North Entrance To Crater Lake Opened to Public

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK—The north entrance highway to Crater Lake National park is now opened to public. One of the heaviest snow packs in the history of the park impeded snow removal operations on this approach road, and deferred the opening date much later than normal.

In addition to providing an all-paved approach to Crater Lake from U. S. Highway 97 and from the Diamond Lake cut-off, the north entrance makes available six miles of the Rim Drive with its many and different views of the lake, and affords access to the watchman lookout atop the most prominent peak on the west rim, from which sweeping views of Crater Lake, the adjacent country, and expanses of the Cascades can be had.

It is suggested that motorists use the north entrance to Crater Lake rather than the east entrance, since the former road is paved all the way, less steep and affords more and better views of the lake. The north entrance reduces materially the distance and driving time between Diamond Lake and points in the Klamath basin.

Achiu, Nazarian to Top Mat Program

Water "Sneeze" Achiu, the veteran Chinese jiu-jitsu expert, and Mike Nazarian, the Armenian ruffian from Los Angeles, will continue their torrid ring feud Saturday night at the Roseburg Armory in the main event of Matchmaker Don Owen's weekly wrestling card.

Billy McEulin, the Texas badman, and Jack Kiser, the popular grappler from St. Johns, will tangle in a bout that is billed as the opener. Actually the Kiser-McEulin scrap would rate as a headline. Both bouts will be over a 45-minute, two-out-of-three falls route.

Nazarian is one of the most ruthless villains ever to show in these parts but he will have his hands full when he climbs in the ring with Achiu. The Chinaman is an expert grappler and has the added advantage of being able to apply the "sleeper" to his opponents with his jiu-jitsu.

Conservation Urged to Restore Soil Strength

The increased responsibility for farmer-committeemen and farm and ranch operators to shape the 1947 Agricultural Conservation Program to fit local needs should help Oregon producers to make some needed shifts from farming practices necessary for quick

wartime production to those of greater long-term value.

"We had to increase the acreage of soil depleting crops during the war," E. Harvey Miller, state PMA chairman says. "But we cannot continue to grow them on such a scale indefinitely without permanently damaging our land. Record production one year, or for a few years, doesn't necessarily mean record production over the long haul. Our goal is continuing high production year after year. Conservation farming is the only way to achieve such a goal."

Authority for a \$314 million 1947 AC program has been granted by Congress under the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938 for assisting farmers and ranchers to carry out soil and water conservation practices.

Newhouser Wins 19th For Detroit; Bosox, Yanks Lose

(By The Associated Press) Hal Newhouser, Detroit southpaw, has won 19 of his 21 starts and his current victory string is seven games long after yesterday's 6-1 verdict over Washington.

Detroit routed an old jinx, Dutch Leonard, as Newhouser continued his spell over Washington, allowing only five hits. The Tigers rapped Leonard and Pieretti for 11 safeties and picked up two runs on elusive knucklers that got past Catcher Evans.

Fine pitching was the outstanding feature of the day's program, limited to four American League games when showers washed out the entire National League program.

Reynolds blanked the A's, 2-0 for his fourth success in a row. The Cleveland right hander helped down Marchildon with a seventh-inning single that drove in a run.

Boston flopped on its first start of a long western swing, bowing to Chicago, 7-1, as the White Sox wrapped it up with five runs off Zuber in the first inning. Rigney tossed a brilliant five-hitter as the league leaders, holding Ted Williams hitless although giving him his 100th walk of the season.

With a chance to gain a full length on the Red Sox, the New York Yankees dropped an 8-2 game to St. Louis. Four Yankee errors and 14 Brownie hits doomed Russo to his first setback.
