## Disgraceful Conduct of GIs Toward Japanese Brings On Crackdown From Army Head

TOKYO.—(AP)—The crackdown by Lt. Gen. Robert L. Eichelberger on the "drunken bullies" of the American occupation forces in Japan highlights a subject which has been a major disturbance to occupation officials—the behavior of American soldiers in Japan. Indicative of the proportions of the disturbance is seen in the fact that the Eighth Army commander saw fit to release his letter for publication after having made the subject a part of his Fourth of July address to assembled troops.

It was stressed that the conduct of the majority of the occupation personnel has been above reproach, but the objectionable minority have assaulted women, maliciously beaten Japanese men, stole, engaged in black market operations and by their "deliberate bullying attitude" have made the Japanese suspicious of the democracy which our troops are supposed to represent.

In the words of Eichelberger: "One drunken, slovenly bully can neutralize the good impression made by a dozen fine soldiers."

Not only have the Japanese been distressed with the performance of the objectionable minority, American wives who have arrived recently have been sharply critical of troops who subject them to whistles and howls when they appear on the streets. The sight of American troops openly fraternizing with Japanese women likewise has been censured by the American women.

In this connection, it should be noted that not only enlisted men are seen in the company of Japanese women. Officers of high rank may be seen driving kimonoed Japanese women in their cars.

Col. C. V. Cadwell of Arcadia, Calif., Eighth Army provost marshal, said he believed Eichelberger's letter condemning the minority troop action was prompted by the general's desire to get the "right picture" to the new soldiers who largely make up the occupation forces. The provost marshal said there had been no marked increase in any particular type of offenses, although Eichelberger said he had "received an increasing number of reports of crimes committed by Americans."

## OPA Profit Control Phase Clashes With Sole Privilege Of Taxation, Critics Contend

WASHINGTON.—This column many times has presented the arguments of the anti-inflationists for keeping a tight hold on wage and price controls. There's another side to the picture.

In the forthcoming battle in Congress over extension of OPA, those fighting for a drastic limitation of OPA activities (and they insist they aren't inflationists and don't favor elimination of price controls) have one powerful argument they are going to hammer on hard:

That OPA, through "arbitrary and unauthorized regulations," is actually indulging in profit controls, a realm in which Congress has legislated that the only control shall be taxation. U. S. Tradition at Stake. Corporate, excess profit and individual income taxes see to it, these legislators will argue, that nobody gets more out of anything than he should. If, they contend, OPA is allowed "to continue to make price controls secondary to profit controls," the historic American methods of doing business will be destroyed.

They will assert that Administrator Chester Bowles "arbitrarily" reduced the traditional 24 per cent contract between car manufacturers and dealers by four per cent and gave the difference to the manufacturers, and will argue that this is completely beyond the province of OPA, "an utter contempt for Congressional mandates."

Also under the guns will come MAP (Maximum Price Regulation) 605, governing manufacturers' prices for shirts, shorts, pajamas and related items. This covers items which can't be purchased freely by Mr. and Mrs. You-and-Me, but which OPA says are plentiful in warehouses. Some

## Scholars, Technicians, Not Snoopers, 'Vamps,' Wanted In U. S. Intelligence Service

WASHINGTON.—Lack of trained career personnel tended to make United States intelligence activities before the war a rather amateurish, hit-and-miss enterprise.

This to some extent is being corrected. From lessons learned in the war, the National Intelligence Authority (NIA), our new foreign intelligence system, is proceeding on broad, realistic lines.

The emphasis today is on large staffs of scholars and technical specialists, rather than on sinister international snoopers and wily female charmers.

"Ninety per cent or more of intelligence is freely available to anyone who wants it," says William Benton, assistant secretary of state for public affairs. "You can get it in libraries and bookshops and on news stands, from individuals and from our accredited missions abroad. It's open intelligence."

**Data Easily Obtained**

Masses of such data are channeled back to this country to secretaries of state, war and navy, who compose NIA, and various other government agencies. Often the most prosaic government announcements regarding contracts, shipments and assignment of personnel reveal information of high strategic value.

Within the United States are hidden mines of information about foreign powers. In fact, officials of the now disbanded Office of Strategic Service (OSS) estimated that 80 per cent of the information used in the air war

## Swiss Citizenship Expensive as Well As Hard to Obtain

BERN.—Twenty-nine Swiss, mostly residents of Germany, have lost Swiss citizenship because they were accused of conspiracy against Switzerland's security.

In addition, 56 persons lost Swiss citizenship in 1945 because they had made false declarations to obtain Swiss nationality or because their conduct was prejudicial to Switzerland.

Loss of Swiss citizenship in many cases is a financial loss. It costs a lot of money to become a Swiss citizen. Government statistics showed that in 1943 in 1,684 cases of naturalization, individuals paid the equivalent of \$361,000 to the communities and \$170,000 to the cantons of their residence.

Individual fees for naturalization vary among the various communities and cantons. The authorities of the communities and of the cantons decide whether citizenship can be granted, but the federal justice and police department is the final authority.

"We do not want anyone to become a Swiss citizen who has worshipped foreign ideologies or has taken an active part in foreign politics," a spokesman of the justice and police department said.

A foreigner must have lived for many years in the community to which he would like to belong, before he can fill out an application for naturalization.

"In the last ten years," said the representative of the justice and police department, "the practice has been not to grant citizenship to a foreigner unless he has resided in one and the same canton for at least 20 years."

In 1945, 814 foreigners with their families, a total of 1,526 persons, were granted Swiss citizenship.
