tionist and challenged him to debate the issue, but the senator said he would stand on his record.

Kenny failed to provide the main contention in the voting yesterday. That came from Ralph M. Emmet, former state adjutant general, veteran of World Wars I and II and member of the defunct Progressive party. Returns from 2,912 precincts gave Goodland 180,824, Emmet 160,216, and Kenny 65,673.

Two Governors Defeated

Two other governors—Republican Mortimer R. Proctor of Vermont and Democrat Ransome J. Williams of South Carolina—failed to make the grade in primaries yesterday.

Proctor lost the nomination to Ernest W. Gibson, former U. S. Senator and a recent Army colonel, by 8,000 votes. It was the first time in modern years Vermont had refused its chief executive a second term. The Republican nomination there means election in the fall.

Williams ran far behind as J. Strom Thurmond, former Army officer, and Dr. James A. McLeod, president of the State Health Association, finished one-two in the 11-man field to qualify for a September 3 runoff.

Results in Other States

South Carolina—William Jennings Bryan Dorn, 30-year-old war veteran and former state senator, unseated Rep. Butler B. Hare of the Third Congressional District. Rens. Joe R. Bryson of the Fourth District and John L. McMillan of the Sixth, the only other Congress members with opposition, were renominated.

September 16, 1946, for all the live timber marked or designated for cutting, and all merchantable dead timber located on an area embracing about 55 acres within Section 20, T. 32 S., R. 1 W., W. M., Umpqua National Forest, Oregon, estimated to be 3,400,000 feet B. M. more or less, of Douglas fir, 300,000 feet B. M. more or less, of white fir, 60,000 feet B. M. more or less, of western hemlock, 2,000 feet B. M. more or less, of sugar pine and an unestimated amount of other species of saw timber. No bid of less than \$5.00 per M. feet for Douglas fir, \$2.00 per M. feet for white fir, \$5.00 per M. feet for western white pine, \$5.00 per M. feet for ponderosa pine, \$10.00 per M. feet for sugar pine, \$2.00 per M. feet for western hemlock and other species will be considered. In addition to the prices bid for stumpage a cooperative deposit of \$0.10 per M. feet B. M., to be used by the Forest Service for paying the cost of slash disposal, a cooperative deposit of \$0.30 per M. feet B. M., to cover the cost of tree planting, seed sowing and timber stand improvement work on the area cut over, for the total cut of timber under the terms of the agreement, will be required. Bids with rates in excess of those permissible under MPR 460 will be reduced to the allowable maximum in making the award. In event of receipt of more than one bid at the maximum permissible price, award will be made in such manner as in the awarding officers judgment will result in a maximum contribution of materials needed for the reforestation and housing program. Where two or more such bidders are equally qualified in this respect in the awarding officer's judgment, award will be made by lot among them. \$5000.00 must accompany each bid, to be applied on the purchase price, refunded, or retained in part as liquidated damages, according to the conditions of sale. Wisconsin—Rep. Thad F. Wasielowski, Milwaukee Democrat, trailed Edmund V. Bobrowicz, endorsed by a local unit of the CIO-PAC. Four other incumbents who had opposition were renominated. They were Reps. Robert K. Henry, William Stevenson and Reid F. Murray, all Republicans, and Merlin Hull, who won Republican nomination in the Ninth District after 12 years in Congress as a Progressive party member.

Vermont—Ralph F. Flanders, banker and industrialist backed by the CIO-PAC, won the Republican nomination to succeed Senator Warren R. Austin, who retired to become U. S. representative in the United Nations Security Council. The loser was Sterry R. Waterman, 45-year-old lawyer, supported by Vermont's other senator, George D. Aiken.

Charles A. Plumley, the state's only U. S. House member, won renomination over Andrew E. Nuglist, political science instructor at the University of Vermont.

have notified grocers of the increase, OPA said. OPA and the Agriculture Department had announced that no subsidy would be paid on the 1946 crop of beans. OPA said today that since the 1946 crop will begin to move to market about Sept. 1, "it was decided not to pay subsidies on the small amount remaining of the 1945 crop."

For processors and dealers, the price increases are effective immediately on beans they had on hand on and after July 29. However, the increase applies only on beans on which no subsidy was paid or is payable, OPA said. Subsidies were discontinued July 28.

Progress Summarized On V-J Day Anniversary

... Now we face the task of consolidating these gains by ever-increasing production and employment opportunities."

2. A steadily rising standard of living: "The yearly production rate of goods and services for civilian use has increased more than \$30,000,000,000." Total construction and production of some goods has quadrupled. Total income payments to individuals equal or exceed the wartime peak.

3. Stabilization of our economy: "We have successfully avoided the deflation which threatened when war plants closed... but inflation remains a constant threat."

4. Increased opportunities for farmers and businessmen: "Almost a quarter of a million new businesses were established in the last half of 1945, and there is every reason to hope that the birth of new businesses will continue at a high rate... Farmers are looking forward to bumper crops, and can sell at good prices all they can grow."

Looking to the future, Secretary of the Navy Forrestal declared:

"We must firmly resolve to keep ourselves strong for the tests of the future until the United Nations is an accomplished fact."

Meantime, he called for constant striving toward international amity and understanding, which, he added, "must rest on the free exchange of information" to "dissolve the mists of prejudice."

Secretary of War Patterson and Army Chief of Staff Eisenhower sent messages of congratulation to General MacArthur in Tokyo.

There and throughout Japan, the people of that conquered nation shared a seemingly common belief that they are better off than any hoped they would be a year ago.

MacArthur himself, in an order to his troops, said today is more than a day of victory.

"It is," he said, "one of thanksgiving on which we bow our heads in extreme humility and thank God that we, of democratic faith, have demonstrated to the world that peace can be gained and kept by governments established from and by the common people."

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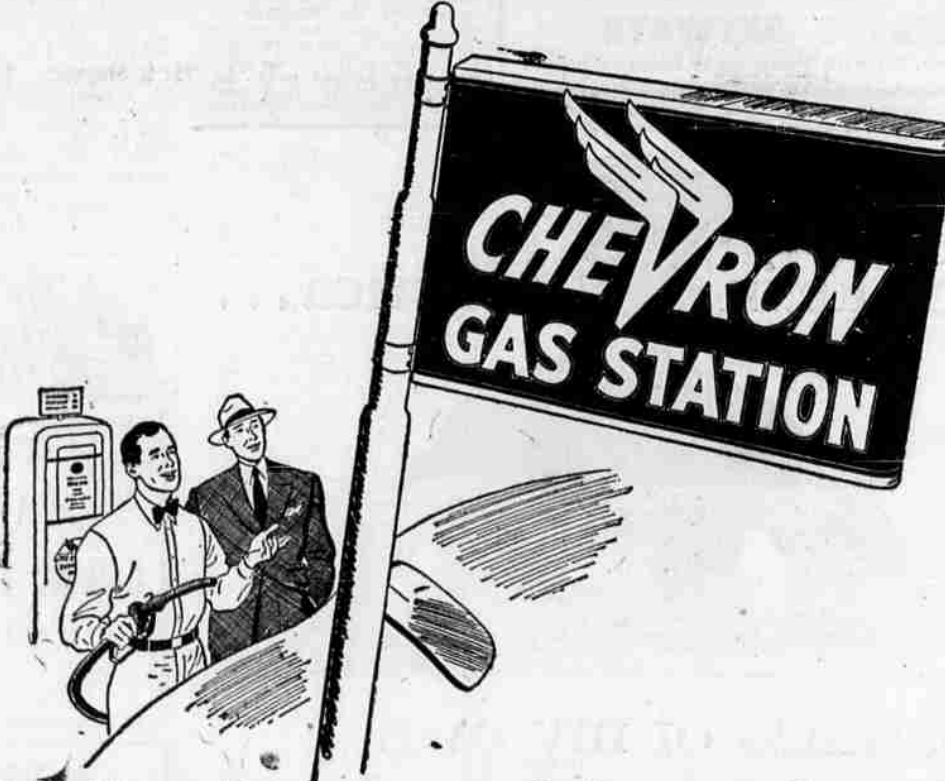
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
