Forest Grove-Born Larry Jansen Will Join N. Y. Giants

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 12.—(AP)—Larry Jansen, whose control and curves have won nearly one-fourth of the victories that put the San Francisco Seals on top of the Pacific Coast Baseball League, will join the New York Giants next season.

His record of 23 wins against three defeats this season and an earned run average of 1.48 runs per game makes him one of the top minor league hurlers of the country.

The Giants announced yesterday that the deal which will take Jansen to the New York club for spring training will send two Giants to the Seals.

If Jansen stays on the National League team after July 1, 1947, the Seals will get an additional player. The San Francisco club announced no cash was involved in the transaction.

The 26-year-old righthander already this season has surpassed or equalled the records of games won by the Coast League's leading wartime pitchers, save Bob Joyce.

Joyce won 31 games for San Francisco last season and started with the Giants this year but faltered early in the campaign. Jansen, an off-season farmer, was born in Forest Grove, Ore. He began his professional baseball career in 1941 with Salt Lake City on the Pioneer League.

Terminal Pay Bill to Be Aired Here Tonight
A radio discussion of the Terminal Pay bill, as signed by President Truman, will be heard at 8:30 tonight over Radio Station KRNR, Marshall Berga, manager, reports. The original broadcast was made Friday afternoon, but because of insufficient advance notice, KRNR, which had already made program arrangements, was unable to carry the special feature. However, a transcription was prepared and is to be released at a more favorable listening time for those concerned.

The program will present Rear Admiral William J. Carter, chief of the Navy's bureau of supplies and accounts, and Colonel Eugene M. Foster, acting financial officer of the U. S. Army. These two officers will discuss the Terminal Pay bill in detail and provide information of interest to all veterans.

Joe Louis' Farmhouse at Tiller Razed by Flames
The Forest Service fire fighting crew at Tiller Saturday fought a blast which razed the farmhouse of Joe Louis, which was located on a bench above the Tiller-Trail highway. It was reported by Ray B. Hampton, in charge of fire control for the Umpqua National Forest.

The farm was formerly that of Elzer Rainville, which he sold last year to Louis.

Nine men from the Tiller Ranger Station took the Forest Service tank truck to keep the fire from spreading to other buildings on the ranch. There was no wind to fan the flames, Hampton said.

No fires were reported by the Douglas Forest Protective Association over the weekend.

John Marks, Jr., Now on Military Duty in Korea

T-4 John Marks, Jr., 34, of Roseburg, now on duty with the military government in Korea, is assigned to the Department of Education as a motor mechanic.

Formerly employed as a mechanic with Lockwood Motors, T-4 Marks entered the service in December, 1944, and trained at Camp Roberts, Calif. Upon leaving the States one year ago, he served in the Philippines with the 160th Infantry Service Company before being transferred last September to Korea.

The cloudiness somewhat lessens the hazard of forest fires, it was stated, though vigil by forest protection agencies is still on the alert.

Higher Education Board Ups Budget 57 Per Cent

PORTLAND, Aug. 12.—(AP)—A 57 per cent increase in the State Board of Higher Education's budget estimates for instructional and general purposes in the next two years was reported here today by Edgar W. Smith, chairman of the finance committee.

The total was set at \$17,516,946, compared with the current \$12,736,053.

Increased costs and an unprecedented rush of veterans and others to the colleges were re-

sponsible for the higher estimate, Smith said. The budget, he said, is designed to take care of an enrollment of 15,588 students per term, a 65 per cent increase above the pre-war average and 225 per cent above the enrollment when the last legislature was in session.

Fishermen End Strike But Not Pay Hike Urge

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 12.—(AP)—The CIO International Fishermen's Union announced here that its salmon fishing members in California had voted to return to work but to continue a protest against the OPA salmon ceiling price.

The fishermen stopped work earlier this week, but the union announced there was no official strike. About 150 boats were tied up in Eureka by the action.

During the recent lapse in OPA control the price paid by dealers was 22 cents a pound. The OPA ceiling is now 16 cents a pound. Victor B. Martin, Northern California union chairman, said the fishermen believed they could not continue for long selling "their fish at a 1942 price, while some of the supplies which have no ceiling have advanced as much as 300 per cent since 1942."
