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Monarchs Even Series by Nosing Out Rainbows, 9-8

Playing strong defensive ball, the Monarchs defeated the Rainbows 9 to 8, in an exciting softball game Tuesday night, to even their play-off series at one game each. The third and deciding game will be played at Finlay field at 7:30 P. M. Thursday.

The winning team will represent the district in a three-game elimination series with Cottage Grove. The opening game of the district contest will be played Friday night at Cottage Grove, with the second game in Roseburg next Tuesday. The time and location for the third game, if required, will be chosen Tuesday night.

The Monarchs were hard pressed to win last night, after piling up what appeared to be a safe margin.

Baker led off for the Rainbows with a four-ply swat. Although the next two batters walked, the Monarchs cut off two runners at third base and another was forced at second to hold the Rainbows to one run.

Rainbows' Errors Costly

Two costly errors, a fumble at second base and an overthrow at first, gave two Monarch batters life on base in the last of the first inning, and both scored on a lousy triple by George Sanders, the latter scoring when Rice grounded out, second to first. The Monarchs added another in the second on a single by Fred Scherner and a double by Glenz.

The Rainbows annexed one in the fourth, Boucock hitting for two bases, advancing to third on Sanstead's single and scoring on a single by Baker.

Virgil Sanders scored for the Monarchs in the last of the fourth, rapping out a single to start the frame. He went to second on a wild pitch and stole third, scoring on an infield play which caught Fred Scherner at first.

Trailing 2 to 5, the Rainbows uncorked a fifth inning drive which tied the score. Baughman led off with a single, but was forced at second, Loomis being safe at first on a flier's choice. Dominico hit sharply to Bill Scherner at shortstop, and, in an attempted double play, Sanders missed the bag and both runners were safe. Boucock walked to fill the bases, and Atterbury teased a second pass off Virgil Sanders, forcing in one run. Two more tallies were scored when Sanstead hit to center field for two bases, the next two batters going out on caught fly balls.

Rice put the Monarchs back in front in the last of the fifth, when he started the frame with a single, advanced to second and third on wild pitches, and scored as Bill Scherner was thrown out by Shortstop Shapero.

The Monarchs put the game on

ice in the sixth, with three runs, although the Rainbows made a strong bid in the seventh.

After two were out in the last of the sixth, George Sanders singled. Glenz walked, and both advanced on a wild pitch. Rice also drew a walk to fill the bases. Burt singled, scoring Sanders and Glenz. Rice scored when Ward's hard drive was juggled by Baker at third, but Burt was caught off the bag to end the inning.

Fans were given a big thrill in the first of the seventh as the Rainbows staged a determined comeback.

Atterbury led off with a double, scoring on Sanstead's single. Baker was out on a long fly into center, but Shapero doubled to score Sanstead. Wimberly flied out to center. Baughman singled, scoring Sanstead. The rally, however, fell short, when Glenz made a brilliant running catch of Loomis' fly ball into right center.

Pinto Will Again Battle Gray If Jaw Still Intact

Jack Pinto's jaw is not fractured, the young Californian will meet Karl Gray in a grudge wrestling skirmish at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night—the headline attraction of Matchmaker Don Owen's weekly mat show.

Pinto, rated as one of the finest young grapplers in the profession, battled his way into the finals of last week's \$400 "battle royal," along with Gray. The youngster escaped unscathed during the hectic five-man, free-for-all, but not in the finale.

Gray, the highly-touted Wisconsin veteran who once held the world junior heavyweight title, was listed as a clean, scientific matman, but the attractive cash purse was too much for him and he planted a haymaker on Pinto's chin. As a result, Gray won the match, but also received a challenge for a winner-take-all engagement next week.

Owen announced here today that the match can be only tentative until the results of the examination have been determined.

Certain to be on the program, however, will be a semi-final clash between Tex Hager and Billy McEuin, two of the most talented "little" men to bounce around the mat in the Pacific Northwest.

Anticipating the return of Bruno Angelo from a short swing through the southwest, both Hager and McEuin are campaigning for the right as challenger to Angelo's Pacific Coast lightweight championship.

Although McEuin's kidney-punching tactics have won him the southwest light-heavy title and he has more experience than Hager, the erstwhile "Creswell Cyclone" possesses more speed and agility than the tough Texan. The match has the "cauliflower earmarks" of attracting more attention than the potential main event.

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Lack of Materials Bogs Down Portland Buildings

PORTLAND, Aug. 13.—(AP)—About 75 per cent of new building here is bogged down by lack of materials, building inspectors said today.

While in normal times a house is built in about three months, the city now has some 4,000 partly finished homes, some started as early as 1943, inspectors said. And commercial construction makes a total of at least 7,500 structures held up by shortages.
