

Cardinals Wrest Lead in National From Brooklyn

Brooklyn's fond dream of a 1946 pennant has exploded into a grisly nightmare today with the Cardinals back in first place and the Dodgers on a six-game losing binge.

Seven games ahead on the July 4 dividing line, the Dodgers have crashed toward their doom on a fatal western jaunt while St. Louis, safe at home, has eaten up the entire lead and forged ahead by a half game.

The Phillies, who kept St. Louis out of first place Wednesday, fought hard to bar the door last night but finally succumbed, 5-4. It was the first time the Cards had undisputed possession of the lead since they bowed to the Phils May 21 and dropped down into a tie with Brooklyn.

Shoddy defensive play and inability to bunch hits off Walters sent the Dodgers down for the sixth time, 4-2, in Cincinnati. Cubs Lose Ground
Bill Lee halted the Chicago Cubs' upward march with a six-

hit, 9-3 decision for the Boston Braves who shelled five hurlers. The result left the Bruins four games off the pace.

Pittsburgh broke the Koslos jinx, downing New York, 7-3, after the rookie southpaw had beaten them four straight times. The Boston Red Sox maintained their 11-game lead over New York by nailing out Chicago, 3-2, on McBride's third hit and second double.

Joe Gordon's two-run homer in the fourth inning was enough help for Queen in recording his first triumph since his discharge from the Army. Queen scattered eight St. Louis hits in his 3-1 success.

Other encouraging news to Yankee fans was the word that Shortstop Rizzuto probably will rejoin his mates tomorrow. Coan's speed enabled Washington to trim Detroit, 1-0, as the rookie outfielder flashed around the bases for an inside-the-park home run in the eighth inning off Trout.

Protest of Chiefs Slated for Airing

A meeting of all Southern Oregon Baseball League managers and officials has been called for Sunday morning at Grants Pass, at which time a discussion of league pros and cons will be made and arrangements shaped for a Shaughnessy playoff to determine the league champion.

Anticipated interest is held by members and fans of the local Umpqua Chiefs as a protest of their game with Crescent City on June 30 at the California City, when the Chiefs were defeated 6-4, will be passed on by unbiased members of the league. Father to Second Pinto in Combat With Nazarrarian

The second generation of the "Wrestling Pintos" will show here at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night when Jack Pinto, 19-year-old Southern Californian, meets Mike Nazarrarian, the "Armenian Assassin," in the second part of a double main event to be presented by Matchmaker Don Owen.

Young Pinto, who has been making an impressive showing in other northwest grappling capitals for the past few weeks, is the son of Stanley Pinto, one of the nation's greatest matmen in the days of the "Farmer" Burns era. The youngster has all of the physical requirements of a potential world champion and he is being groomed by his father for that role within the next few years. Old Stanley Pinto travels with and coaches his son.

Pinto will have a rugged test against Nazarrarian, one of the most unethical of mat villains. Although Jack has had little experience with wrestling mania, he is capable of taking care of himself. Old Stanley wrestled when the mat sport was a rough and tumble activity that lacked the color and showmanship of the present style and has coached his son in defensive tactics against illegal holds and fistic maneuvers. The match promises to be a Donnybrook in which young Pinto is certain to give a good account of himself against a rival with considerable advantage in experience.

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Truman Will Stump if He Can be of Service

—President Truman said today he will take the political stump for Democratic Congressional candidates this year if he can be of service.
Mr. Truman expressed outright opposition to the renomination of one Democratic House member—Rep. Roger C. Slaughter of the Fifth Missouri District.
He has asked James Pender-

gast, Kansas City political leader, to support Enos Axtell, Slaughter's opponent, Mr. Truman said, adding that Pendergast would do so.

The President had no comment to make on the defeat of Senator Wheeler (D-Mont.) in his race for renomination. Mr. Truman intervened in the Wheeler campaign with a letter defending Wheeler against charges by his opponent that he was an enemy of railroad labor.

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
