Gardiner Plant Kept Busy With Boat Building Jobs

REEDSPORT—The Fred C. Schulte boat building plant at Gardiner early this week launched two of the 10 Columbia River bow picker gill net boats they contracted to build for the Meredith Fish Company of Sacramento, Calif.

Wednesday the boats were brought to Reedport and placed on cars for shipment by rail to California. Two more of these fine boats, costing \$3,000 each, will hit the water next week and be ready for shipment, and by the end of next month, the contract for the 10 fishing craft will have been completed.

Mr. Schulte, owner and manager of the plant, announces that he has just signed a contract for the construction of a 48-foot heavy duty outside fishing boat for Bruce Burtchell of Crescent City, Calif. This boat will be of wood construction and of the class which has made the Schulte plan popular with the deep sea fishermen. The Burtchell boat will cost \$30,000 when completed. Mr. Schulte has under construction a fine sportsman outsider fishing pleasure craft which he is building for himself, and which may be placed in service

when finished to accommodate local and visiting sport fishermen who wish to angle in the Pacific.

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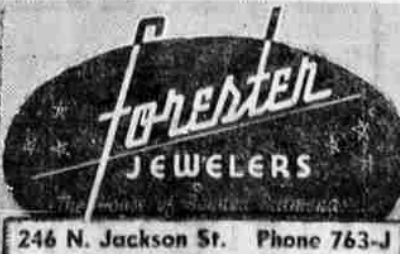
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
