

Piluso Defeats Hager to Retain Wrestling Crown

In a three-fall tussle headlining the weekly wrestling program at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night, Ernie Piluso, Pacific Coast light heavyweight title holder, turned back the challenge of Tex Hager, but he had a close call in doing it. With a fall to the credit of each grappler, Piluso was apparently on the verge of defeat in the third round, when he went to the canvas three successive times from drop kicks. Tex fell short on the fourth attempt, however, and the titleholder, with leverage from his stance against the ropes, lunged into his prostrate foe and pinned him for the verdict, Time, 4:23.

Piluso won the first fall of the bout with his vaunted headlock, in 12:40. He fastened the same hold on Tex in the second round, but Hager managed to free himself and retaliated with drop kicks and a press to even the score in 7:15.

The semi-final between Georges Dusette and Bob Kenaston ended in a one-fall-apiece draw within the 30-minute time limit. Kenaston took fall No. 1 with a reverse chin lock in 9:35 and Dusette won No. 2 with his headlock in 11:45. The third and final round saw both men in a slugger duel when the gong ended hostilities.

Joe Wolf, newcomer from Texas, won Referee Elton Owen's decision over "Bulldog" Jackson in the card opener. Jackson was at his meanest, using about everything in his repertoire of forbidden tactics despite repeated warnings from Referee Elton Owen. Finally Owen halted the fracas in 12:20 and gave the Texan the victory nod. The crowd of 600 roared acclaim.

Feller's Injury Paves Way For Yank Victory, 2-0

The throng which filled Cleveland's Municipal Stadium yesterday for a glimpse of its pitching idol, blazied Bobby Feller, almost witnessed a tragedy when the speedball king was forced to leave the field in the seventh inning of the first game of a scheduled doubleheader with the New York Yankees when he pulled a back muscle. Feller's injury later was described as not serious and the Tribe expected him to take his regular turn next Thursday.

Feller's abrupt retirement spoiled a thrilling scoreless duel with the Yankees' Bevens, the Cleveland ace having fanned seven to raise his strikeout total to 246 in 239 innings. With Feller out of the way, the Yankees went on to win 2-0, getting the winning markers in the ninth inning off Lemon, who had taken over for Feller. The second game was halted by rain in the top of the second inning.

Doerr Clouts Two Homers
The American League-leading Red Sox knocked Detroit's Newhouse from the hill for the third time this season and plastered him with his fourth defeat against 20 victories as the Sox trimmed the Tigers 9-4.

Doerr, the lad who spoiled Fel-

ler's bid for a no-hitter last week, was Newhouse's chief tormentor, the brilliant Boston second baseman bashing the Tigers' ace for two homers, one with the bases full. In all Doerr drove in seven runs.

Brooklyn increased its National League lead over the second place St. Louis Cardinals to two full games by winning a close 5-4 game from the Cincinnati Reds in 14 innings. A squeeze bunt by Reese with the bases full and one out brought in Schultz with the winning run.

Medwick sent the game into overtime when he smashed his 200th homer of his career with a four-run frame. The Hungarian clouter thus joins seven other active major leaguers who have hit 200 or more home runs during their careers.

Cards, Phillies Split

The Cards lost a half game to the Dodgers when they could do no better than gain an even split with the Philadelphia Phillies. The Redbirds won the opener 7-0 behind the two-hit shutout pitching of Dickson, but Pollet went down to his sixth defeat in the nightcap when Tabor found him for a 12th inning homer which gave the Phils the game 3-2.

Coming from behind in each game, the Boston Braves twice defeated the Chicago Cubs, 6-5 and 6-4, to move past the Reds into fourth place.

The twin victory was marred by the accidents to Shortstop Cullen who was hit in the face by a pitched ball in the seventh inning of the second game and was carried off the field.

With Budnik and Kennedy allowing the Pirates only one run, a homer by Gustine, the New York Giants swept both ends of a doubleheader from Pittsburgh, 4-0 and 10-1.

The White Sox also got splendid pitching from left-handers Smith and Pappis to beat the Washington Senators twice, 3-1 and 1-0.

Relief Pitcher Ferriek received credit for both victories as the St. Louis Browns beat the Philadelphia Athletics twice 6-5 and 7-4.

Umpqua Chiefs Post Victory Over Gold Hill, 5 to 3

Roseburg's Umpqua Chiefs made another entry on the credit side of the ledger when they defeated Gold Hill 5 to 3, in a Southern Oregon baseball league game on Finlay Field Sunday afternoon. Taking a 3-1 lead in the first inning, the Chiefs were never headed, but ran into trouble in the sixth frame, when Gold Hill pushed two runs across the plate and had two men on base when the third out was made.

Walker, lead-off man for Gold Hill, smacked out a single to start the ball game. He was trapped off first base, but DeBernardi threw the ball high over second in attempting the put-out, and Walker went to third, scoring after Hill's catch of Smith's long fly into left field.

The chiefs tallied three runs in their half of the inning after two were out. Shinn and Hill hit for singles, and both scored on Scherner's double into center field. Scherner stole third, and scored when Smith, third baseman, fielded Huggins' grounder but made a wild throw past first base.

Roseburg tallied one run in the fifth when Virgil Sanders drew a walk, went to second on a passed ball, and scored when George Sanders singled into right field. George was out trying to stretch his hit into a double.

Visitors Threaten in 6th

Gold Hill made a strong bid to get back into the game at the opening of the sixth inning. Smith lashing out a triple after one was out and scoring on a fielder's choice, which put Blevins on first. Martin singled to put runners on first and second. Clark bounced to Pitcher Long, who threw Blevins out at third, but Martin came in to score, when Scherner, over-anxious for the third out, threw into the dirt at first after fielding Paul Dimmick's hard grounder to shortstop. Hill made a nice running catch of Kirk's fly into short left to halt the rally.

The Chiefs made their final score in the seventh inning when DeBernardi led off with a clean single into left field and went to second on a short passed ball. He was sacrificed to third on a neat bunt by Lovell Baker, and scored when Wills, Gold Hill's second baseman, made a bad throw to pull Clark off first base.

Seals Boost Lead Of Coast League To Four Games

San Francisco's bid for her first Pacific Coast League pennant since 1935 loomed more impressive today against the backdrop of a record-breaking series in which the Seals humbled second-place Oakland and increased their loop leadership to four games.

The host Seals won the series, five games to Oakland's two. Yesterday the two teams played another of their trans-bay "comuter" doubleheaders. Shea hurled the Acorns to a 6-3 victory in the game at Oakland. The losing pitcher was Rosso, who was charged with dropping both the games the Seals lost to their cross-bay rivals.

With Jansen hurling eight-hit ball in the second game, the Seals closed out the series in their home park with a 6-1 victory. It was Jansen's 22nd win of the season.

This week San Francisco takes on last-place Seattle at Seattle, while the Acorns entertain San Diego. Hollywood goes to Portland and Sacramento to Los Angeles.

Sacramento won its series with San Diego, seven games to one, and by virtue of their double win yesterday the Solons gained the upper division and replaced Hollywood in fourth place. The Solons choked off a ninth inning San Diego rally to win the first game, 6-3, and a four-run home run by Conroy helped them win

the nightcap, 12-7.

Third-place Los Angeles mauled Hollywood, winning the series, 6-1.

The doornat Seattle Rainiers rose against their northern brethren, the Portland Beavers, and blasted the seventh-place Oregonians twice yesterday. The Rainiers spotted Portland a 2-0 lead and, on the strength of two wild pitches by Portland's Mooty and three successive singles, went on to win the first game 3-2.

In the extra eighth inning of the nightcap, Portland pitcher Fischer walked Stickle with the bases loaded to force in the winning run as Seattle triumphed, 1-0.

In Saturday's games, San Francisco beat Oakland 4-2; Portland edged out Seattle 5-4; Sacramento shut out San Diego 3-0; and Los Angeles nipped Hollywood 7-6.

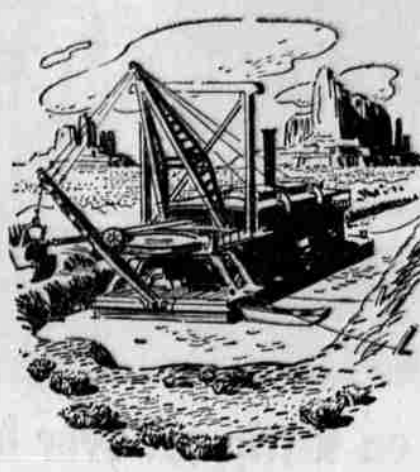

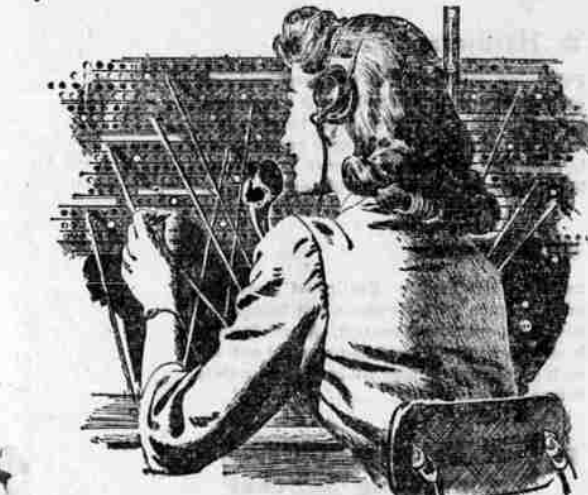
