Olalla Grange No. 913 will meet Friday evening at the hall at 8 o'clock, at which time work in the first and second degrees will take place. All members are urged to be present.

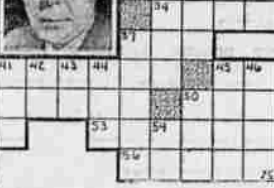

Farmers to Get Govt. Subsidy for Soil Rebuilding

WASHINGTON, July 23.—(AP)—The Agriculture Department yesterday announced a \$314,000,000 subsidy program for 1947 designed to encourage farmers to rebuild their soil after the heavy wartime production drain.

The program was authorized by Congress under the AAA farm act of 1937.

Farmers may become eligible for payments from the fund by adopting soil and water conservation practices recommended by state AAA farm committee technical experts of the department, and by local farmer committees.

These practices include: (1) Application of lime, fertilizers, and other materials; (2) planting of cover crops on land which tends to erode; (3) harvesting of certain legumes and grass seeds; (4) measures for controlling erosion and water conservation; (5) forestry improvement; and (6) measures for control of weeds and clearance of land for plowing and pasture.

The department said more than 4,000,000 farms are participating in a similar program this year. None of the money will be used to pay farmers either to restrict or expand their production of crops. The department said the 1947 program will give local farmers greater responsibility than heretofore in determining practices to be followed.

Gov. Snell Defends Vets From Unjust Charge

SALEM, Ore., July 23.—(AP)—Published reports by the State Unemployment Compensation Commission, which have told how some veterans won't take jobs so they can get federal GI benefits, might "place the big majority of veterans in a bad light," Governor Snell said.

The governor said he has found that most veterans want "jobs, education and opportunity—not doles."

He said "let us not judge the vast majority of these fine boys by the misdoings of a few."

Lower Nut Imports to Be Asked of 3 Nations

WASHINGTON, July 23.—(AP)—The State Department told Oregon, California and Texas congressmen yesterday it will open negotiations with representatives of Italy, Spain and Turkey to determine whether an agreement to limit exportations of tree nuts to the United States can be negotiated.

The congressman complained to Assistant Secretary Clayton that importation of almonds and filberts from those countries are 350 per cent greater than before the war. The imports, they contend, are harmful to growers in their states.

Greiser, Nazi Gauleiter in Poland, Dies in Noose

POZNAN, Poland, July 23.—(AP)—Arthur Greiser, who sent thousands of Poles to Nazi death camps in the days of his ascendancy as gauleiter of Poznan province, went to the gallows in a prayerful terror Sunday while 15,000 persons, many of whom he had persecuted, watched silently in Citadel Place.

Although his neck was broken, Greiser's body continued to writhe for seven minutes before physicians pronounced him dead.

Anti-Trust Charge Hits Stencil Duplicating Co.

CLEVELAND, July 23.—(AP)—A special federal grand jury yesterday indicted four companies and six individuals on charges of conspiracy to restrain and monopolize the stencil duplicating industry in violation of the Sherman Anti-Trust Act.

A statement issued in behalf of Attorney General Tom C. Clark said the defendants "had stopped at nothing to achieve and maintain their monopoly."

The attorney general's office, following the jury action, filed a civil complaint seeking injunctions against practices charged by the jury.

Defendants in the indictment were charged with buying up competitors, acquiring all patents and "misusing" them to keep out competitors, fixing prices, dividing markets, entering into an international cartel, and suppressing evidence in federal court proceedings seeking to invalidate patents.

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
