asked committees to tighten the laws.

Included, he said, was an appearance Oct. 18, 1943, before the House Military Committee headed by Rep. A. J. May (D-Ky.) who has acknowledged working in behalf of the midwestern combine under investigation by the Senate committee. May has insisted, however, he did not profit from those connections.

At that time, Warren said, he gave the House committee "in substance after instance of inept and inefficient contracting officers who were 'dishing out' and giving away the property and the money of the United States with reckless abandon."

Hands Tied By Contracts

In discussing the cost-plus system, Warren asked:

"What incentive remains to exercise the American genius for efficiency when the most far-fetched and extravagant outlays are reimbursed dollar for dollar, upon the unchecked approval of a friendly or downright sociable contracting officer?"

Even though the accounting office had audited payments under such contracts, he said, "the fact is we were bound by law, or so the courts have held, to white-wash almost any conceivable cost so approved."

Warren said the "cost-plus contract in reality is a wide open invitation to spend the people's money, a gate wide enough to drive a team through, and no

body but the contracting officer can stop it so long as it comes within the terms of the contract."

Common Decency Asked

Just as important as the "breakdown" in the law, he contended is "the low moral standard exhibited by some connected with war contracts, both on the contractors' side and on the government's," he added.

"Naturally, in time of war there will be some waste and extravagance and some fraud. What I am insisting upon is just a little ordinary common decency."

"There would have been far less fraud, far less improvidence, far less extravagance in war contracts if the civil officials and military officers of the War Department and other procurement agencies had been constantly alert and had always borne in mind that they were the representatives and agents of the United States."

New Potato Harvester Does Complete Task

NEW YORK, July 29.—(AP)—New Holland Machine Company announced today quantity production had started on a new potato harvester which combined all harvesting operations in a single machine.

Tests of the new harvester, the company said, show a cut to less than one-third of the cost of conventional methods of potato harvesting.

Ralph Hertzler, young farmer of Lancaster County, Pa., invented and perfected the mechanism that brings the tubers from

the ground, cleans them of loose dirt and bags them for transport.

First units of the harvester will be available for use in this year's potato crop, the company said.

Experimental operation, it was added, indicate the machine is suited for harvesting other important tuberous products, including onions and sugar beets.

Furlough Pay Approved

A \$2,431,708,000 allotment for GI furlough pay and a \$25,000,000 fund for the reborn OPA topped a \$2,479,663,210 deficiency bill approved today by the House Appropriations Committee.

Last scheduled money measure of the 79th Congress, the bill also provides:

\$20,000,000 for overtime, leave and holiday pay of government workers;

\$250,000 for the new price decontrol board under OPA.

Accounting for 98 per cent of the total, the GI terminal pay allotment gives effect to pending legislation under which an estimated 15,000,000 Army and Navy enlisted personnel already discharged or still in the service are expected to apply for reimbursement for unused furlough time.

The bill authorizing the payments is tied up in a Senate-House Conference Committee seeking to adjust differences over the form of payments. The House voted for cash, while the Senate recommended bonds except for payments under \$50.
