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Congress Okays 2 Revamping Plans, Turns Down Third

WASHINGTON, July 17.—(AP)—The White House today had Congressional authority to carry out two of President Truman's plans for revamping government administration.

But the Chief Executive's major recommendation for reshuffling federal housing agencies into a permanent single postwar unit was rejected. Senator Taft, who led the 45 to 32 scuttling of the President's housing proposal late yesterday in the Senate, said Congress should work out its own ideas of

a consolidated housing agency "within six months."

Working in reverse order, Democratic Leader Barkley succeeded in nullifying the House disapproval on plans 3 and 2 before he was set back on plan 1. Taft complained that the Presidential housing plan "completely disregarded" a comprehensive housing consolidation bill approved by the Senate and now waiting House action.

Approved earlier yesterday, 40 to 37, was the Presidential plan for consolidating health, welfare and educational functions and agencies under the federal security administration. Principal opposition centered on a shift of the independent employees compensation commission to FSA. Other features of the plan include transfer to FSA of functions of the children's Bureau of Labor Department, and vital statistics from Commerce Department, and abolition of the social security board.

Western senators lost a fight against plan No. 3 on Saturday by a 37 to 30 vote. They centered opposition on a proposed Bureau of Land Management in the Interior Department. It will combine the former grazing service and general land office.

U. S. Relief May Last 3 More Years, Truman Declares

WASHINGTON, July 17.—(AP)—President Truman told a youth food conference yesterday that the United States may have to help prevent starvation in war-torn areas for another three years.

"It is going to take another year or two—maybe three—before those countries can get back on a production basis so that they could even contribute to their own support," the president declared.

"We are going to help them all we can with machinery and tools and the wherewithal to raise food, but it will be some time before those destroyed countries can get back on a basis where they can feed themselves." Opening the meeting of the National Youth Conference on food in the White House, the president told the delegates the U. S. had furnished to date 417,000,000 bushels of food grains as compared with commitments last November for 225,000,000 bushels. "But that is nothing for us to brag about," he said. "We furnished those food grains because we happened to be the country that had them. That doesn't mean that everybody, while he didn't starve, received enough to eat."

Dynamite Used To Offset Noise From Revival

BELLINGHAM, July 17.—(AP)—Residents in the Bellingham airport district along highway 99 conferred with the county prosecutor yesterday in an effort to determine whether a neighborhood revival meeting could be closed as a "public nuisance."

Meantime parties to the dispute continued to observe a truce after residents discharged bundles of dynamite last week to counteract what they charged were "hysterical" religious services.

One resident, who said she lived a mile and one-half from the camp grounds, stated that "every night we have heard the most frenzied howlings and unholy roarings that it has ever been our lot to listen to."

The Rev. Percival T. Collett, revival leader, answered the criticism with the declaration: "This is still America and our people have the right to worship God according to the dictates of their hearts."

Sheriff Conrad Axling said he convinced the angry residents who complained of lack of sleep and reduced property values, that no more dynamite should be fired. The blasts results in decreased attendance. Dr. Collett admitted. He said two children were hit by stones, the blast tent by rocks and branches.

The Pentecostal Church, said its spokesman, has purchased ten acres of land and plans to establish there permanently.

The revival itself has two weeks to go.

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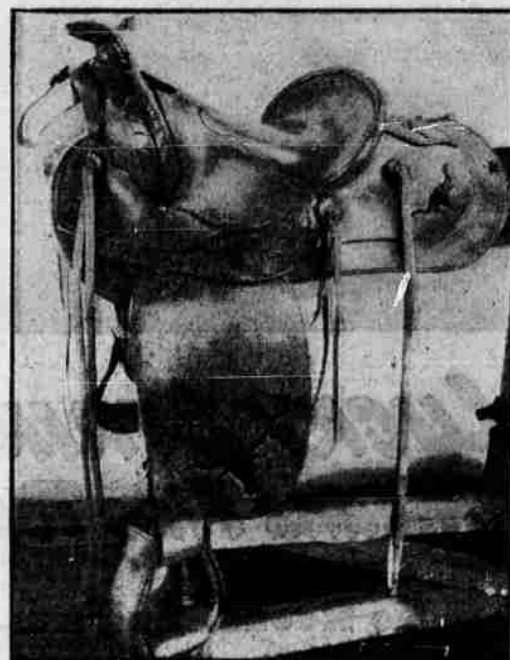
