

Rainbows Down Monarchs; Elks Trim Sutherlin

The Rainbow Grill held a one-game edge today in the three-game softball league play-off series with the Monarchs, as the result of a 9 to 4 victory at Pinney field last night. In the second game the Elks Club defeated Sutherlin, 10 to 9.

A triple by L. Baker, with the bases loaded, in the last of the fifth dashed the hopes of the Monarchs.

Wimberly had put the Rainbows in the lead in the first inning when he drove a home run deep into left field.

The Monarchs, however, went out in front in the fourth inning, when the Grillers had a temporary lapse in defensive play. The inning was going nicely and two were out, when Stanstead lost control and walked Ward and Rice in succession. Morgan drove in both runs with a clean single, and Laurence was safe on an error which permitted Morgan to score, giving the Monarchs a 3 to 1 lead.

But the Rainbows opened their heavy artillery in the fifth, with successive hits by Boucock, Atterbury, and Stanstead, to fill the bases. Baker then came to the plate and cleaned the bases with a lustrous single, and scored, in turn, on a safety by Baughman.

They continued scoring in the sixth, being aided by an error, which, coupled with two hits, produced three runs.

Stanstead, who allowed the Monarchs only four hits, put the first man on base in the seventh, giving the Monarchs another tally, as the runner advanced and scored on two infield plays.

minian Republic, said virtually all the houses in Matanzas, which had a population of 1,000, were washed away by the tidal wave and that the destruction was equally severe in Julia Molina and San Francisco de Macoris.

Attempts by the government to rush food to the stricken areas have been seriously hampered by the washing out of roads and bridges by flooded rivers.

The shocks were believed caused by a shift in the bed of the Atlantic at its deepest point 50 miles northeast of the island, where the water is 28,080 feet deep.

Molotov Walks Out

DeGasper spoke the case for the former Axis power before the conference after a morning session devoted to an inconclusive debate over an invitation to Albania to attend. In the course of that debate Russia's Molotov walked out on an address by Tsaldaris, chief Greek delegate and foe of the Albanian regime.

The morning session adjourned in a scene of disorder with Molotov's assistant, Vishinsky, attempting to hold the floor against the will of Chairman Bidault. The French president banded his chairman's gong and asked Vishinsky to respect "the privileges of the chair."

Molotov left the chamber in similar fashion yesterday when Tsaldaris was speaking, as he was today, in opposition to the Yugoslav proposal that Albania be invited to the peace conference negotiations with a "consultative" voice.
