LEAST OF ALL the kind of spending involved in PWA projects.

LET'S see if we can't put that a little more clearly.

If you want shirts and shorts and suits and butter and eggs and meat and houses (as nearly everybody does), you DON'T want the government to use up a large share of the available materials and labor in building flood, control projects and such that CAN WAIT until we're better able to afford them.

We need food, clothing and shelter NOW. We can wait quite a while, without being hurt, for our PWA projects.

That is the situation in a nutshell.

LET'S stay clear-eyed as to WHY such an order is issued. The idea is probably beginning to spread in official Washington that reckless spending isn't too popular any more.

So, with a critically important election coming up in November, the administration is beginning to make ECONOMY gestures.

Paste this in your hat: The politicians will SPEND as long as they think spending will get them re-elected. Whenever they get the idea that too much spending will DEFEAT them, they'll QUIT SPENDING.

That is the way politics works.

NOTE carefully that this PWA spending is postponed ONLY until next spring. If the spenders are re-elected this fall, the spending will be RESUMED as soon as the election is safely over.

REPUBLICAN National Chairman J. Carroll Reece says in Portland that if a Republican Congress is elected in November it will promptly uncover many cases of war profiteering. He adds that nothing smaller than the Pentagon building could hold all the profiteers.

DON'T let yourself be misled too much by his statement. Remember that the Republicans are OUT and want IN. They're promising us a thorough cleaning if they get in.

They're primarily interested in getting in.

STILL— If you are dissatisfied with the way things are going in Washington, about the only way you can get a change is to vote Democrats out and vote Republicans in. If you vote Democrats back in, they will naturally accept it as an endorsement of what they have been doing.

That's the way our political system works.

IF there has been corruption, the general Democratic desire will be to play it down as much as possible, because bringing it out into the open light of day will tend to DISCREDIT their side.

The present desire of Republicans, who are OUT, is to uncover as much as possible in order to put the Democratic INS on the spot.

THE sincere and intelligent part of the public, of course, is merely anxious to drive corruption out of government and keep it out.

LABOR TURNING TO RIGHT

Labor economists, reporting in the CIO's *Economic Outlook*, declare that unions can "accomplish more by price action than by wage action," to maintain present income. Stating that a 15 or 20 per cent rise in the cost of living appears likely, unless inflationary trends are checked, the labor economists point out that a 20 per cent rise in living costs would be equivalent to a wage cut of nearly 17 per cent. This report, following a policy conference by the CIO's executive board in July, where a price war was tentatively outlined, becomes a virtual declaration, expected to culminate in organization of labor's power to beat down inflationary prices.

It is not to be expected that labor leaders will admit their contribution in creating inflation, but it is obvious that the recent epidemic of strikes and labor disorders had a pronounced effect in price advances. Labor secured, through its strike effort, a general advance in wages of about 18 per cent. But prices, in turn, have gone up 20 or 25 per cent and are still climbing upward, so that labor is worse off than before. An attempt to counter higher living costs by another round of wage demands would result in pushing prices up another step, adding further to the workingman's financial woes.

AFL leaders are recognizing this fact by urging their unions to step up production. President William Green has advocated increased production as the most effective weapon against inflation.

CIO leadership, declaring that production is not "the sovereign cure for inflation which many voices today proclaim it to be," proposes mobilization of buyers.

Between efforts of these two great organizations, inflation is apt to get a sound trouncing in the next few months.

Unions are beginning to put the pressure on their members to halt slow-down practices, increase individual and collective efficiency, aid management in elimination of bottlenecks, and, in general, get production back into high gear. If, at the same time, an orderly system of buyers' resistance to high prices can be set up and maintained, thus putting the screws on unscrupulous profiteering, the American public will have real occasion for thankfulness.

Labor, of course, is not surrendering its claim for higher wages. Leaders, reportedly, are mapping out a campaign for new demands in 1947, after production is brought to high level. With industry at full speed, the national payroll and income high, labor will be in a good position to demand more wages. Under such conditions it will have a greater measure of public sympathy and cooperation.

A workman who is dependable, efficient and industrious is generally recognized as being justified in seeking better remuneration. But a laborer who is irresponsible, roistering, careless and unproductive does not receive sympathetic endorsement of wage demands, particularly when augmented by force.

Labor's reputation has suffered from actions of radical leadership. Present indications are that the rank and file of organized labor is demanding more responsible action. Labor appears to be cleaning its own house and is taking a more serious view of economic problems.

By stimulating production, combatting unwarranted price increases, and giving cooperation to earliest possible reconversion it can not only best serve its own membership, but at the same time regain lost prestige and render patriotic service to the country as a whole.

Shadow of Noose Fails to Affect Nazis' Appetites

NUERNBERG—The shadow of the gallows hanging over 20 men on trial because they served Hitler's cruel purposes hasn't affected their appetites. Nor are they being troubled sleeping in their tiny cells.

The equanimity of the top ranking Nazis imprisoned for a year is a source of constant surprise to their jailers.

If anything, most of them are thriving on the "sanatorium" life they are compelled to follow.

"Their appetites are enviable," says Col. B. C. Andrus, outline regular army officer in charge of the security detail. "The remarkable is the ability of the prisoners to break off the sleeping pill habit."

"We have found that a great many Germans are in the habit of taking sleeping pills," Andrus told the Associated Press. "The doctors counter this by decreased dosages and in many cases wean them from this practice."

The original strict rules forbidding any two defendants to fraternize still are in effect. It's probably just as well for a half dozen first class gruzzles have built up. They keep their enemies rather well hidden in the courtroom. None of them, for instance, will speak to Jew baiter Julius Streicher, except Wilhelm Frick, former minister of the interior. Frick, little Walter Funk, ex-Reichsbank president, sits on the other side of Streicher in the box and keeps his back turned.

Turning to Religion
Andrus says discipline of the prisoners is exemplary. They stand at attention when Allied officers or dignitaries approach and make a slight bow waiting to be addressed before they speak.

Most of them have turned avidly to religion, Andrus said. Alfred Rosenberg, propagator of the Nazi credo that would have made Hitler a divinity, is a hold-out—"doesn't attend church and doesn't care to discuss religion or philosophy with the chaplain."

Andrus revealed that some of the defendants and their wives, connected with the trial had instruments for suicide and four cases of "concealed poison at the time of the confinement." Under extremely close guard, however, they have been unable to obtain any substitute.

Coins Will Honor Negro Educator

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—(AP)—President Truman has signed bills providing for commemorative coins for Iowa's entry into the Union and honoring Booker T. Washington but said he would "look with disfavor" on any such measure in the future.

Mr. Truman said he agreed with the Treasury that so many designs on American coins resulting from minting commemorative pieces tends:

To create confusion, to increase the possibility of counterfeiting, to encourage traffic in commemorative coins for private profit, and, in general, to detract from the fundamental purpose for which money is issued, namely, to provide a medium of exchange.

One of the bills authorizes coining of 100,000 fifty-cent pieces in recognition of the centennial of Iowa's statehood. The other authorizes five million 50-cent pieces in honor of the late Booker T. Washington, Negro leader and educator.

The coins will be sold for \$1 each to help establish a birthplace memorial to Washington at Rocky Mount, Va.

Congress Controlled by Coalition, Delacy Asserts

SPOKANE, Aug. 8.—(AP)—Representative Hugh Delacy (D-Wash.) told the western state conference of the International Association of Machinists last night that a third political party was not "in the cards now" and urged its members to support progressive members of either party.

Delacy asserted the recent congress was controlled by the National Association of Manufacturers through a coalition of Republicans and "poll-tax Democrats."

"The Republican party is almost controlled by reactionaries," Delacy continued, "but we can't depend exclusively on the Democrats either."
