DEMONSTRATION AGENT EXPLAINS PRECAUTIONS FOR STORING CLOTHING

Many people who carefully store away winter wear are disappointed to take them out in the fall and find them covered with a growth of mildew. Contrary to popular belief, mildew is not a simple stain explains Miss Wanda Thoreson, home demonstration agent. It is a fungus growth that eventually "eats" into the fibers of cloth, causing serious and permanent damage. It thrives in a damp, warm, dark unventilated place. Therefore, if clothes are even slightly damp when put away, or if dampness reaches them in storage, a closed garment bag and hot summer weather make conditions ideal for the growth of mold.

Before storing clothes, Miss Thoreson advises thorough cleaning, sunning and airing to make sure they are dry, then storing in a dry place or a moisture-proof container. Unless clothes are stored under such precautions, stored clothes should be examined in mid-summer to see if any mildew has started. If so, they

should be removed immediately and brushed, sunned, and dried outdoors before putting away again.

Sponging may remove a light surface growth on wool. Soap and water will remove very fresh mildew stains from washable materials. Mild bleaches may be used on white fabrics. If the mildew is left too long, there is no way of erasing its damage.

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Housing Expediter Wyatt Scored By Lumber Executive

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 13. (AP)—H. V. Simpson, executive vice-president of the West Coast Lumbermen's Association, predicted that the current shortage of railroad freight cars will result in the overstocking of retail lumber yards in the Pacific Northwest.

Although the lumber, originally milled for shipment, may find its way into retail lumber yards, local lumbermen believe that CPA restrictions limiting distribution in certain localities and priorities on lumber for construction may not aid Northwest housing.

Simpson asserted that the National Housing program under Wilson Wyatt has bogged down—that it has done nothing to aid greater lumber production or speed up distribution, and that in statements to the press, Wyatt has virtually admitted failure.

"Worst of all," Simpson said, "Wyatt has raised hopes for veterans which cannot be fulfilled. The release of excessive priorities (for housing) has been a hindrance rather than a help, for no amount of lumber per house is specified and as a result Wyatt does not even know how much lumber is needed to meet these priorities."

Has Done Nothing

"The only way to solve our housing problem is to remove dif-

ficulties standing in the way of production. But what has Wyatt done?"

"The answer is nothing. When Wyatt took office he announced that building codes would be revised to help ease the situation and that steps would be taken to boost the labor supply. But building codes have not been generally revised, and Wyatt does not even claim he has done anything to increase the supply of carpenters, bricklayers or other housing workers. He has done nothing to aid the present railroad car shortage."

"Wyatt has even been working against himself," Simpson stated. "One branch of his organization has approved an Oregon project for building 30,000 houses in the price range most needed. The concern already has plywood for several thousand of these homes and plumbing for several hundred, obtained on priorities from Wyatt's office. But this material must lie unused because another branch of Wyatt's organization has blocked the project by refusing to approve financing for purchasers of these homes."
