

Helser Shuts Out Rainiers; Oakland Wins Over Seals

(By The Associated Press)
Individual baseball performance which stood out today in the Pacific Coast League came from teams lower in the standings than the San Francisco-Oakland rivals for the lead down the stretch.

Helser, veteran southpaw of Portland, 19's pennant winners, blanked the Seattle Rainiers 8-0 in the outstanding mound job last night and on the offensive did better than all of the Rainier batters combined.

He let Seattle have only two singles, one in the first and another in the eighth inning, and not only collected a pair of hits himself but scored each time. Portland, just one step above Seattle's cellar occupants, got 16 safeties, with Centerfielder Shone's two singles, a double and a triple leading the attack.

Oaks Defeat Seals
Oakland's Aarnes bounced back from their triple drubbing at the hands of first-place San Francisco for a 7-4 victory which left them three games behind the loop leaders.

Along with their victory the Aarnes got the sad news that killing Les Scarsella, Oakland first baseman topping the circuit's hitters when he was forced to the bench, probably will have an operation today and will not likely play for 25 days or more.

Christopher Gets 3 Homers
Scarsella's mark of 22 home runs this season was equaled by last night's star at the plate, Christopher of the Los Angeles Angels, who downed the Hollywood Stars, 5 to 1, for the fourth consecutive time.

Christopher got three hits in four times at bat, and each blow went over the fence. His three homers plus another run driven in accounted for the margin over the Stars.

The Sacramento Solons nosed out the San Diego Padres, 7-6 on an unearned run in the ninth inning. Winning Pitcher Mann held the Padres to eight scattered hits.

Piluso has successfully defended his title in many matches

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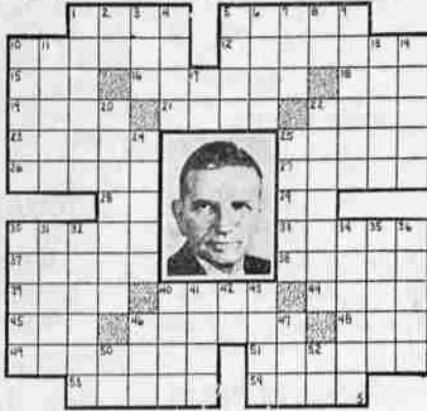

OPA Head Optimistic As Food Prices Go Up

coffee and one to two cents on canned corn, peas and tomatoes. Price increases ordered.

Meanwhile, OPA ordered these retail increases into effect:
Bread—One cent on loaves weighing up to two pounds; on bigger loaves, two to three cents.
Bakery products—One cent a dozen on bread rolls, 15 per cent on cookies, crackers and biscuits.
Flour—About one cent a pound.
Breakfast cereals—One to three cents a package on all kinds except corn flakes, puffed rice and puffed wheat.

Macaroni and noodles—Two cents on eight-ounce boxes, one cent on smaller packages.
Corn meal and hominy grits—One to two cents a pound.
Subsidy Exit Blamed
As for the increases on flour, bread and bakery products, OPA said they stem principally from a decision against restoration at this time of a flour subsidy which lapsed July 1, and from "the fact that the price of wheat has gone above June ceilings." There are no price controls at present on wheat or other basic grains.

To compensate, OPA raised millers' flour ceilings \$1.11 a hundred pounds east of the Rocky mountains and \$1.24 on the west coast. This boosts retail flour ceilings at least a cent a pound, the agency said.

While OPA was pushing up ceilings, the price decontrol board invited consumer groups and industry representatives to air their views on whether ceilings should be restored after August 20 on meats, dairy products, grains, cottonseed and soybeans.

The board announced that public hearings on this issue will open in Washington August 12.

Wheeler Saves Truman From Jam

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Senator Wheeler (D-Mont.) took President Truman off a potential political hot spot yesterday by deciding not to seek reelection as an independent.

Wheeler bowed out of the November picture in a formal statement in which he said nothing about supporting either his successful opponent in the Democratic primary, Lief Erickson, or Vales N. Ection, the Republican nominee.

Mr. Truman gave Wheeler a helping hand in the primary by way of a letter to the senator's campaign manager. Had Wheeler decided to run as an independent, the President might have been faced with making a choice between his long time friend and Erickson.

Wheeler said that he had thought of running as an independent to refute "the vicious propaganda circulated against me." But he said he had come to the conclusion that the considered judgment of Montana citizens "will vindicate me." He added: "My defeat will relieve me of the tedious work in the Senate in one of the most critical times in the history of the country but it will give me more time to concentrate and fight against un-American organizations and activities which seek to undermine the government."

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Reynolds Rivals Feller in Mound Duty for Cleveland

Allie Reynolds, forced back into the shadows by the brilliance of his illustrious pitching teammate, Bob Feller, in the last month has turned in consistently fine mound performances that would do justice to blazng Bob himself.

In fact, the Cleveland Indians' right-hander has forced the great Feller to play second fiddle during the past 30 days as the 27-year-old Oklahoman racked up six straight triumphs while Feller dropped one game in seven starts.

Reynolds gained his sixth victory in a row yesterday and the eighth of the campaign at the expense of the New York Yankees whom he defeated 3-0 for his second shutout win. The triumph enabled Cleveland to remain within hailing distance of the four-place Washington Senators, who blanked the Chicago White Sox, 6-0, with Newsom pitching.

Reynolds limited the Yanks to two hits and dumped them into third place behind the Detroit Tigers, who upset the Boston Red Sox.

The Tigers handed the American League leading Red Sox their third straight defeat when Trout outpitched Hughson, 7-1. The win gave the second place Bengals a two-point advantage over the Yankees.

Dodgers Win, Cards Lose
Safe from the clutches of the challenging St. Louis Cardinals, who were guests of the Phillies in Philadelphia, the National League leading Brooklyn Dodgers returned to their wining ways by edging out the Cincinnati Reds 3-2. The victory, coupled with the Cards' defeat by the Phils, increased the Dodgers' lead over the Redbirds to two and a half games.

The Cards failed to hold onto a 2-0 advantage as the Phils jumped out in the fifth inning to score three runs in the seventh inning and defeat St. Louis, 3-2.

Pittsburgh and the New York Giants divided a doubleheader. The Giants coming back to win 3-2 after being behind the southpaw slants of Ostermuller, had copped the opener 6-0.

The Philadelphia Athletics overcame an early two-run deficit to down the St. Louis Browns 8-3.

Rain postponed the scheduled Chicago Cub-Boston Braves contest.

curity payroll tax until January, 1948, at the present level of 1 per cent on employers and employees. The measure makes these broad revisions in the security program.

1. Larger federal grants for 2,000,000 aged persons, 75,000 blind, and 72,000 dependent children, under new formula that would be especially beneficial to low income states. This will mean about \$150,000,000 additional in federal money annually for needy persons.

2. Survivors' insurance for families of World War II veterans, for three years without charge. Survivors of a veteran who dies within three years after discharge from the services would receive the same benefits that would accrue if he had been working in government employment at \$160 a month. This would amount to about \$22 a month for a widow and about \$16 for a child under 18. Total cost to the government is estimated at \$175,000,000 between now and 1959.

Blanketing of 200,000 maritime workers under the unemployment compensation benefits of the social security act. This will cost the government about \$3,000 during the re-conversion period.

4. Loubling federal expenditures, from \$9,000,000 to \$18,000,000, for maternal health, crippled children and child welfare programs.

50-50 Basis Agreed On

The conference committee scrapped the so-called "variable grants" provision, and wrote a compromise of the present 50-50 federal-state matching system for aid to the needy, as follows:

1. Beginning October 1, the federal government will put up \$10 and the states \$5 of the first \$15 paid as relief to needy aged and blind persons, and will match on a 50-50 basis any state payment made to these persons above \$5. The new bill raises from \$20 to \$25 the limit the federal government will go in this matching process for any one needy person. This raises from the present \$40 to \$45 the top amount these persons can receive monthly under the federal-state cooperation system.

2. The government will pay \$6 of the first \$9 for dependent children, with the states paying \$3 and sums paid the child above \$3 by the state will be matched by the federal government.

Major Issues Left Over

When the new Congress comes in January it may take up some of the problems the adjourned 79th left hanging in midair unless the 79th itself is revived by presidential call before then. Included are such matters as a merger of the armed forces and possible broadening of labor legislation.

The incoming legislators also will have before them such problems as price control, extension or expiration of the draft, extension of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, bills to provide military assistance for other nations and such perennials as the St. Lawrence seaway.

Work Summarized

The 79th Congress left behind it the battered wrecks of several of President Truman's proposals, including his demand for broad emergency powers to draft those who strike against the government.

On the domestic side the 79th gave veterans several financial breaks, voted its members increased pay, pared income taxes, approved two government reorganization plans, passed domestic atomic control legislation, expanded the anti-racketeering laws to cover labor activities, banned union restrictions on use of records by radio stations and voted to return the unemployment services to the states in November.

Internationally, the retiring Congress granted a loan of \$3,750,000,000 to Britain, approved the Bretton Woods monetary agreements, ratified the United Nations charter, extended reciprocal trade agreements authority and generally demonstrated itself as world minded.

The school is sponsored by the Bend Chamber of Commerce, and is under direction of Dr. Mal Stevens, coach for the Brooklyn Dodgers, assisted by Howard Dunne, assistant coach.

High school coaches attending the conference have a schedule of classes on the Bend athletic field, blackboard lectures, and instruction in first aid and treatment of injuries as well as football strategy. The coaches are also to see the Dodgers in action in intra-team contests.

Navy Lifts Ban on Liquor At Bases Outside U. S.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—(AP)—The Navy disclosed yesterday that on July 13 it had legalized the sale of liquor to its sailors outside the United States.

This is the first time the Navy has made liquor available to its enlisted men since the days of the prohibition.

Previously only beer was sold at enlisted men's recreation centers, (a World War II action) although officers were permitted to buy spirits at their clubs.

Under the new order, enlisted men and civilians at Navy bases anywhere outside the United States may purchase liquor at the base provided a soft drink fountain is also functioning at the same time.

No change is made in the beer.

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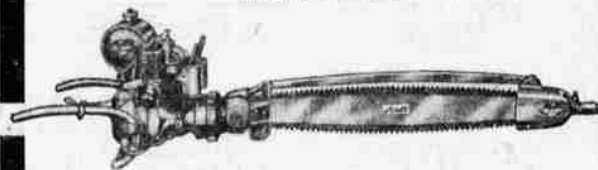
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
