benches would carry institutional advertising. The application was rejected.

Councilman A. J. Townsend urged that the Library Park, which is littered with newspapers and trash following the weekly band concerts, be cleaned up, since many visitors to the city use the park as a place to sit during the day. The matter was referred to the street committee.

City Treasurer T. J. Brown reported total collections of \$3,354.67 during July. Taxes accounted for \$2,137.31; fines, \$607; licenses, \$340; sundries, \$270.21. He also reported collection of \$204 for the milk fund.

Fire Chief Glenn H. Taylor reported 10 alarms were answered during July, with property at risk valued at \$11,020. Seventeen in-

spections were made, two fire hazards removed, and 102 fire permits issued.

Fires occurred in one dwelling, one auto court, one restaurant, two motor vehicles. There were three grass fires. Actual loss—amounted to \$100. Fires were caused, one by electricity, two by sparks, one by hot grease, two by matches, one each by an overheated flue, rubbish and litter, fireworks, and an unknown cause.

prices. He said they should begin to re-appear in stores in about 30 days.

OPA said the 16 per cent textile increase will boost cotton clothing prices six to eight per cent and jump the cost of household linens about 17 per cent.

Rothschild, however, expressed belief the OPA clothing price estimate is "on the conservative side."

Anti-Inflation Advance
While OPA was boosting textile prices to meet requirements of the new price control law, the agency's consumer advisory committee called for caution in lifting ceilings from basic commodities, especially food.

The committee urged government agencies, including the new price decontrol board, to take a "strong stand" against "premature" elimination of controls.

This advice topped a five-point anti-inflation program the committee offered yesterday. Other recommendations:

1. Creation of a strong consumers' organization "on a local

lative proposals, the President was wrong. The contest took on an element missing since the late President Roosevelt aided in the 1938 defeat of Representative John J. O'Connor, New York Democrat. Mr. Roosevelt's efforts, however, failed to unseat four other Democrats that year.

Axtell Backed by PAC
Like O'Connor, Slaughter incurred the presidential wrath because of his actions as a member of the powerful House Rules committee.

Enos A. Axtell, Mr. Truman's choice, and Jerome Walsh, former OPA attorney, fought it out with Slaughter for the Democratic nomination while the President voted in the adjoining fourth district, at his home town of Independence.

Axtell carried both presidential and CIO-Political Action Committee support, as well as the Pendergast machine backing the third candidate. Walsh has asked House Speaker Sam Rayburn for a congressional investigation of spending in behalf of both of his opponents.

In a statewide Missouri race, Senator Frank P. Briggs (D.) is seeking renomination in a battle with two opponents. B. Marvin Casteel, St. Joseph, a lieutenant colonel during the war and a former superintendent of the state highway patrol is expected to furnish most of the opposition. Five are seeking the Republican nomination, including James P. Kem, Kansas City attorney; former State Senator Ray Mabey; former Representative William P. Elmer; William McKinley Thomas, St. Louis shoe factory employe and Herman G. Crosby, St. Louis.

Five Other States Voting
Other primaries: Virginia—Senator Harry Byrd (D.), opposed by the CIO-PAC, seeks renomination in a race with Martin A. Hutchinson, Richmond lawyer who says he isn't a candidate of organized labor. There are five primary contests for House seats.

Kansas—Representative Frank Carlson, Republican member of the House Ways and Means committee, is regarded by party leaders as the likely GOP nominee for governor. He has two opponents.

The Democratic gubernatorial race finds former Governor Harry H. Woodring, who has called for modification of the state's constitution to permit sale of liquor, contesting with three others.

There also are contests for five or six House seats, all held by Republicans. New Hampshire—Governor Charles M. Dale (R.) is seeking

renomination with Representative Sherman Adams, Dale, former Portsmouth mayor, as his chief opponent.

F. Clyde Keefe, four times mayor of Dover, seeks Democratic nomination for governor in a race with Harry Carlson, former assistant secretary of commerce.

West Virginia—CIO-endorsed Senator Hartley M. Kilgore (D.) seeking renomination in a contest with J. Buhl Shahan, former naval lieutenant commander. Thomas Sweeney, Wheeling insurance man, is contesting with Claude R. Hill, mayor of Oak Hill, for the Republican nomination.

Arkansas—Democrats in five districts will select congressional nominees.

The complaint alleges further that in 1945 the total amount of new first mortgages placed on

multiple dwellings, office buildings, hotels and other commercial and industrial structures in the New York City area totaled about \$225,000,000, and that the members of the Mortgage Conference made approximately 60 per cent of such loans.

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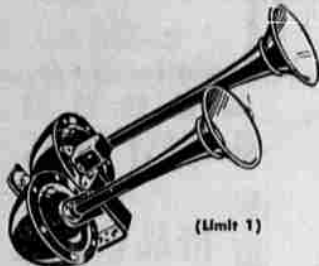
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state and national basis" as an "indispensable part of the foundation for effective government action in controlling inflation."

2. Coordination of the anti-inflation fight by President Truman, who should "take immediate steps to set up advisory committees to represent the consumer view in all agencies charged with administering the present (price control) act."

3. Strengthened OPA enforcement of all price ceilings.

4. Speedy adoption of administrative policies "which will guarantee that commodities will be recontrolled when prices give evidence of becoming inflationary."

More Controls Lifted
OPA removed price controls yesterday from another 52 items, including twist chewing tobacco, evaporated goat milk and such foodstuffs as imported crepes suzette.

OPA said that any of the items specially decontrolled under the new price law will not be placed back under ceilings even though controls on major food items from which they are derived should be ordered reestablished.

The order made permanent price control suspensions previously ordered for three animal feeds—clam shells, oyster shells and mineral mixed feed.

Caribbean Quake Damage Increased
CIUDAD TRUJILLO, Dominican Republic, Aug. 6.—(AP)—The government rushed aid today to areas south of the Monte Cristi mountain range, stricken Sunday by an earthquake and tidal wave which took a toll of at least two dead and damaged more than 11 towns in this Caribbean republic.

Eye witnesses reports received today from Matanzas on the north coast, said a tidal wave swept inland as much as a mile so swiftly that it caught a party fleeing in an automobile.

The eyewitness said the residents had been forewarned, however, when the waters first receded much below the low tide mark and had taken refuge in trees and high places.

Only eight of the 300 houses in Matanzas were reported left standing and at Nagua 50 or 60 houses were destroyed and damaged.

Wrecked telegraph and communication facilities made it difficult to get a clear picture of the damage wrought by the quake, which apparently centered in the deepest point in the Atlantic ocean, approximately 50 miles off the east coast of the Dominican Republic.

Meanwhile apprehension gripped the Republic as new tremors shook the ground here yesterday and blacked out radio communications for several hours.

Fears were expressed that many regions not yet heard from had been hard hit by Sunday's catastrophe.
