

# Cong. May-Garson Case May Give GOP 'Teapot Dome' Scandal to Rout Democrats

WASHINGTON — Congressmen running for reelection this year are scared of what New York Senator James M. Mead's committee expose of the Congressman Andrew J. May-Garson brothers goings-on may do to them now and in November.

For years the Republicans have been looking for a "Democratic Teapot Dome" scandal. This may be it. Heap it on to the 51 per cent Republican majority reported in the last Gallup poll and you have the makings of a good old-fashioned political rout.

A few congressmen are inclined to feel that the lightning has struck already. They point to the fact that up to the time the May investigation began, less than half a dozen political upsets had occurred in nearly 200 primary contests. Defeat of that many congressmen running for reelection is politically negligible.

### May in Role of Goat

But in last week's Georgia primary, four of the incumbents were knocked out and in the Oklahoma primary three more stalwarts bit the dust. To some political doers, this is Andy May's handwriting of doom upon the walls of the Temple.

If a number of the incumbent congressmen are unseated in later primaries, they may be able to blame part of their troubles on Andy May.

What will happen to Congressman May himself is a particularly intriguing puzzle. It may be put on a good act of being a "poor" persecuted congressman, the voters of his district might rally behind him and vote him back into office. Senator Bilbo got that kind of an endorsement in Mississippi.

### Other Cases Forgotten

Financially, the amounts involved in the Garson case are peanuts, when compared to the total volume of war contracts. Garson's 19 companies got only 78 million dollars worth of business. Stack that up against General Motors' 13 billion dollars worth of war contracts and it means little. More than 10,000 war fraud cases were prosecuted by the Department of Justice while the fighting was going on. They scarcely caused a ripple of public interest.

Even the indictment against Congressman James M. Curley of Boston for his connection with the Engineers Group, Inc., war contracts brokerage racket caused no national uprising of wrath as the May-Garson case has done.

The thing that makes the May-Garson expose such political dynamite is that it is so human. In and out of the witness chair move a parade of characters right of something by Ring Lardner.

Benjamin Franklin Field, "Doctor" Henry M. Garson and his brother, Murray, Joe Weiss, Al Jacobson. A couple of good-looking stenographers. Parties at New York's Hotel Pierre. Gals draping their arms about a fat, bald congressman. Over-stuffed generals dancing with brides. Senators. Bribery. A plethora of shady deals and criminal records against a Washington backdrop. Flash back to France where a few mortar shells exploded too soon to kill a few G. I. Joes.

Deserves 1946 Oscar. What you have here is the Washington that most people tell you doesn't exist. This is the Hollywood idea of Washington. It is directed not by Senator Mead but by Frank Capra. Character actors aren't needed. The cast can play it straight. Award it this year's Oscar as the great Amer-

ican tragic-comedy and you can't go wrong.

The timing is perfect. It comes just at the psychological moment when the voters may be looking for someone to blame for all their woes. The first convenient goats for this political Bikini may be the candidates up for reelection to Congress.

Senator Mead is making a lot of political hay for himself by this expose after a slow and undramatic start as successor to Harry Truman at the head of the War Investigating Committee. If the general resentment against the "ins" which this May-Garson probe has stirred up, should react in such a way as to include Senator Mead among the "outs," that would be the unkindest cut of all.

### Mixed Feed Basis Now Quarterly

Manufacturers of mixed feeds may now base the use of wheat in their products on a quarterly rather than monthly period, the Department of Agriculture has announced in Amendment No. 13 to War Food Order 144. The amendment is effective as of July 1.

In California, Idaho, Oregon, Nevada, Utah, Washington and parts of Montana, the base period is now the corresponding quarter of 1945. In this area, only enough

wheat may be used to bring a manufacturer's total use of grain during any calendar quarter up to 80 per cent of the amount used during the base period.

In all other states, the use of wheat is restricted in each calendar quarter to an average of 60 per cent for each month of the quarter based on the average monthly quantity used in the period December 1, 1945 to January 31, 1946.

While no increase in the total quantity of wheat used for mixed feed manufacture is allowed by the amendment, it gives manufacturers a longer period of time in which to manage their wheat allowance.
