LIFE in Oregon is on the GOOD side. SUPPOSE all the states of the United States were as generally admirable as Oregon.

Do you reckon we MIGHT have gone off on a wrong tangent in our more or less universal struggle for BIGNESS?

WILLIAM Z. FOSTER, head of the Communist party in the United States said in Portland the other night: "Russia wants peace, but will not permit the United States and Britain to dominate the world."

Well, who (in decent Oregon, at least) WANTS to subjugate the Soviet Union? All we want is to get along with her, and trade with her, thus raising the standards of living of BOTH.

But it seems to take TWO to make such a bargain. We can't seem to get along with the Russians unless the Russians are willing to get along with us.

And if Russia isn't willing to permit us and the British to dominate the world it seems equally reasonable that we and the British should object to RUSSIAN domination of the world.

Too much bigness always arouses fear.

WORRIES, worries, worries? What is Russia going to do? What is China going to do? Who is shooting rockets at whom in Sweden?

RAYMOND McATEE, a 32-year-old streetcar motorman of Philadelphia, isn't bothered at the moment by ANY such worries as these.

Before the advent of the new twins, the McAttee family was using 200 diapers a week—and you know what the laundry situation is in these days.

MR. McATEE has no time to bother his head with Russia and China and what have you.

WAITING FOR V-OPA DAY

Having successfully celebrated the first anniversary of V-J day, we now are waiting hopefully for V-OPA day—a day when we REALLY will celebrate.

We remember how, while the war still was in the tough stages, a prominent Oregon man said that the hardest battle the United States would be called upon to fight would be in ridding itself of the OPA.

Not only the OPA but all stubbornly entrenched bureaucracy remain as obstacles to the resumption of democracy—the principle for which we allegedly fought the last great war.

A year has passed since our Pacific enemy was beaten, but there has been no sign of surrender from the parasitical bureaucracy which has fastened itself, leechlike, upon the nation and resists every effort to break it.

During the war emergency there was some measure of excuse for certain of the bureaucratic controls placed over the country, its industry, business and people.

Now that the war is over, the emergency past, most of the alphabetical agencies still exist. A few have been abolished on paper, but in fact, have merely been absorbed.

We are prevailed upon to tolerate this condition because of a propaganda system, maintained by a small army of highly-paid experts.

Many of our people, for instance, became badly frightened when OPA controls were allowed to lapse recently.

But what actually is resulting from continued operation of OPA? The answer, we believe, is contained in OPA ceiling prices.

No matter what may be the competitive situation, the price will remain at the OPA's maximum. Without controls, although temporary fluctuations might occur, competition, operating with the law of supply and demand, coupled with buyers' resistance to excessive price increases, would force lower cost-of-living than can ever be expected as long as price controls remain in effect.

But so responsive have we become to the fear psychology promoted by our army of paid propagandists, that we cling to a straw to keep from drowning in a dry creek bed.

We are like the man, who, recovering from a broken leg, hesitates to throw away his crutches and walk again, even though he must limp for a while, before his strength is fully restored.

So long, however, as the executive branch of government can maintain its huge bureaucracy, it has a voting machine, maintained at taxpayers' expense, as a bulwark against being kicked out of office.

To rid ourselves of this army of parasites and reduce our federal expenses to a point where we can balance the budget and begin paying off a part of our huge accumulated national debt—much of which results from experimental administration, unnecessary bureaucracy, padded payrolls, etc.—will require a prolonged battle.

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V-J Day Observed In Roseburg With Memorial Rites

Observance of the first anniversary of V-J Day by local veterans' groups last night was highlighted by a memorial program in the Junior High School auditorium, with talks by leaders of wartime community services and returned veterans of the three branches of the armed forces.

Main address of the evening was delivered by Dr. Morris Roach, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, whose theme was "Beyond Victory."

County Commissioner J. Ross Hutchinson, for two years chairman of the Douglas County Red Cross chapter, told of the varied activities of the Red Cross; Bruce Elliott, chairman of the Fifth War Loan, praised the leaders of local war bond sales, and City Councilman Percy Croft said he "never served with finer, fairer men" than those on the Selective Service Board of which he was chairman.

Nance Atkins, president of the American Legion Auxiliary, described the war effort of Douglas County women.

Veterans on the program included Charles Church, former Marine flyer; Jack Josse, who served in the Navy; Sidney Fredrickson, Army veteran of European service, and Miss Maurice Holmes, formerly with the WACs.

The Rev. W. A. MacArthur, pastor of the First Methodist Church, was chosen by the Roseburg Ministerial Association to give the invocation and Father William Coughlan, St. Joseph's Catholic Church, the benediction.

Musical selections were by the combined church choirs, led by Ralph Church, and the Roseburg Municipal Band, led by Les Irvin. The program was open and closed with a salute to the colors, carried by American Legion, VFW, DAV, and Boy Scout members.

Morse Intercedes In Coos Dispute

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 15.—(AP)—The Coos Bay maritime dispute, which has slowed delivery of lumber, was placed before high federal officials today by Sen. Wayne L. Morse.

The Oregon congressman telegraphed John R. Steelman, reconstruction director, proposing binding arbitration as a method of settling the CIO-AFL jurisdictional controversy.

Morse, which is known before his election to the senate as an arbitrator of maritime disputes, said that settling the controversy by economic strength "will not result in any permanent settlement at all, but will simply lead to similar controversies at other points along the Pacific coast and other parts of the country."

He declared that, while he did not know the merits of the case, a "common sense approach" would be for the two factions to submit the dispute to arbitration with the understanding that the arbitrator's ruling would be binding.
