Railroad Car Shortage Hits Lumber Output

promising future for Douglas County.

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Aug. 7.—(AP)—Imminent shutdown of the entire lumber industry for this area was forecast as a distinct possibility today following a survey of mill owners, buyers, processors and other dealers affected.

Faced with immediate prospect of a general layoff, affecting hundreds of thousands of workers, lumbermen placed the blame on shortage of shipping facilities. Without exception, mill operators stated they were able to secure no more than half enough railroad cars to take care of high priority shipments.

Southern Pacific officials, representing the only railroad serving this area, countered with the statement that cars were being diverted to eastern traffic and that they were pro-rating all cars received to shippers with the highest priorities and greatest need. The car shortage has been felt here for approximately a month, during the peak of the lumber season and is growing steadily worse, mill owners say.

Workman Dies in Fire From Welding Sparks

PORTLAND, Aug. 7.—(AP)—Albert W. Abernathy, 32, former Baker resident, burned to death yesterday in a flash fire that engulfed him within seconds after welding sparks hit the wood preservative he was applying. Fellow-workmen at the Columbia Sand and Gravel Company pit played a hose on the bunker underneath which he was working in a vain attempt to enable him to escape.

U. S. Secret Agents Duel By Mistake; One Wounded

FRANKFURT, Germany, Aug. 7.—(AP)—Two U. S. Army secret agents mistook each other for German civilians in Munich last week and fought a gun duel in which one received four bullet wounds.

The counter-intelligence agent wounded was James Caywood of Henryetta, Okla. He was reported improving after being near death.

Caywood and Gerard Buhrman, a Dutch national employed by the Army as a special agent, were both working on the same investigation, but did not know it.

When Buhrman saw a man in civilian clothes leave a house he was watching, he started to arrest him. The "civilian," who was Caywood in disguise, pulled a pistol but Buhrman beat him to the draw and shot him twice in the neck and twice in the leg before Caywood identified himself.
