Truman's Course Thus Far Refutes Claim of Knuckling Under to Labor Union Bosses

WASHINGTON—There has been considerable experting lately on the way President Harry S. (for soft) Truman has been knuckling under to labor bosses. Veto of the OPA and the Case bills are cited as evidence that Truman is afraid of labor's special privilege lobby, which blandly promises support at the polls or threatens to withdraw it if he doesn't do its bidding.

Anyone who is suckered enough to swallow that line has either been away or hasn't been reading the papers. Such reasoning overlooks completely a number of recent Truman acts which the labor bosses have not liked a little bit and have not hesitated to say so.

It overlooks the signing of the anti-racketeering bill. It overlooks the signing of the anti-Petrillo bill. It overlooks settlement of the rail strike, in which Truman threatened to call out the Army and draft the strikers into the armed services. It overlooks the maritime strike in which the president threatened to call out the Navy. It overlooks Truman's consistent and insistent demands for better control of strikes against the government.

All these are decidedly anti-labor actions. Lumping them, there is reason to believe that Truman could do himself some good by courting the labor leaders a little bit more, if he wants to play politics. But balancing the anti-labor against the pro-labor, there is some basis for believing that the S. is for smart and that the man has been playing it straight down the middle in a way that should appeal to the average independent and ideal citizen who doesn't want any special interest to be a White House pet.

Leaders Oppose Him

As a matter of record it can be shown that labor leaders have recently been against Mr. Truman more than they have been for him.

Even that old Democratic wheelhorse, Dan Tobin, who used to get President Roosevelt to come to his AFL Teamsters' Union banquets, recently let out a warning that the Democrats would be swamped in 1946 and 1948 unless they changed their conservative course.

A. F. Whitney, head of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, who once threatened to spend his union's millions to defeat Truman, now says he won't have to spend his union's millions to defeat Truman, "because Truman is going to be defeated anyway!"

Jim Patterson, president of the National Farmers' Union, which works in cahoots with the CIO,

restored to price control or left free of ceilings.

4. Provides that if this board fails to act, one way or the other, OPA on its own initiative may restore controls on meats, dairy products, grains, cottonseed and soybeans, and food and feed products made from them.

5. Permits OPA on direct authorization of the board, and only on that basis, to renew ceilings on poultry, eggs, food and feed products made from them, tobacco and its products and petroleum and its products.

6. Revises without change the federal rent controls which expired June 30 with President Truman's veto of the original OPA extension bill.

7. Provides for "reasonable profit" to manufacturers in a pricing formula based on the industry-wide average in 1940, plus industry-wide average cost increases since then.

8. Fixes March 31, 1946—instead of June 29, 1946, as the Senate had voted—as the basis for percentage discounts and markups to be allowed wholesalers and retail distributors in setting their maximum prices.

9. Transfers price controls over farm commodities to the secretary of agriculture.

10. Grants an additional \$1,000,000,000 for subsidies but bans any food subsidies after April 1, 1947.

11. Guarantees automobile and appliance dealers full pre-war margins and discounts until sales return to the 1939-41 average.

12. Kills OPA's maximum average price regulation which was intended to assure a supply of low-priced clothing.

REEDSPORT—From every indication and according to the opinions of those who know, the large school of Umpqua River Chinook salmon which has been milling around just off the Umpqua River bar and coming inside to feed, is about ready to make the run to the upper river spawning grounds.

Quite recently, sportsmen have been catching a number of these fine salmon just inside and adjacent to the river jetties.

Many of the salmon have been caught by commercial fishermen, who report they find them full of pilchard and other feed fish, an indication the run has not yet started, but those inside the river are making their last feeding in preparation for the long trip up the river to spawn.
