blue river, about 45 miles east of Eugene. They are Robert Wheeler, James Thrush, Wilson Roberts and David Haley.

A full program of scoutcraft, aquatics, handicraft, and hiking and camping is offered to troops which use the 140-acre camp under the direction of the Oregon Trail Council. Ernest A. Seaton, council field scout executive for Douglas, Coos and Curry counties, is camp director with a regular staff of 18 scouts and scouters.

Lookout Stations in Douglas County Given Inspection

First annual inspection trip to the lookout stations and camps of the Douglas Forest Protective Association was made Monday and Tuesday by the directors, and representatives of the O. and C. Administration and the county court, Harry O. Fargeter, secretary-manager, said.

Monday the inspection party, which included 10 persons, visited lookout stations in the western half of the county and ate dinner at the Iyee Forest Camp. Yesterday the group visited the eastern half of the county and had dinner at Hincide Creek Station.

Every lookout station in the county is now reached by automobile, while 20 years ago most fire watchers packed in on horseback over precarious mountain trails, Fargeter said.

There are now 240 miles of road and 600 miles of trails within the protection area, and employees of the association have increased in number from 15 to 155, he pointed out.

Fred Southwick, district warden for 14 years, directs the fire fighting organization from a \$35,000 headquarters building and shops. A new radio station communicates with lookout stations as far away as the coast range, Fargeter said.

The Douglas Forest Protective Association was organized 33 years ago and is financed largely by private timber operators with holdings in the city. Protection is extended as well to county forests, O. and C. land, and to parts

of the Umpqua National Forest. Directors of the association are E. R. Walsh, Portland, president; Clyde Martin, Tacoma; H. B. Dolan, Glendale; William Rummann, Portland; R. M. Fox, Portland; James Ford, Gardiner, and W. H. Horning, Portland.

Included in this week's inspection party were County Judge D. N. Busenbark; County Commissioners H. B. Roadman and J. Ross Hutchinson; M. O. Nicholson, O. and C. Administration, and Corwin Woolley, assistant

district warden of the association. Inspection trips will be made annually hereafter, Fargeter said.
