

Terminal Pay in Cash, Not Bonds, Urged in House

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House acted on its own bill, provides that payments generally are to be in bonds unless the amount

is less than \$50. In that case the recipient would get cash. The bonds would be in \$25 denominations, non-negotiable and payable at the end of five years at their face value plus interest accrued at two and one-half per cent. Payments in amounts other

than a unit of \$25 would be in cash. A man entitled to \$85, for instance, would receive \$75 in bonds and \$10 in cash. Payments entirely in cash would be made to men discharged before Jan. 1, 1943, and to survivors of men who died since their discharge.

Both the Senate and the House versions are estimated to cost up to \$3,000,000,000, although under the bond proposal not all of that would be paid out in cash at once. Some provisions retained.

The Senate left unchanged these House provisions: Payments to be made to all enlisted personnel of the armed forces who have served honorably at any time since Sept. 8, 1939; amounts would be based on two and one-half days of full-time service up to a maximum of 120 days and less deductions for full-time actually received; payments would be made upon application filed up to Sept. 1, 1947.

The Senate provided in addition that no service personnel shall receive payments for more than 90 days of unused full-time time accruing after September 1 of this year. Heretofore, only officers have been paid for unused leave time up to a maximum of 120 days.

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current ban on deliveries of German industrial equipment to Russia without violating the four-power Potsdam agreement on reparations.

This pact provides that Moscow can claim up to 25 per cent of the former war plants marked for removal from the American and British zone. In return, the Russians were to provide specified quantities of raw materials and food.

But for the last two months, Pauley said, the shipments from the American zone have been held up until the Russians come across with their share.

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dards. Price Administrator Porter has indicated that this course will be followed, for example, on some building materials.

Top OPA officials still are uncertain how some provisions of the bill would be applied.

Under no circumstances could ceilings be restored before August 20 on meat, dairy products, cottonseed, soybeans or items made entirely or substantially from these commodities—and no grain and livestock and poultry feed made from grain.

"Ceilings will be re-established on food products made from grain, such as flour, bread and breakfast cereals."

If an independent three-man decontrol board to be named by President Truman and confirmed by the Senate has not ruled by August 20 whether the ceiling-free items should remain so or not, price controls automatically would be restored. OPA would fix the actual ceilings.

Other items on which ceilings could not be re-established prior to August 20 are poultry, eggs, tobacco, petroleum and their products.

In the case of these items, maximum prices could not be restored even after August 20 unless the control board so ruled.

While major food items which make up restaurant and hotel meals would be free of ceilings at least until August 20, these meals would be under ceilings, Rent Controls Hold.

The bill makes virtually no changes in rent control provisions. OPA plans to re-establish June 30 rent ceilings across the board.

However, the agency has no authority to order refunds in the case of any rent increases already collected by landlords for the period during which controls were not in effect.

On evictions, notices served prior to July 1 under OPA regulations would date from the time of issuance, despite the lapse of

controls at the start of this month. Evictions started under local law during the period federal controls were not in effect will not be recognized by OPA, officials said, unless a court judgment actually had been served prior to revival of OPA controls.

Truman's Approval of OPA Bill Predicted

President Truman signed into law yesterday a bill providing \$75,000,000 for OPA operations during the fiscal year which started July 1.

The measure contains a ban on use of "propaganda" by the agency in support of price controls.

The legislation also includes approximately \$2,000,000,000 for the Veterans Administration and a new \$465,000,000 contribution to the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration.

The UNRRA allocation contains a section permitting the secretary of state to deny use of the funds in any countries which he finds do not permit "a reasonable number" of accredited press representatives to report on the agency's operations without censorship restrictions.

Irrigation and Sprinkling Permitted Only as Follows

Inside the City Limits:

On the odd numbered days for all services on the odd numbered side of the street.

On the even numbered days for all services on the even numbered side of the street.

Outside the City Limits:

On the odd numbered days for all services on the northerly and easterly side of the street or road.

On the even numbered days for all services on the southerly and westerly side of the street or road.

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
