Grapple Fork Handles Baled Hay in Quick Time

A grapple fork for baled hay that will pick up eight small or six large bales at a time is described in a new station circular No. 169 just issued by the O. S. C. Experiment station. The device, designed in the agricultural engineering department, is for use in transferring baled hay from a truck or wagon to the mow in a barn or to a stack.

In using the fork eight times or hooks, four on each side of a main frame, are inserted in the bales as they rest end to end on the load. No moving or piling of the bales is necessary.

Early fears that an excessive number of bales would be broken did not prove to be the case. By building up a pile early directly beneath the track the distance the bales fell are reduced while those who were stacking the bales could then move them downhill to the outer parts of the mow.

Construction details are given in the circular which may be had free from any county extension office.

Forest Protection Talk Given Lions By V. V. Harpham

Importance of forest protection and conservation was pointed out to the Roseburg Lions Club last night by V. V. Harpham, retired supervisor of the Umpqua National Forest, who spoke in behalf of the Keep Oregon Green Association.

Harpham recalled the days when he began with the forest service, 39 years ago and earlier. The value of timber was not then appreciated as it is now, he said. A common sight in Douglas County in those days were the groups of men from the lake states and the middlewest, going by horseback and wagon up the river to stake out timber claims.

"How foolish they seemed to the natives!" Harpham said. "In those days we could see the glow of forest fires almost every night on the horizon. Most of the original growth on the forest has been burned over."

Protection for the forests was soon established by the state and federal governments. The Douglas Forest Protective Association is now one of the best organizations of its kind in the state, he said.

Fire Hazards Cited

Lumbering here has become a big industry contributing to community growth. Five years ago, the Umpqua Forest had the lowest timber cut of any national forest in the northwest region, the Lions were told. Now it has

the greatest timber cut in the region.

Harpham warned of the hazards created by logging and lumbering operations. The Tillamook burn, he commented, was caused by the friction of a cable moving over a log. "That is one reason why logging operations now must cease when the humidity drops down to 30 per cent, because a similar fire could start here as easily."

Some logging operators, he said, now start their day's operations early in the morning in order to be finished by noon, when the day's heat begins to rise and the humidity to drop.

Harpham also warned against the indiscriminate burning of underbrush which also destroys young trees just starting their growth. A problem in Douglas County is to burn thousands of acres of slash in order to permit the growth of young trees.

FRANKFURT, Germany, July 26.—(AP)—American troops wounded six Jews last night in a new outbreak of rioting in a Jewish displaced persons camp at Wolfshausen, U. S. Third Army headquarters said tonight.

A Jew was killed and six German civilians were wounded in riots Wednesday night involving Jews of the camp, German police and German civilians. American troops restored order at the time.

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
