

Grill Trims Vets, Pastimers Defeat Oilers in Fiasco

Last night's softball double-header went from a thrilling eighth inning pitchers' battle game to an extremely one-sided contest with the Rainbow Grill edging out the Veterans 5-4 and the Sutherland Pastimers swamping the error-studded Associated Oilers 25-3. Players and officials' arguments, head-on collisions at bases, and an inept fan who insisted on carrying the country's basic law of free speech onto the diamond kept the fans on their toes throughout the evening.

In the Grill-Veterans contest, which ended with the Rainbow club victorious on getting the first run in the overtime frame, the score was 4-1 in the Grillers' favor until the seventh stretch, when the Vets acquired two hits for three runs to tie the score 4-4. Vets' speedster hurler Freesin, reputed as the City League's best, pulled out time and time again after numerous infield errors nullified good pitching, while the Grillers used heavy hitting as their offensive with Catch Baughman slugging the only homerun of the game in the fifth.

Grill's hurler Stansted allowed six hits in the eighth innings of play and scored 11 strike-outs. Freesin wiffed seven Grillers and was hit for 10 bingos.

Oilers' Defense Collapses

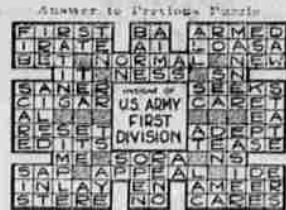

Brighter Supply Outlook Seen By Roseburg Dealer

With new and well-defined ideas for merchandising obtained in conferences at the current Chicago market with some of America's leading analysts in the furniture industry, L. W. Josse of Roseburg returned here today optimistic over future business prospects.

Scores of leading dealers throughout the United States attended the two-day market conference and breakfast meetings July 9 and 10, which were sponsored by the National Retail Furniture Association.

"Changes in the nation's economic and social structure, brought about by the war, necessitate new methods in furniture merchandising," Mr. Josse said. "Business today must be conducted on a more scientific basis with a keener appreciation of consumer needs and problems. Our national association has taken cognizance of this and has summoned the assistance of the best analysts in the country."

A nation-wide survey recently made by the association showed that business conditions are on a definite upward swing, with the economic analysts attending the Chicago conference agreeing that the short supply of merchandise will now show progressive improvement.

Mr. Josse added that many new dealers in furniture have been placed on the market and that these soon will be available to the public.

James Medill of Roseburg Passes

James Medill, age 76, died at his home at 404 S. Mill St., Roseburg, Friday night.

Born in Ireland on March 8, 1870, he was taken to Scotland when a baby, lived in that country until 17 years of age, when he came to the United States. He has made his home in this country since, and the last 29 years in this state.

Twenty-seven years of his life were spent in Douglas County. Mr. Medill worked for the Southern Pacific Co. for a number of years as car inspector and was retired on pension.

Surviving are his widow, Mattie Medill, Roseburg; a son, Wm. B. Medill and a daughter, Anna Meucci, both of Portland; a sister, Mrs. W. O. Carlson, and a brother, David Medill, both of Salt Lake City.

The body will be taken to Portland and funeral services will be held at the A. J. Rose & Son Chapel, Tuesday morning at 10:30. The son will accompany the body to Portland. Arrangements are in charge of the Douglas Funeral Home.

"The first thing you know our people will be blown to pieces by this atomic bomb," he added.

NEW YORK, July 20. (AP)—Soviet Delegate Gromyko, playing a stand-in role among the scientific advisers to the United Nations atomic commission, was on record today as saying that "nobody is asking for secrets" of atomic know-how at this stage of atomic control discussions.

The remark was given emphasis by the fact that the five vetoed words were the only ones given in direct notation in a 700-word official U. N. report of Gromyko's secret meeting of the new 12-nation scientific and technical advisory committee on atomic energy.

Gromyko told the scientists that his proposals for exchange of information, as stated more than a month ago in the presentation of Russia's counter-plan for handling atomic energy, were in no way in conflict with the views expressed by Bernard M. Baruch of the United States in a supplement July 12 explaining one phase of the proposed American program.

On the contrary, Gromyko said, Russia's proposals were well within the framework of the Baruch statement.

Gromyko's remarks apparently were prompted by Baruch's statement saying "it is not contemplated that, in these discussions, information now held as secret would be disclosed."

The Chiefs' traveling squad will be composed of B. Sporer, R. Long, G. Long, V. Baker, J. Huggins, D. DeBernard, G. Sanders, B. Scherer, L. Baker, E. Hill, H. Shinn, and V. Sanders. Game time is 2:30 P. M., and the contest will be aired by Radio Station KNRN for local fans who are unable to make the southern trip.

Soap-Box Derby Slated for Kiddies Late in August

A soap-box derby for Roseburg and Douglas County aspiring young speedway racing drivers has been scheduled for the latter part of August by the local recreation department under the sponsorship of the Hansen Motor Company.

Boys should begin immediately on the blue-print plans and construction of the gravity driven race cars. H. W. Gray, chairman of the contest committee, announced, and added that numerous merchandise awards, as well as cash prizes, will be offered to winners of the various heats.

Registration for the contest can be made at the recreation office upstairs in the City Hall, where complete explanation of the various rules governing construction requirements will be given.

General regulations for construction are: Machines must be entirely gravity-powered, must not exceed \$10 in construction cost, with the exception of the steering gear, which may be as elaborate as desired. The total weight of the racing machine will not be more than 135 pounds and the overall weight, with driver, shall not exceed 250 pounds.

Prizes will be given for the entries making the longest run, the fastest run, the entry showing the best workmanship, and the entry with the most modern and original design.

Although entries into the National Soap-Box Derby have been closed, the local committee is trying to arrange for the Roseburg winner to enter competition with other cities in a possible state-wide meet.

Temperature Soars to 102 Degrees in Roseburg

"The fire, breaking out in a wave of high temperatures and dangerously low humidity, blackened 50 to 100 acres northeast of Scottsburg in this central Oregon coastal area. A crew had battled the flames since Thursday."

"The blaze was partly in old growth timber and partly in the Smith River burn—an inaccessibly rugged area where fire-fighting is difficult."

"A diving and helped crews control the flames. Foresters had feared a shifting wind might send the embers into green timber north and west of the fire."

PORTLAND, July 20. (AP)—Another sweltering day was forecast for Oregon by the weather bureau today as logging camps closed and foresters warned of hazards in the forest.

Logging halted in the Forest Grove region and part of the Siskiyou National Forest in the wake of a heat wave which set new 1946 highs in several Oregon regions. More logging operations were expected to stop if the humidity continued downward.

Governor Scott issued a proclamation closing the Bull Run area of Mount Hood National Park, and allowing other parks to be closed where fire hazards exist.

Forest Ban Issued

The public was barred from forests in northeastern Oregon, and part of Southern Oregon.

Temperatures in the nineties were recorded yesterday in every corner of the state. Even the seacoast sweltered, with Astoria reporting a 90 degree maximum, and Tillamook a startling 95.

Hottest spot in the state was Medford, with a maximum of 107. Salem reported 102; Redmond, 94; Klamath Falls, 95; Pendleton, 96; Baker, 93.

Bill Zuber, a luckless pitcher who couldn't get anybody out for the Yankees, is proving to be a \$7,500 bargain find for the pennant-bound Boston Red Sox.

Picked up for the nominal waiver fee when New York cut him loose, the 31-year-oldster has earned three straight decisions for his benefactors and hasn't been beaten yet. He added a fourth, 9-2 decision over Chicago yesterday to his impressive record.

Even in victory, Zuber had to play second fiddle to Ted Williams yesterday, when Umpire Jones ejected 14 White Sox players and coaches after he had warned Pitcher Joe Haynes about "dusting" Williams.

With the Yankees and St. Louis Browns unscheduled, the Red Sox upped their lead over second place New York to 11 1/2 games.

Newhouse of Detroit chalked up his 18th victory in an unimpressive performance against Washington, 10-5, allowing 12 hits. Greenberg's triple with the bases loaded and Tebbel's two-run double helped the Tigers overcome a 5-0 Washington lead and go on to win.

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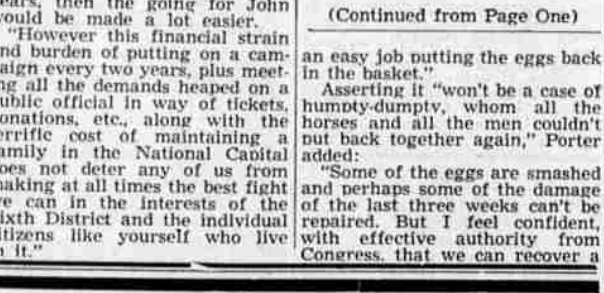
