Douglas Unit of Red Cross Thanked For Clothes Gift

Appreciation for clothing sent to Great Britain by volunteer production workers of the Douglas County chapter of the American Red Cross, came this week in the form of a certificate from the British Red Cross Society signed by its president, Her Royal Highness, Princess Alice, Duchess of Gloucester.

Mrs. Lota Maris, executive secretary of the local chapter, said the certificate will be framed and hung in the Red Cross production room in the Roseburg Armory.

The certificate was forwarded to Roseburg by Viscountess Bridgeman, D.B.E., chairman of the hospital supply service committee, who wrote that it is "a small token of appreciation of the invaluable and most generous help which has been afforded to the war organization of the Red Cross and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem by your members."

Mrs. Maris pointed out that the need for garments for civilians abroad still continues. The Douglas County Chapter set has "much work to be done" in the local chapter sewing rooms, she said, and urged local women to volunteer their services now at the Roseburg Armory.

Surplus Sleeping Bags Undesirable

PORTLAND, Aug. 14. — (AP) — The Portland War Assets Administration has asked its Washington headquarters for authority to sell 41,000 so-called sleeping bags in small lots—but it reported individual buyers would likely not be pleased with them.

The bags stored at Umatilla are not complete sleeping bags but only one part of a three-piece unit, the WAA reported. Those available are filled with chicken feathers, button down the front and let the wind and cold air in. The inner lining and the waterproof cover are missing.

Original orders called for sale of all 41,000 in one lot, the WAA reported, on the theory that they would be useful only to a manufacturer who could alter them. Marion County veterans have opposed the one-lot sale and the

local office said it is awaiting word on its request for sale in small lots.

The WAA information department said today that 50,000 down-filled sleeping bags of excellent quality are expected to be available here soon.
