when TOO MUCH POWER is placed in ONE set of hands. It ends (not always, but FREQUENTLY) in outbursts of unrestrained hatred such as we are witnessing in Bolivia.

THE thing for us to remember is that down through the centuries dictatorships (in one form and another) have tended to arise WHENEVER the people become too lazy, too indifferent, too self-centered to face the responsibilities of governing themselves wisely and well.

THERE is another explosion in Jerusalem - where "terrorists" bomb the King David hotel, in which British army headquarters are located. The dispatches indicate some 50 deaths.

Palestine is an explosive spot because of a project to move Jews there from Europe - where, because of man's intolerance to man, they are a headache. The idea of the powers that be in Europe is to move the Jews bodily to Palestine, now heavily populated by Arabs.

The Arabs resist the colonization of Palestine by Jews. The Jews (already desperate because of injustices in Europe) RESENT the unwillingness of the Arabs to receive them.

Hence the disorders that are making Palestine a powder keg.

THE powers that be in Europe (we, the British, the French, the Russians, etc.) are unwilling to face the problem of absorption of the unwanted Jews AMONG US. So, in effect, we say: "Let's force them onto the Arabs in Palestine" (which is the ancestral home of the Jews).

(If you are familiar with your Old Testament, you will recall that the Jews took Palestine FROM SOMEBODY ELSE.)

THE curtain is rising on civil war in China.

As usual, we get no clear picture of what is happening. We have to judge from CONFLICTING PROPAGANDA claims. The communists say they have won a resounding victory in which they captured 12,000 government troops.

The nationalists retort that after the battle they have already BURIED 20,000 COMMUNIST DEAD, and aren't through yet.

MME. SUN YAT-SEN, widow of China's revolutionary hero (who seems by some freak to have been unselfishly devoted to improvement of the lot of the Chinese PEOPLE) gives out a statement in Shanghai to the effect that REACTIONARIES in the Nationalist (Chiang Kai-Shek) government are fostering a civil war in the hope of bringing the United States and Russia into the struggle and thus crushing Chinese communism.

She says we ought to GET OUT OF CHINA... that we should make loans only to a reorganized and truly representative Chinese government... that we should make it plain that we will supply neither munitions nor military assistance to EITHER SIDE.

PROBABLY the outcome of that policy would be that the communists, with Russian assistance, would win. Still, it is a little odd to hear ANYBODY assert that America should stay out of ANYWHERE.

THE world, you see, is in a mess. It is a pity. The principle of the Golden Rule, if honestly followed by everybody, would bring order and happiness out of the mess. It is doubtful if anything else will.

OH, WHAT TO BELIEVE!

Confusion of the American people regarding need of price controls is understandable when we read conflicting reports in our daily newspapers.

For instance: The Republican Congressional Food Study Committee survey claimed to show that "in spite of propaganda about supposed runaway prices and isolated instances of downright profiteering, the actual cost of food to Washington, D. C., consumers was less on July 15, 1946—two weeks after the end of price control—than it was on June 29—the last day of OPA.

The same day the Republican committee submitted its report, the White House released a statement prepared by the Commerce Department asserting that prices have risen rapidly since OPA went out of existence despite efforts by price control foes "to keep prices at a minimum until OPA's fate finally is decided."

All of which serves to remind us of the old saying that "figures don't lie but liars do figure."

Here are two absolutely contradictory statements both issued the same day and in the same place and by two apparently reliable sources.

The Republican committee lists 20 food commodities commonly used by the average family. In tabulated columns it shows reductions in prices from OPA ceilings.

The Department of Commerce report does not list the 28 items it uses as a base for its statement. Everyone knows that prices on meat, butter, milk and some other commodities made a sharp rise due to the withdrawal of subsidies.

The Department of Commerce, following the fright psychology so common to administration agencies, points out that: "It is to the interest of those groups in the community who have been lobbying to end price controls to keep price increases at a minimum during the interim while the fate of OPA is decided by Congress."

In other words: "Look out! If we don't get controls, prices are going out of sight!" Plainly the two contradictory statements are pure propaganda. The Republican committee is out to discredit the administration (a job which, in our opinion, shouldn't be too difficult).

In recent reports they have been practically unanimous in calculating that prices would reach a maximum level at least 5 per cent lower WITHOUT OPA than they would have done had regulations remained in effect.

For our own part, we believe both sides of the propaganda battle. But each is reporting only facts favorable to his OWN side. He is not reporting the whole truth. Compare these facts with those presented by professional and commercial reporters, and it becomes quite evident, we believe, that instead of the bogey business man waiting around the corner to spring out with his inflationary jack-in-the-box the moment price controls definitely are off, as the Commerce Department would have us believe, the business man is to be credited with a sincerity of purpose which goes unrecognized in government reports, and is actually working for—and achieving—better price control than was obtainable under the OPA or than can be obtained by the patched-up dummy proposed to replace our fallen Humpty-Dumpty.

Warm Weather Increases Crowds At Swim Beach

With expectations of the South Umpqua river to be condemned to swimmers, plus the current warm weather, the Templin street beach is reported as attracting larger crowds than ever before and swimming classes, taken up Monday by the recreation department after the Red Cross school, are almost at their capacity in enrollment.

The Recreation Department's swim school, instructed by Sunny Gray, reports the youngsters are now returning from various summer camps and out-of-town trips, which explains the great increase in enrollment in the new swim classes. This school, she said, is being held with no designation of ages, but student swimmers are being put in classes according to their previous experience.

The new classes are meeting at the following hours: 10 A. M., junior life saving; 11 A. M., intermediates; 12 A. M., beginners; 1 P. M. high beginners; 6 P. M., senior life saving. Miss Gray urges parents to enroll their youngsters immediately in this week's classes as the river is expected to be condemned in the near future if the warm weather prevails.
