

Toy Balloons Blasted by Frankster Injure Four

PORTLAND, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Three gas-filled toy balloons exploded in flames in an amusement park last night, injuring four persons, two seriously. The balloons were ignited by a prankster who threw a lighted cigarette at them. The flash flame seriously burned Joseph Bates McBurney, 22, and Ruth Berr, 35, both of Gaston, recovering in the Vanport hospital. Other two victims were Maybelle Angeline Nelson, 35, and Wilfred Leroy Nelson, 37, also of Gaston.

Atom Energy Control Bill Signed by Truman

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Legislation setting up the machinery for civilian control of domestic development of atomic energy became law today with President Truman's signature.

The law: (1) Creates a five-member civilian commission for overall control, with a general manager

handling the commission's administrative work, (2) sets up four divisions to work with the commission, (3) gives the government a virtual monopoly on inventions and patents in the field of atomic energy, and (4) provides the death penalty for major violations committed with intent to injure the United States. The commission members and the general manager will be appointed by the President, subject to Senate confirmation. The members and the general manager will be paid \$15,000 a year, with the chairman receiving \$17,500.

The fire fighters report that if the fire had not been stopped while still very small and before the heat of the day, it would have been impossible to control until it had burned out of the logging woods into the green timber, where control is not so difficult. The exceptionally heavy accumulation of tops and branches left by logging, the naturally dense underbrush, and the many snags in the area would have resulted in a fire that would have caused serious losses to both logging equipment and timber, if it had not been controlled before it started to "roll" with lower humidity and higher winds during the day, Southwick said.

ant to the attorney general, testified that the three-year statute of limitations barred any action in connection with the \$2,500 payment from a Tacoma, Wash., defense contractor to Paul A. Olson, former secretary to Rep. Coffee (D-Wash.). Otherwise, McGranery said, he would have submitted the facts to a grand jury.

2. Coffee acknowledged there

was "perhaps a question of ethics" involved in the case but denied that either he or Olson was "guilty of any crime."

3. Senator Mitchell (D-Wash.), a committee member, raised in the Senate a question as to the "technical competence" and "moral caliber" of General Waitt, whose testimony concerning the chemical shell failures, he said, contained "errors and contradictions."

Somervell Scored

4. Senator Magnuson (D-Wash.) expressed the hope to the Senate the committee would have something to say about what he termed the "arrogance" of General Brehon Somervell, retired chief of the Army Service Forces. Magnuson contended Somervell had "squandered practically \$300,000,000 of American money" in connection with the wartime Alaska Highway and Canal projects.

5. The Erie basin firm went before the U. S. tax court to fight the government's effort to get a cash return of \$385,874 of alleged excessive profits made in 1943. The War Department's war contracts price adjustment board claimed that the companies' prof-

its for one year amounted to 150 times its "tangible net worth."

"Easy in Morals"

In an address to the Senate, Senator Mitchell remarked that General Waitt had not been able to learn the cause for the shell failures "but found time to go to fancy parties, even as American boys spilled blood because somebody fell down on the job back home."

His reference was to attendance by General Waitt and other chemical warfare service officers at a wedding party given by Murray Garrison, one of the promoters of the Erie Basin and affiliated companies.

"The military departments of government," Mitchell declared, "have an immediate obligation to put their houses in order. They must take appropriate punitive measures against officers who are easy in morals and careless in administration. The military uniform, in too many instances, has been changed from a cloak of honor and duty to a cloak of convenience and irresponsibility."

Govt. Lost No Money

The investigating committee suspended public hearings after Mead had summed up the inquiry into the Coffee matter as coming down to a question of conflicting

testimony as to whether the payment was a "campaign contribution" as Coffee contended, or a payment of "services," as Elvind Anderson, the Tacoma contractor, asserted.

"It occurs to me," Mead said, "that while this may be morally wrong under these circumstances, the government lost no money since the contract in question was awarded to the low bidder."

Coffee, saying that he was not attempting to "exculpate myself from having done something foolish," told the committee he had "learned from this experience" and "believe me, I'll never accept another one of this character, I mean, or anything remotely resembling it."

board votes to restore ceilings on wheat.

Porter and the Agriculture Department must review this decision too. The subsidy held down retail prices a cent a loaf on bread and about a cent a pound on flour. Since it lapsed there has been no upward adjustment of ceilings to compensate millers for loss of

the government payments. Hearings Scheduled
The subsidy amounted to \$1.03 on each 100 pounds of flour, OPA said. Officials predicted that any ceiling price increase may amount to about \$1.11 to offset a rise in wheat costs since grain controls expired.

In announcing August 12 as the tentative date for the start of public hearings, Thompson said the decontrol board will give representatives of agriculture, industry and consumer groups an opportunity to present their views on whether controls should be restored on meats, dairy products, grains, cotton seed and soy beans.
