Following the ceremony, Mr. and Mrs. Hatfield left for Brandon and other coast points on their honeymoon, after which they will go to Medford where the latter will take the plane for Brooke General Hospital at Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, Tex., where she will be assigned to the separation center for an honorable discharge from service with the Army Nurses Corps. She served 18 months in the European theater of operations from April, 1944, to September, 1945, with the 6th General Hospital. In May, 1945, she was transferred to the 226th General Hospital in France, after which she returned to the United States and was assigned to Gardiner General Hospital at Chicago. She was given a leave of absence the last of May to fly to Roseburg to assist in the care of her mother, who underwent a major operation at Mercy Hospital and was critically ill.

Both the bride and bridegroom were graduated from Roseburg Senior High School, after which the latter returned to his property on South Deer Creek, where he has engaged in farming since that time. Mrs. Hatfield attended Albany College and took her nurses training at Multnomah Hospital in Portland. Following her discharge from service, she will return to the Hatfield place on South Deer Creek, where the couple will make their home.
