

Defeat By Giants Prunes Brooklyn's Lead to 2 Games

The lowly Giants, 15 games behind the leader with 52 to go, are in a hopeless position in the National League pennant race but you never could prove it by the contending Cardinals and Dodgers.

When the Brooks really needed to take one with a chance to stretch their lead to a full three games, last night, they couldn't bump off their rivals from Manhattan.

Koslo, touched for five hits in three innings, tightened up and held the Dodgers hitless the rest of the way in recording his 12th victory of the season, 5-2. The result reduced Brooklyn's first place margin to two games. The Cardinals were rained out of their game at Pittsburgh.

Chicago pulled out of a three-game losing spin to smother Cincinnati, 3-0, on Passeau's fourth hit pitching. The Bruins trail the Dodgers by 7½ games.

The Boston Braves proved they still can beat the Phillies although out by a 10 to 5 margin when they rushed over two runs in the 12th inning to earn a 3-1 edge for Sain.

Citizens of Drain are donating time and labor toward development of a two-acre plot of ground adjacent to the high school into the North Douglas Living War Memorial, which will include a swimming pool and playground on its completion, Jim S. Whipple, chairman, said this week.

Battle Royal Will Feature Next Mat Card in Roseburg

A "battle royal," wrestling's greatest extravaganza, will be presented to Douglas County mat followers at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night—Matchmaker Don Owen's feature of his weekly grappling presentation here.

Four of the best-known and top-ranked light-heavyweights will vie in the free-for-all for an attractive \$400 aggregate purse, along with a highly-touted newcomer to local wrestling circles.

Personnel of the five-man event will include Jack Pinto, the flashing youngster from Hollywood; Billy McEuin, the southwestern area champion from Texas; Mike Nazarian, the Armenian villain; Jack Kiser, the popular and talented ex-coast champ from St. Johns, and Kary Gray, the newcomer.

Gray comes here from Wisconsin and before entering the Army nearly five years ago, held the world junior-heavyweight championship. The husky grappler possesses a powerful full-Nelson hold that is different from that used by Georges Dusette, but just as effective. Although fundamentally a clean, scientific matman, Gray at times resorts to a flaccid attack—mostly as a means of defense against mat men.

Two matches will follow the initial fireworks. All five matmen, along with Referee Elton Owen, will enter the ring simultaneously and the free-for-all action will continue until only two grapplers remain standing. There are virtually no restrictions during the hectic stages of elimination.

Only three of the contestants will share in the \$400 purse. The two finalists will vie for \$250 and \$100 "cuts" and the winner of the semi-final, between the second and third men eliminated,
